SPEAKER - ELECTION

The member for Merredin (Mr Cowan), as the member with the longest continuous service, took the Chair and presided over the election of the Speaker.

DR GALLOP (Victoria Park - Premier) [11.42 am]: I move -

That the member for Burrup do take the Chair of the Assembly as Speaker.

MR RIPPER (Belmont - Deputy Premier) [11.42 am]: I second the motion.

MR RIEBELING (Burrup) [11.42 am]: I accept the nomination.

MR COWAN (Merredin) [11.43 am]: Are there any further nominations? There being no further nominations, I declare the member for Burrup elected as Speaker.

[The member for Burrup was conducted to the Chair.]

THE SPEAKER (Mr Riebeling): I thank all members for the confidence they have shown in me by electing me to this office and I now assume the Chair as Speaker of the House.

DR GALLOP (Victoria Park - Premier) [11.44 am]: Mr Speaker, we on this side of the House congratulate you on your election to the important position of Speaker of the Legislative Assembly. We respect the independence of the office that you hold and are keen to work with you to ensure that this Chamber operates both efficiently and effectively on behalf of the people of Western Australia. We regard the role of the Speaker in our Parliament as twofold. Firstly, the Speaker upholds the powers and privileges of the Parliament to ensure that the proper function and purposes of the institution of the Parliament are presented to the world. We believe you are in a position to make a significant contribution to the work of this Parliament as its new Speaker. I wish you all the best in your position, and I am confident that we will work together to ensure that our Parliament is effective and operates on behalf of the people of Western Australia.

MR BARNETT (Cottesloe - Leader of the Opposition) [11.45 am]: Mr Speaker, I congratulate you as the member for Burrup on your election as Speaker of the Legislative Assembly. I look forward to your exercising your duties in an impartial manner to ensure that all members of this Parliament have a full and fair opportunity to debate legislation and issues that come before this Parliament. I assure you from the Liberal Opposition that you will receive the full cooperation of all members on this side of the House. I wish you well.

MR TRENORDEN (Avon - Leader of the National Party) [11.46 am]: Mr Speaker, I also congratulate you on your election to the office of Speaker. It is important that the reforms that commenced in the last Parliament be continued, and I know that you have given some consideration to those reforms. I and the other members of the National Party will be keen to work with you to improve the accountability and performance of this House. I believe we would all agree - new members aside - that the performance of this House has been improved in question time and by the other new procedures that have been introduced. I will be interested to see how committees are established, resourced and operated in the next few months. I wish you well in the Chair, and look forward to working with a cooperative Chair.

MR KOBELKE (Nollamara - Minister for Labour Relations) [11.47 am]: Mr Speaker, I add my congratulations on your election as Speaker of the Legislative Assembly. That follows on from your fine election win in the seat of Burrup, where you took a marginal seat and built up a large majority. That reflects the fact that you addressed the issues of the wide cross-section of your electorate. I am sure that will be reflected in the way in which you seek to work with members on both sides of the House to advance the interests of members and the work of the House. I recognise also that you have been a significant contributor to debate in this Parliament for some years, and as such I am sure you will have no difficulty in recognising tedious repetition, if ever that should occur.
