Supplementary Information Request No A4.

Question: Mr D.F. Barron-Sullivan asked: How many complaints have been made by people who have been short changed when they have bought a middy of beer?

Answer: The Minister agreed: "to find out whether there have been any specific complaints."

As glass sizes are not currently regulated, complaints from consumers have not been formally recorded. Staff of the Trading Standards Branch of Consumer Protection advise, however, that consumer inquiries about this issue have been received over a long period of time.

Consumer concern about beer glass measures was demonstrated in the telephone calls to Eion Cameron on the ABC's breakfast show on the 21st of May 2003. Following a discussion about the proposal to badge glassware three callers were given air-time. Their views indicated support for the proposal to regulate beverage measures and observations that the measurement systems proposed in WA already operate in other parts of the world.

Supplementary Information Request No A5

Question: Mrs C.L. Edwardes asked:

- 1. Will the Minister identify how many gold and silver certificates have been issued to date?
- 2. What is the cumulative figure since the program was implemented?
- 3. Will the minister provide a list of the recipients and the date on which they received their certificates?
- 4. Finally, what is the recommended time frame in which the certificates have standing, and how long does it normally take to receive a gold or silver certificate?

The Minister agreed: "The detail sought in those questions will have to be provided by way of supplementary information."

Answer:

- 1. 88 Gold and 135 Silver.
- 2. 223 certificates achieved since the inception of the program in 1994.
- 3. See attachments.
- 4. WorkSafe Plan is valid for up to 3 years. The initial certificate is for one year. After the first and second 12 month period, the company must apply to WorkSafe for an extension and must demonstrate that the rate of LTIDs has not risen or is equal to or better than the LTI/D average rate for their industry.

The time taken to conduct a full assessment leading to the award of a silver or gold certificate will vary depending on the size and nature of the organisation being assessed, but would usually be expected to take between 3 to 5 days with an additional one to two days for the Assessor to write up a complete report for the organisation with recommendations.

This time frame does not include the time taken in actually implementing a systematic approach to managing safety and health, and for an organisation to prepare for an assessment. The time involved in preparing for an assessment will vary, depending on the degree to which an organisation's systems are developed and on the organisation's occupational safety and health performance.

In addition, WorkSafe takes 2-4 weeks to receive, consider and make a decision to award a certificate based on the Assessor's report and recommendation.

Answer: The Maximum Wholesale Price was replaced by the Terminal Gate Price in December 2002 in part because it did not accurately reflect the changes to the wholesale market that occurred as a result of the cessation of the traditional borrow and loan arrangements and the move to commercial buy-sell arrangements between the major oil companies that took place in 2002.

To analyse the effect of the introduction of Terminal Gate Pricing (TGP) regulations on 19 December 2002, average retail Unleaded Petrol (ULP) prices have been compared against the Import Parity Indicator (IPI) determined by the Department of Consumer and Employment Protection. The IPI is a notional landed wholesale price and is based on the relevant Singapore benchmark (MOPS 95) and other relevant components such as freight, insurance and wharfage. The IPI is representative of actual commercial buy/sell contracts that exist between the oil majors.

An equal period of time, approximately four (4) months¹, was used to compare prices pre and post the TGP implementation. As a comparison Perth's prices were also compared to those in Sydney and Melbourne over the same period.

An analysis of the differentials between wholesale prices for the four months before and after introduction of the TGP shows there has been an average increase of 0.71 cents per litre (cpl) in Perth wholesale prices over that period. During the same timeframe and using the same benchmark the differentials in Sydney and Melbourne increased by 1.72 cpl and 0.85 cpl respectively.

It is evident from this that Perth's wholesale differential increase is not attributable to the introduction of the TGP.

¹The analysis period was 130 days ending on 27 April 2003 which is the latest data currently available for Sydney and Melbourne.

STATE OF THE WORK ENVIRONMENT – LOST TIME INJURIES AND DISEASES

Macro Indicators of Performance

WorkSafe has a vision for Western Australian workplaces to be free of work-related injuries and diseases. This vision is to be reflected in a continuous reduction in the rate of lost time injuries and disease between July 2000 and July 2005.


In 2001-02 there was an overall five per cent reduction in work-related injury and disease since 2000-01, continuing the long-term downward trend. The total rate of improvement since the Occupational Safety and Health Act came into effect in 1988-89 is 60%, and the rate of improvement from July 1997 to June 2002 is 40%.

It should be noted that the workers' compensation data from which frequency rates are derived are dynamic, and subject to ongoing revision.

Work Related Injuries/Diseases W.A. 1988-89 to 2001-02 **FREQUENCY RATES**





The rate of injury to male workers in 2001-02 ranged from 2.1 LTI/Ds per million hours worked in the Finance and Insurance Industry to 24.3 in Manufacturing. For female workers the range was from 4 in Electricity, Gas and Water Supply to 19.2 in Health and Community Services. Note that work-related injuries and diseases are recorded against the principal industry of the employer. For example, labour hire contract workers are counted under "Property and Business Services", not the industry in which they are performing their work.

Transport Industry fatigue management plans

Since 1999, 1839 operators have been contacted, of which 1049 have been required to implement a fatigue management system while 790 have not required plans.

WorkSafe estimates that approximately two thirds of operators required to implement a plan have done so. However, since 1 April 2003, operators of over-dimensional vehicles (ie. vehicles requiring permits to operate on roads) must submit fatigue management plans as part of the Main Roads Western Australia accreditation process. Consequently, WorkSafe no longer records the total number of plans.
