DIRECTIONS 2031 — CABINET APPROVAL

501. Hon MATT BENSON-LIDHOLM to the Leader of the House representing the Premier:

- (1) Did the government's planning framework "directions2031 and beyond: metropolitan planning beyond the horizon" go before cabinet for approval; and, if so, on what date did cabinet make the decision to approve the framework and which ministers, if any, did not take part in this decision and why?
- (2) Did the government's activity centres policy, which implements elements of "directions2031 and beyond", go before cabinet for approval; and, if so, on what date did cabinet make the decision to approve the policy and which ministers, if any, did not take part in this decision and why?

Hon NORMAN MOORE replied:

I thank the member for some notice of this question.

(1)–(2) As the member would be aware, it is against convention to disclose information relating to the deliberations of cabinet.
