WEDNESDAY, 26 JUNE 2019

1. Meeting of Assembly

The Assembly met at 12.00 noon pursuant to adjournment.

The Speaker took the Chair.

An Acknowledgement of Country and Prayers were read.

2. Petitions

Dog Act 1976 – Ms L.L. Baker presented a petition from 2,748 people asking the Legislative Assembly to recommend that the Government repeal the breed specific legislation requiring companion greyhounds to be muzzled in public in Western Australia (P. 140).

Holmes Street Southern River – Mr T.J. Healy presented a petition from 74 people asking the Legislative Assembly to request the City of Gosnells to build a footpath on Holmes Street between Goraba Street and Southern River Road (P. 141).

8. High Risk Offenders Bill 2019

That a bill for "An Act to provide for the detention in custody or the supervision of persons of a particular class, to repeal the *Dangerous Sexual Offenders Act 2006* and to make consequential and other amendments to various Acts." be introduced and read a first time.

Question put and passed.

The Attorney General presented an explanatory memorandum and bill read a first time.

The Attorney General moved, That the bill be now read a second time.

Ms L. Mettam moved, That the debate be adjourned.

9. Civil Procedure (Representative Proceedings) Bill 2019

That a bill for "An Act to provide for representative proceedings in civil proceedings in the Supreme Court." be introduced and read a first time.

Mr D.T. Redman moved,

That this House condemns the McGowan Government over its failure to abide by and enforce its own policies in relation to securing local contracts and jobs for West Australians.
