Statement by Minister for Science

MR D.J. KELLY (Bassendean — **Minister for Science)** [9.08 am]: Before I make my brief ministerial statement, as the member for Bassendean, I also pay tribute to Pat Giles, former senator. She was a cherished member of not only her local community, but also the broader labour movement, in particular for her contribution to promoting the role of women in our community.

I rise today to advise the house that this evening I will be attending the Western Australian launch of National Science Week.
