Chair's Foreword

t is my pleasure to table the third annual report of the Community Development and Justice Standing Committee in the 39th Parliament. The Committee has had a very productive year, despite functioning at 60 per cent of capacity for half of the reporting period.

The financial year began with investigative travel to the UK and the US for the purposes of gathering evidence for two inquiries: the Inquiry into Policy Implications of an Ageing Community (instigated in the previous financial year); and the Inquiry into Methods of Evaluating WA Police Performance.

The Committee was introduced to examples of age-friendly communities in Manchester and New York that were truly inspiring, demonstrating that with some thoughtful planning and understanding the lives of seniors can be significantly enhanced. With the ageing population set to expand rapidly in the next 20 years, the time for the State to act is now.

The Committee's report, *Age-friendly WA? A challenge for government*, found that while there are some positive examples of individual local governments working to make the community more age-friendly, the State Government departments do not have a coordinated approach to ageing policy, planning and implementation.

Since the end of November last year, the Committee has been inquiring into how WA Police evaluates its performance. This is an inquiry with many dimensions, best tackled by focussing on particular facets of policing. The first focus, on the performance measures used by WA Police to determine the effectiveness of traffic law enforcement and road safety initiatives, was decided upon in the wake of a disastrous State road toll.

The Committee's report, *Are we there yet? How WA Police determines whether traffic law enforcement is effective*, found that the single key performance indicator employed by WA Police provides only a limited measure of the effectiveness of road policing. It is difficult to comprehend how police can tell whether they are on the right track with their traffic strategies when measurement and evaluation is largely absent.

Driver attitude surveys, which provided a snapshot of WA drivers' perceptions of police presence and effectiveness, were discontinued in 2011 and need to be reinstated. The Committee also found that a lack of published data related to road safety makes it difficult for stakeholders and the public to make an informed assessment of police performance. In the interests of transparency, more information should be available on the WA Police website and/or in its annual report.

As mentioned, the Committee was given no choice but to continue its work with only three members, after the Member for Morley and the Member for Balcatta resigned from the Committee on August 19. On February 26, the Member for Balcatta returned to the Committee and we also welcomed the Member for Vasse.

I would like to thank my fellow Committee Members for their important contribution to our inquiries. I am also grateful for the support of the Committee's Principal Research Officers, Dr Sarah Palmer and Research Officer Ms Niamh Corbett, who has since moved on to another role.

Investigative travel

In July, four members of the Committee undertook an 18-day investigative trip to the UK and the US to collect evidence for the Inquiry into Policy Implications of an Ageing Community and the Inquiry into Methods of Evaluating WA Police Performance. As indicated in Table 1.3, the Committee was briefed by the Home Office in London on the UK police reform process, and by a member of the Metropolitan Police on cultural diversity issues within the Met.

In Manchester, the Members were given a joint presentation on initiatives implemented by the Manchester Institute for Collaborative Research on Ageing, Manchester City Council's "Age-friendly Manchester" program and post-graduate

students from Manchester Metropolitan University. They were also invited to meet the mayor, who is an advocate of age-friendly programs in the city.

The Committee spent a full day being briefed on the operations of Greater Manchester Police, and spent another half day with North Manchester Police. They were also briefed by representatives of the Greater Manchester Police Federation.

In New York, one member and one staff member observed one of New York Police Department's renowned weekly COMPSTAT meetings. All members and staff were originally scheduled to attend, but a last-minute room change meant there was insufficient space to accommodate the usual number of observers. The following day, the Committee met with NYPD's Deputy Commissioner of Operations.

Since New York is one of only two US cities to be granted entry to the WHO Global Network of Age-friendly Cities, the Committee took the opportunity to visit the headquarters of Age-Friendly NYC, based at the New York Academy of Medicine. They also met with a former director of Age-friendly NYC, who is now director of the International Longevity Center -Columbia Aging Centre and assistant professor of Health Policy and Management at Columbia University.

The Committee also visited the Penn South "naturally occurring retirement community", a residential community cooperative in Manhattan which consists of 10 apartment buildings with on-site services for seniors.

In addition to meetings and briefings, the Committee attended two conferences: two days at the 7th International Conference on Evidence-based Policing at Cambridge University, UK; and two-and-a-half days at the n4a Answers on Ageing Conference in Dallas, Texas.

Other activities

- On 1st August 2014 two members met with visiting academic Dr Catherine Barrett, chief investigator of the Sexual Health and Ageing Program at Latrobe University, Victoria, and Ms June Lowe, chair of GLBTI Rights in Ageing Inc., at Parliament House.
- On 22nd October 2014 three members attended a breakfast presentation in Perth on the bushfire risk management policy framework, hosted by the Urban Development Institute of Australia (Western Australia).

Report 7: The Committee's first major report of the financial year, *Age-friendly WA?: A challenge for government*, was tabled on 20 November 2014.

Work in progress

The Committee resolved on 20 May 2015 to investigate how WA Police evaluates whether it is providing adequate protection to the victims of family and domestic violence, as part of the over-arching Inquiry into Methods of Evaluating WA Police Performance. The sub-report is due to be tabled in October 2015.

Appendix One

Committee's functions and powers

The functions of the Committee are to review and report to the Assembly on: -

- a) the outcomes and administration of the departments within the Committee's portfolio responsibilities;
- b) annual reports of government departments laid on the Table of the House;
- c) the adequacy of legislation and regulations within its jurisdiction; and
- d) any matters referred to it by the Assembly including a bill, motion, petition, vote or expenditure, other financial matter, report or paper.

At the commencement of each Parliament and as often thereafter as the Speaker considers necessary, the Speaker will determine and table a schedule showing the portfolio responsibilities for each committee. Annual reports of government departments and authorities tabled in the Assembly will stand referred to the relevant committee for any inquiry the committee may make.

Whenever a committee receives or determines for itself fresh or amended terms of reference, the committee will forward them to each standing and select committee of the Assembly and Joint Committee of the Assembly and Council. The Speaker will announce them to the Assembly at the next opportunity and arrange for them to be placed on the notice boards of the Assembly.
