STATE BUDGET — EDUCATION

404. MR N.W. MORTON to the Treasurer:

There have been claims that there have been savage cuts to education in 2015–16. Could the Treasurer clarify what funding has been provided to ensure our students have the best possible educational environment in which to learn?

Dr M.D. NAHAN replied:

I would like to thank the member for Forrestfield for that question. As the member would know, he has been in the house for a couple of years now and has heard this uttered repeatedly by the people opposite and their fellow travellers in the wider Labor movement. Indeed, a couple of weeks ago the State School Teachers' Union of WA came out, as did the Leader of the Opposition, and said that we have slashed and burned education.

Mr P.C. Tinley: It's true.

Dr M.D. NAHAN: Yes, right! The member says it is true. Let me go through a few facts here. Education has been one of our priority areas; it has been since the inception of this Liberal–National government all the way through. We have increased spending—I repeat, increased spending—by 47 per cent. We have the highest paid teachers in the nation. Our expenditure per pupil is 30 per cent above the national average. Remember the Gonski move? The reason we were not getting any money out of Gonski—we have already done it! Of course, we have done away with—what was it called?—outcome-based education that the other mob came up with that almost destroyed the public system. That has gone. In this budget we have increased spending on schools by 6.5 per cent, or \$600 per pupil. Where do members opposite get these cuts from? What kind of bizarre world do they live in when down is up and up is down and everything is negative? A hallmark of this government has been expenditure on capital. From 2008 to 2018–19, we have committed to spend \$5.2 billion on schools. A lot of it has been borrowed, which is what members opposite are complaining about. I would like to read out some of these—

Willetton Senior High School—a fine school—that the opposition committed to in the last election. There are four new primary schools in Alkimos, Baldivis, Bedford and Lansdale. There is Byford Secondary College and north Ellenbrook senior school, which is a new secondary school to be completed in 2018. I do not hear the member for West Swan screaming as usual!
