That this House condemns the Minister for Corrective Services for his failures in the Corrections portfolio.

2. Government Transparency (Notice given – 27/11/18)

Mr Z.R.F. Kirkup: To move –

That this House notes:

1. The Premier's commitment to gold standard transparency in Government; and
2. The failure of Ministers in the McGowan Government to meet the Premier's standard of gold standard transparency.

3. Tourism Industry Delivery (Notice given – 27/11/18)

Ms L. Mettam: To move –

That this House notes the poor performance of the McGowan Government for its failure to deliver for the tourism industry, evidenced by a decline in international visitor numbers, a reduction in international students and its failure to deliver additional direct flights to Western Australia.

5. Job Creation in Western Australia (Notice given – 19/2/19)

Dr M.D. Nahan: To move –

That this House condemns the Premier and Minister for Jobs for his failure to diversify the economy and create jobs in Western Australia, which was his main promise to Western Australians at the 2017 election.

6. Major Transport Projects (Notice given – 19/2/19)

Mrs L.M. Harvey: To move –

That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for her bungling of major projects, including Metronet and the Huawei Radio Replacement Contract.

7. Privatisation of Public Assets (Notice given – 19/2/19)

Mr D.C. Nalder: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its dishonesty prior to the State election by saying it opposed privatisation of public assets, and then subsequently selling a range of public assets following the election.

8. Collie Coal Industry (Notice given – 19/2/19)

Mr D.C. Nalder: To move –

That this House condemns the Minister for Energy for abandoning the people of Collie by closing down the coal industry.

9. Tourism Industry Policies (Notice given – 19/2/19)

That this House condemns the McGowan Government, and in particular the Minister for Tourism, for overseeing a collapse in the tourism sector which has been a direct consequence of the Government's failed policies.

2. Condemns the actions of activists interfering with and interrupting businesses going about their legitimate business activities, contributing to the economy, creating jobs and supporting their local communities.

12. Outer Harbour Proposal (Notice given – 11/9/18, renewed – 12/3/19)

Mrs L.M. Harvey: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its ill-conceived Outer Harbour proposal that cannot be justified on economic, social or environmental grounds.

13. Education Portfolio (Notice given – 11/9/18, renewed – 12/3/19)

Mrs L.M. Harvey: To move –

- (1) That this House condemns the McGowan Government's bungles and backflips in the education portfolio including:
 - (a) the backflip on Moora Residential College;
 - (b) the backflip on Perth Modern School;
 - (c) the backflip on the high rise high school in Northbridge;
 - (d) the backflip on School of the Air;
 - (e) the backflip on the Gifted and Talented Program;
 - (f) the backflip on Northam Residential College;
 - (g) the backflip on freezing the intake of Level 3 teachers;
 - (h) the backflip on Bunbury Baptist College;
 - (i) the bungling of Canning and Tuart College;
 - (j) the bungling of Landsdale Farm School;
 - (k) the bungling of camp school funding; and
 - (l) other bungling and backflips.
- (2) That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its failure to properly fund:
 - (a) Trust funds for agriculture schools;
 - (b) Kidsport;
 - (c) Herdsman Wildlife Education Centre;
 - (d) Community Kindergartens; and
 - (e) its mean-spirited increases to VacSwim.

14. First Responders (Notice given – 11/9/18, renewed – 12/3/19)

Mr P.A. Katsambanis: To move –

That this House:

- (a) extends its support and gratitude to the officers of the Western Australian Police Force, our fire and emergency services personnel, our paramedics and all first responders for their ongoing support and protection of our community; and
- (b) in particular, acknowledges the many difficult and tragic incidents they must attend to on behalf of the community which would have a lasting toll on their mental health and wellbeing.

15. Minister for Corrective Services (Notice given – 11/9/18, renewed – 12/3/19)

Mr Z.R.F. Kirkup: To move –

That this House condemns the Minister for Corrective Services for his consistent failures in leadership and public accountability, in particular ongoing corruption issues, prison breakouts, drugs entering the prison system and prison officer misconduct, including allowing paedophiles to be unsupervised in public.

16. Federal Labor Opposition Policies (Notice given – 20/3/19)

Mr D.C. Nalder: To move –

That this House:

- (a) expresses its deep concern at the McGowan Government's support for the policies of the Federal Labor Opposition including their policies on negative gearing, franking credits, capital gains tax, a 50% renewable energy target and industrial relations; and
- (b) calls on the McGowan Government to explain the potential impact of these policies for Western Australians at a time of subdued housing, retail and employment sectors.

17. Mortgage Stress and Negative Equity (Notice given – 20/3/19)

Mr D.C. Nalder: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its poor judgement and the impact their decisions are having on Western Australian households, including their decisions to remove the First Home Owners Grant Boost, their introduction of a Foreign Buyers Surcharge and their increases to the cost of living, all of which have contributed to mortgage stress and negative equity.

18. Infrastructure Projects (Notice given – 2/4/19)

Dr M.D. Nahan: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for failing to commence the various infrastructure projects which have received significant funding from the Federal Liberal National Government over recent years.

19. Hospitality and Tourism Industry (Notice given – 3/4/19)

Ms L. Mettam: To move –

That this House:

- (1) Notes the career opportunities presented by the hospitality and tourism industry;
- (2) Acknowledges the professionalism, politeness, friendliness and engaging qualities of Western Australia's tourism and hospitality workers;
- (3) Condemns the Minister for Tourism for his condescending remarks insinuating Western Australia's tourism and hospitality workers lack courtesy, decorum and friendliness.

20. Federal Liberal-National Government GST (Notice given – 7/5/19)

Dr M.D. Nahan: To move –

That the House congratulates the Federal Liberal-National Government for delivering the GST fix and record infrastructure funding, which has guaranteed WA more funding over future years, notwithstanding the record Iron Ore royalties, increased infrastructure spending and more jobs.

21. Federal Liberal-National Government (Notice given – 7/5/19)

Mr S.K. L'Estrange: To move –

That this House:

- (1) Congratulates the Federal Liberal-National Government for:
 - (a) increasing GP bulk billing rates from 82% under Labor to 86% now;
 - (b) ending Labor's Medicare freeze;
 - (c) increasing spending on health under a new five-year public hospital agreement with the states and territories delivering \$31 billion more funding for hospitals; and
 - (d) adding more than 2,000 medicine listings worth over \$10.6 billion to the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme. and
- (2) Condemns the McGowan Government for undermining these improvements by cutting \$200 million from the WA Health budget.

22. State Budget Interests (Notice given – 14/5/19)

Ms M.J. Davies: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for once again putting the interests of metropolitan Perth ahead of regional Western Australia in its latest State Budget.

1. Cost of Living and Frontline Services (Moved – 13/6/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr S. L'Estrange – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House highlights the impact the McGowan Government is having on the people of Darling Range through massive increases to the cost of living, cuts to frontline services and for its failure to fund critical infrastructure.

2. Regional Development Agenda (Moved – 20/6/18)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Tourism – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr D.T. Redman –

That this House expresses its lack of confidence in the Minister for Regional Development for failing to stand up for regional WA, given the McGowan Government's continual undermining of the regional development agenda, including the demise of Royalties for Regions.

3. Darling Range By-Election Result (Moved – 27/6/18)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Mines and Petroleum – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House calls on the McGowan Government to listen to the loud message sent by the people of Darling Range, including a commitment to lower the cost of living for struggling households, reverse the cuts to regional education and to commit to funding its infrastructure commitments, including Tonkin Highway Extension and the Byford Rail Line.

4. Minister for Agriculture and Food (Moved – 15/8/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr P.J. Rundle – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle –

That this House condemns the Premier for his continued support of the Minister for Agriculture and Food, despite her lack of knowledge of the industry and refusal to support WA's farmers.

5. McGowan Government's Economic and Financial Policies (Moved – 22/8/18)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Mines and Petroleum – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr D.C. Nalder –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for their short-sighted economic and financial policies that have damaged the economy by undermining business and investment confidence, reducing consumer discretionary expenditure and hurting international education and tourism.

6. Cost of Living in Western Australia (Moved – 12/9/18)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Mines and Petroleum – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government's crippling cost of living increases on struggling Western Australian households at a time of stagnant wages and for its failure to lower electricity prices through introducing retail competition and for using the Water Corporation as a taxing mechanism.

7. Major Events (Ticket Scalping) Bill 2018 (Mr J.E. McGrath) (No. 97, 2r. – 19/9/18)

Second reading. Adjourned debate (Ms L. Mettam).

8. Frontline Services and Critical Service Delivery (Moved – 19/9/18)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Tourism – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government's budget cuts to frontline services and the associated impact on critical service delivery to the people of Western Australia.

9. Health Portfolio (Moved – 10/10/18)

Adjourned debate (Ms L. Mettam – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr S.K. L'Estrange –

That this House condemns the Health Minister's handling of the health portfolio, placing our health system on a trajectory of cost cutting that is stripping away frontline health and mental health services in a similar manner to that which led to the chaos experienced under the last State Labor Government.

10. Fly-in Fly-out Work Practices (Moved – 17/10/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr R.S. Love – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House recognises that fly in fly out work practices can be detrimental to regional communities through the reduction of economic and social opportunities for development and calls on the McGowan Government to:

- (1) acknowledge the positive impact the Liberal-National Government made in improving the liveability of the Pilbara through Royalties for Regions investment;
- (2) ensure that all fly-in fly-out work arrangements are limited to genuinely remote and temporary operations and that workers are provided with genuine choice over where they live; and
- (3) ensure that key stakeholders, including Local Government, are engaged where the project will be located to address social and community infrastructure requirements.

11. Parliamentary Budget Officer Bill 2018 (Dr M.D. Nahan) (No. 106, 2r. – 31/10/18)

Second reading. Adjourned debate (Mr D.R. Michael).

12. Trust in the McGowan Government (Moved – 31/10/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr T.J. Healy – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House confirms the McGowan Government cannot be trusted because of its lack of accountability, broken promises, new taxes and failure to deliver on gold standard transparency.

13. McGowan Government's Decision-Making (Moved – 7/11/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr R.S. Love – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr V.A. Catania –

That this House condemns the Ministers of the McGowan Government whose inconsistent, mean-spirited, reactionary and politically-fuelled decision-making has undermined the trust and goodwill of Western Australians.

14. Housing Industry in Western Australia (Moved – 21/11/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr S. L'Estrange – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr D.C. Nalder –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its attack on the housing industry, home values and construction jobs, including reducing demand by introducing the foreign investment tax and cuts to the first home owner grant boost.

15. McGowan Government's First Two Parliamentary Years (Moved – 28/11/18)

Adjourned debate (Ms L. Mettam – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its failures in delivering on its election promises, cuts to frontline services, cost of living increases and failure to be open and accountable to the people of Western Australia in its first two parliamentary years.

16. Frontline Services and the Western Australia Community (Moved – 20/2/19)

Adjourned debate (Mr K.M. O'Donnell – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr S. L'Estrange –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its cuts to frontline services, resulting in the WA community and frontline staff being put at risk.

17. Decision Making Processes of the McGowan Government (Moved – 13/3/19)

Adjourned debate (Ms M.J. Davies – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its disdain and neglect of regional Western Australia during its first two years in power through its metro-centric attitude and mean-spirited decision making processes.

18. Impact of a Federal Labor Government on Western Australia (Moved – 20/3/19)

Adjourned debate (Dr D.J. Honey – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House notes the damage that a Federal Labor Government will have on Western Australia, including increases to the cost of living, reduced income for seniors and damage to the housing and construction sector.

19. Federal Labor's Policies and Western Australia (Moved – 3/4/19)

Adjourned debate (Ms J.J. Shaw – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its failure to stand up to Bill Shorten and Federal Labor who are advocating policies that will have a detrimental impact on Western Australia.

20. Royalties for Regions (Moved – 10/4/19)

Adjourned debate (Mr V.A. Catania – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr V.A. Catania –

That this House calls on the McGowan Government to restore the integrity of Royalties for Regions and to bring down a budget next month that will meet the real needs of people in regional Western Australia.

21. Management of the Economy (Moved – 8/5/19)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Mines and Petroleum – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr D.C. Nalder –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government's handling of the economy and its economy destroying policies that have seen a domestic economy in decline, a record number of Western Australians without jobs, record levels of mortgage stress, falling house prices, record levels of negative equity experienced by home owners, record levels of utility disconnections, a collapse in building approvals and falling retail trade.

22. Live Sheep Export Industry (Moved – 15/5/19)

That this House condemns Bill Shorten and the Federal Labor Party for its destructive plan to shut down WA's live sheep export industry and calls on the McGowan Government to stand up and fight to save an industry which generates hundreds of jobs in Western Australia.

Criminal Appeals Amendment Bill 2019 (No. 103 – 1)

Clause 4

The Attorney General: To move –

Page 3, line 17 to page 4, line 14 – To delete the lines and substitute:

“

35D. Terms relating to evidence

- (1) For the purposes of this Part, evidence relating to an offence of which an offender was convicted is *fresh* —
 - (a) if, despite the exercise of reasonable diligence, the evidence was not and could not have been tendered at the trial of the offence or any previous appeal; or
 - (b) if —
 - (i) the evidence was not tendered at the trial of the offence or any previous appeal but, with the exercise of reasonable diligence, could have been tendered at the trial of the offence or any previous appeal; and
 - (ii) the failure to tender the evidence was due to the incompetence or negligence of a lawyer representing the offender.
- (2) For the purposes of this Part, evidence relating to an offence of which an offender was convicted is *new* if the evidence was not tendered at the trial of the offence or any previous appeal but, with the exercise of reasonable diligence, could have been tendered at the trial of the offence or any previous appeal.
- (3) Despite subsection (2), evidence is not new evidence if it is fresh evidence under subsection (1)(b).
- (4) For the purposes of this Part, evidence relating to an offence of which an offender was convicted is *compelling* if it is highly probative in the context of the issues in dispute at the trial of the offence.

”

The Attorney General: To move –

Page 5, lines 6 to 11 – To delete the lines and substitute:

“

- (2) The Court of Appeal may decide whether or not to give special leave to appeal with or without written or oral submissions from the parties to the appeal.
- (2A) Except as provided in subsection (3), the Court of Appeal must decide whether to give special leave to appeal before the hearing of the appeal.

”

The Attorney General: To move –

Members of the Council will be admitted to the Chamber in the area behind the Chair and may remain there during divisions. A stranger does not include a member’s baby being breastfed by that member.

Grievances

146. At a time determined by the Speaker on each Thursday when the Address in Reply no longer has priority, the Speaker will call for grievances. Five members may speak on grievances and no member may speak more than once. A Minister or a member deputed will have the right to reply to each of the grievances. The fifth grievance will alternate between government and opposition each week.

Time limits on speeches

101. A member may speak for the specified period on the following subjects –

Grievance debate (S.O. 146)

Each member including a Minister or a member deputed to reply 6 minutes

Members' statements

147. Twice in each sitting week, at a time decided by the Speaker, the Speaker will call for statements by members, and up to five members, other than a Minister, may make a statement not exceeding two minutes each.

Time limits on speeches

101. A member may speak for the specified period on the following subjects –

Members' statements (S.O. 147)

Member2 minutes

Maximum of 5 members, twice weekly.
