PUBLIC SECTOR — GOVERNMENT WAGES POLICY

458. Ms M.J. DAVIES to the Premier:

I have a supplementary question. I understand from the Premier's answer that the government's wages policy stands. Given the CPSU-CSA wrote to members last week saying that the new offer absolutely breaks the wages policy, who is telling the truth—the Premier or the union?

Mr M. McGOWAN replied:

As I said to the Leader of the Nationals WA, the \$1 000 wages policy stands. It is fair on everyone across the public sector, whether they are a specialist doctor in a hospital, who might earn many hundreds of thousands of dollars, or a cleaner in the hospital, who might earn \$50 000. It is a \$1 000 wages policy; that is fair on everybody. Considering the financial situation—the \$40 billion debt we were left with by the Liberals and Nationals—it was one of the measures —

Ms M.J. Davies: So the unions are lying, then?

Mr M. McGOWAN: That is what you did. Just own up to it.

Ms M.J. Davies interjected.

The SPEAKER: Leader of the Nationals WA!

Mr M. McGOWAN: You took it from under \$5 billion and you grew it to \$40 billion. That is what you did.

Ms M.J. Davies interjected.

The SPEAKER: Leader of the Nationals WA, I call you to order for the first time.

Mr M. McGOWAN: The \$1 000 wages policy will continue, but there may be other benefits that we can provide. As I outlined earlier, domestic violence leave, improvements in payouts to family members when a worker is killed in the line of duty, and increasing permanency are all benefits we can provide to the workforce. I think that is great. I want to do things like that, but, unfortunately, we cannot do everything that people might like. Some of the initiatives on offer in what we put to the CPSU–CSA are worthwhile things that will improve the lives of and work–life balance for people who work in the public sector, but the \$1 000 wages policy will continue.
