#### Who We Are

Healthway (the Western Australian Health Promotion Foundation) was established in 1991 under Section 15 of the Tobacco Control Act 1990 as an independent statutory body reporting to the Minister for Health.

As well as funding activities relating to the promotion of good health, particularly among the young, Healthway had as a priority the replacement of tobacco advertising and sponsorship during its first 5 years.

Responsibility for the overall management of Healthway including decisions about funding is held by a Board whose members represent health, youth, sport, arts and country organisations from government and non government sectors.

A number of expert committees has been established with a range of responsibilities including making recommendations to the Board concerning the allocation of grants and sponsorships.

#### What We Do

Healthway provides grants to health and research organisations as well as sponsorships to sport, arts and racing groups which encourage healthy lifestyles and advance health promotion programs.

#### **Our Clients**

While Healthway seeks to access the wider West Australian community through the activities supported, priority groups include youth and those in whom health inequalities exist.

## CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

The Western Australian Health Promotion Foundation reached a major milestone this year celebrating ten years of operation under its well recognised name of "Healthway". The occasion was marked with a seminar which was held in May titled "Healthway Celebrating Ten Years". This provided an excellent opportunity to reflect on the history of the organisation and highlight some of the challenges and achievements of the past decade.

The seminar audience was representative of the organisations and people with whom Healthway has worked over the past ten years. As well as personnel from our Board and Committees there were those from the tertiary sector, government departments, non-government health agencies, community groups, sport, arts and racing organisations and sponsorship officers. Those who attended represented our partners and stakeholders. Had we invited all of the organisations which have received grants and sponsorships we would have almost twice filled the Perth Concert Hall because they number three thousand one hundred. Put simply that is 3,100 different groups in Western Australia which have benefited from Healthway's funding. Those groups have run more than 7,000 projects.

Another figure which I find interesting is that the amount requested in applications received at Healthway during the past decade is almost \$326m and we have allocated in the region of \$140m or 43% of that requested. As Healthway receives an increasing number of applications every year we are finding that a greater percentage of requests for grants and sponsorships can not be supported and that the amounts allocated are often much less than those requested. Despite this, I am pleased to say that the standard of applications remains high with innovative proposals being received in all program areas.

One interesting aspect of the seminar was the historical perspective covered in a number of papers. We learned that there was a great deal of opposition to the changes which the Tobacco Control Act introduced and the establishment of a Health Promotion Foundation.

It is therefore most pleasing ten years on to report that recent survey results show that West Australians now very strongly support what Healthway does. For example, 93% feel that it is important that health messages are promoted at sports and arts activities for children. A large majority (95%) considered it was important that sports and arts activities for children are smoke free. Over 90% of people agreed with the use of Healthway funds to support research and 86% supported the funding of health promotion projects. These figures very clearly show that over the past ten years Healthway has earned the support of the West Australian community for the work it does.

It is my very real pleasure to present Healthway's Tenth Annual Report and in doing so acknowledge all of those who have contributed to the success of the organisation over the past decade. In particular, I thank and congratulate the Board Members, past and present, those who have served on the specialist Advisory Committees as well as the management and staff who have worked tirelessly to ensure that Healthway is recognised as a leading health promotion organisation.

# **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Implementation of Healthway's Strategic Plan 2000-2003 is in full swing. At the end of this reporting period we are at the half way point with all programs having introduced strategies to ensure that the key goals will be met.

Part of the process involves the development of Policy Statements which clearly articulate Healthway's position on the four major priority health issues which have been identified. These are Tobacco Smoking Control, Mental Health, Physical Activity and indigenous Health. The statements, developed after consultation with public health experts, include background to the issues as well as a blueprint for action. Those covering Tobacco Smoking Control, Mental Health and Physical Activity have already been endorsed by the Board of Healthway and have been widely circulated.

It is important that stakeholders and those organisations which apply to Healthway for grants and sponsorships are aware of our policies and directions so they can address them in their applications for grants and sponsorships.

In relation to Tobacco Control, it is important to remember that Healthway was set up under the Tobacco Control Act 1990, the purposes of which are the active discouragement of tobacco smoking, the promotion of good health and the prevention of illness. Healthway's strong commitment to tobacco control is reflected in a number of ways. Sponsorship linked to tobacco control health messages such as *QUIT*, *SmokeFree WA* and *Smarter than Smoking* has been allocated 39% of available funds since 1991. Health projects addressing tobacco control have received 20% of available funds.

The issue of Mental Health is important for Healthway to address as the burden of mental health problems is estimated to affect more than 18% of the adult population and between 10-15% of young people under the age of 18. Mental Health affects social, emotional physical and spiritual well-being. Healthway currently supports mental health promotion through providing grants for health promotion projects and research which is designed to develop and apply the scientific evidence base for prevention and mental health promotion.


While we do not currently use a sponsorship message related to mental health, many of Healthway's sponsorships are about promoting mental health through involving whole communities in projects and events. In light of this, we have developed the new *Healthy Community Event* message for some of our arts, sports and racing sponsorships.

People who participate in a community which has strong, supportive social networks report increased feelings of acceptance, self worth and well-being and are less likely to develop mental health problems including depression. By encouraging Healthy Community events we hope to foster social interaction as another step towards the goal of 'A Healthy WA'.

#### **KEY STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS - REVIEW OF PROGRESS**

This year Healthway is mid way through implementing the Strategic Plan 2000-2003. The Plan identifies five (5) key strategic directions which are supported by all of the program areas to ensure that Healthway's health promotion goals are reached.

## 1. Focussing on Areas of Greatest Health Priority

A number of determinants, risk factors or behaviours and health issues have been identified as priorities for health promotion action. It is important to determine action areas which support national and state priorities while taking into account the current programs in Western Australia run through government and non-government organisations.

	1.2	Focus on nominated areas of high priority: Tobacco Smoking Control; Mental Health Promotion; Physical Activity and Indigenous Health.

#### PRIORITY AREAS

Healthway's health priority areas for 2000-2003 are not inclusive of all national and state priorities, but reflect those identified as a priority for Healthway when reviewed in 1998 (Corti et al 1998) (1). The selection of Healthway's priorities is driven by public health significance, scientific evidence and legislative mandate. They also take into account the current Western Australian programs and areas where alternative support may not be available.

#### PROGRESS REPORT

#### **GENERAL**

Position papers outlining Healthway's position and intent in relation to three of the high priority areas identified in our Strategic Plan 2000-2003 have been developed. These cover Tobacco Smoking Control, Mental Health and Physical Activity.

In addition, Healthway's newsletter has been re-designed with recent editions focussing on one of the priority health areas. To date special edition newsletters have been produced on tobacco smoking control and mental health. These newsletters feature Healthway's position papers as well as highlighting projects, research and sponsorships addressing each health issue.

A number of Healthway staff have been involved as members of the working parties of the Premier's Taskforce on Physical Activity. As a high priority area for Healthway it is expected that new initiatives in physical activity will emerge as a result of the deliberations of the Taskforce.

A seminar led by Professor Neville Owen, Professor of Health Psychology and Exercise Science at the University of Wollongong on 'Understanding How Environments Can Influence Physical Activity' was organised by Healthway in June.

In a new initiative launched this year a number of HEALTHWAY HEALTHY COMMUNITY EVENT sponsorships were allocated to some sport, but mainly arts festivals and events. This recognises that bringing people together to participate in and enjoy community events increases feelings of acceptance, self-worth and well-being. The *Healthway Healthy Community Event* message therefore highlights the importance of social interaction in promoting mental health.

Healthway's commitment to supporting activities which address priority health issues is evident in the budget allocations during the year. Of the total of \$14.5m of program funds available for 2000/2001, 51% was directed toward three of Healthway's high priority program areas – Physical Activity Promotion, Mental Health Promotion and Tobacco Smoking Control. Over 8% of total funding addressed indigenous health issues.

#### **HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAM**

Application forms for both the health project and research grants programs have been changed to draw attention to the high priority areas. This is intended to encourage relevant applications.

This year, three major tobacco control programs received support from the health program. They are SMARTER THAN SMOKING (youth), SAY NO TO SMOKES (Aboriginal), and TARGET 15 (adults). Overall, 54% of funds available for health projects this year has gone to a range of important tobacco control initiatives such as these.

In addition Healthway continues to bring together key players in tobacco control for regular "round table discussions" on new developments and key programs in the area.

To promote Aboriginal Health a number of new initiatives have been funded. These include FOODCENT\$ for Aboriginal communities which is be run through the Health Department. This builds on the very successful FOODCENT\$ project which was designed to help those on low budgets to plan, select and cook nutritious food. The program has already been adapted for a range of groups including Foodbank clients and the Vietnamese community.

YAMAJI NEWS newspaper, which has a wide Aboriginal readership throughout WA, has received support to include a four page health feature in the monthly newspaper. This provides easy to access and relevant health information for up to 4,000 readers. Smoking, mental health and diabetes have been the feature topics of special editions to date.

In an emerging area of health concern it is encouraging to note that the difficult area of mental health promotion is being addressed.

A number of small grants have been allocated to promote mental health among diverse populations. Examples of these are a RURAL AND REMOTE SURVIVAL KIT developed by the Youth Affairs Council, a program designed to train bilingual community workers to assist Muslim women suffering from depression and post natal depression and a program developed by Curtin University of Technology which focuses on the promotion of mental health among Year 11 students.

#### RESEARCH PROGRAM

In the research area, loadings were applied for assessment of project grants in the high priority areas of Tobacco Smoking Control, Physical Activity and Aboriginal Health. Applications for Starter Grants and the Visiting Fellow Program were restricted to those wishing to work in the four high priority areas.

Mental Health Promotion received the majority of the funding this year with new grants to Associate Professor Janca and his team at the University of WA for the DEVELOPMENT OF A CULTURALLY APPLICABLE APPROACH TO ABORIGINAL MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS; FROM ASSESSMENT TO PROMOTION OF MENTAL HEALTH". The mental health of young people is also the subject of a three (3) year grant awarded to Associate Professor Donna Cross at the Curtin University of Technology for MAXIMISING PARENT INVOLVEMENT IN SCHOOL – BASED BULLYING PREVENTION INTERVENTIONS. Dr Clare Roberts will be investigating CULTURALLY APPROPRIATE PREVENTIONS OF ABORIGINAL CHILDHOOD DEPRESSION AND ANXIETY" over three years with a focus on children.

The issue of passive smoking is of concern to Healthway. A starter grant titled EVALUATION OF EXPOSURE TO ENVIRONMENTAL TOBACCO SMOKE has been awarded to Mrs K Rumchev at Curtin University and a project grant awarded to Associate Professor Matthew Knuiman at The University of Western Australia will also consider passive smoking as part of a 3 year study on ASTHMA, LUNG FUNCTION, SMOKING AND PASSIVE SMOKING IN BUSSELTON.

Health Promotion research in physical activity will be strongly encouraged next year with some funding being earmarked for priority driven research in physical activity.

#### SPORT SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

During the report period the Sport Advisory Committee initiated a range of strategies focussing on priority areas. In particular, physical activity promotion received an increased level of funding. Overall, 16% of the sport sponsorship budget was allocated to projects promoting physical activity in the inactive, an increase of 4% from 1999/2000. A new BE ACTIVE GRANTS PROGRAM designed to explore ways to increase physical activity in the 31% of the population who are not regularly active has been launched. It is envisaged that up to four programs will receive support in the coming year.

A new HEALTHY CLUB SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM was also introduced. This program seeks to achieve a safe and healthy sporting environment for participants and spectators by encouraging clubs to adopt policies and practices that address a range of health issues. In the first round a total of 175 applications were received and 140 were recommended for sponsorship. Applications were received from clubs representing some 30 different sports.

In support of Healthway's aim to focus on the areas of greatest health priority, the SPORT SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM is working more closely with a number of state sporting associations to ensure proposals for sponsorship are more closely aligned to Healthway's key strategic direction. Of great assistance in this process is the Sponsorship Advisory Service, which has instigated a series of education and training seminars designed to assist organisations with the development of applications that better address priority areas.

#### ARTS SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Aboriginal arts and cultural events received 5% of the Arts Sponsorship budget in the past year. A diverse range of activities throughout the state were used to promote the *Respect Yourself – Respect Your Culture* message.

An event, presented for the first time, was the inaugural KEELA DREAMING FESTIVAL, sponsored through the Kellerberrin Progress Association. It featured leading indigenous performers such as Richard Walley, the Keela Dancers and Sally Morgan. The festival, which was alcohol and smoke free, showcased the rich local indigenous culture of the region and was so successful that organisers are keen to see it presented annually.

To address a continuing concern that, young people who attend live rock music concerts tend to smoke more than any other sector of the community, the highly successful group of projects sponsored through RTR FM — NEXT BIG THING, FRESH BLAST and FRESH CLASS continued to progress the gains made in making rock music venues smoke free. Such venues include an increasing number of hotels and licensed clubs

#### RACING SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

70% of the racing sponsorship program budget was allocated to the two priority health areas of Physical Activity with the *Be Active* message and Tobacco Control with *QUIT*, *SmokeFree WA* and *Smarter than Smoking*.

This year saw the expansion of Healthway's sponsorship of speedway and drag racing as naming right sponsor of the *QUIT* Motorplex at Kwinana. This provided high levels of exposure of the *QUIT* message to an audience which has significantly higher smoking rates than the general community.

The *Be Active* message has been used in 32% of the racing sponsorships mainly with harness and greyhound racing. This message is well targeted given that the prevalence of inadequate exercise has been found to be higher among patrons of racing events than among patrons of sport or arts events (2).

## 2. Getting to the Right People

Populations that experience social and economic disadvantage have greater risk of serious illness and premature death than most advantaged socio-economic groups. It is vital for health promotion to influence change to support improved health outcomes for those most in need. This involves delivering health promotion in those settings where people, live, work and play.

Key Goals	2.1	Focus on population groups in whom health inequalities exist while ensuring that priority areas are addressed.
	2.2	Utilise and expand settings that provide access to identified target groups.

#### PRIORITY TARGET GROUPS

Healthway has continued to focus on key settings and population groups where health inequalities exist. Key population groups include young people and particularly those who experience social inequality. Priority populations for Healthway over the next three years are as follows:

#### **Priority Populations**

Youth

Indigenous people

Rural and remote communities

Groups disadvantaged due to income or education

Groups with low health status

In each of Healthway's program areas, there has been an increased focus on getting to the right people. Young people as identified in the legislation continue to be a priority population for Healthway. In 2000/2001 Healthway has been active in working to support changes which impact on the health outcomes of these groups and ensure we deliver health promotion in the settings where these populations live, work and play.

#### PROGRESS REPORT

#### **GENERAL**

To ensure that applications for grants and sponsorships focus on priority populations Healthway has endeavoured to ensure that relevant groups are fully aware of the funding opportunities and the mechanisms for applying. To this end regional workshops have been run in Esperance, Geraldton and Carnarvon. These have attracted many interested groups from rural and remote communities as well as representatives from Aboriginal organisations. Grant writing workshops have also been run for those wishing to apply for health promotion project grants.

#### **HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAM**

Rural and remote populations were the focus of several of Healthway's health project grants during the past year. Examples include a grant of \$77,653 to the National Drug Research Institute for the evaluation of the effectiveness of the CARNARVON HEALTH AND MEN PROJECT (CHAMP), and \$79,950 to the Central Wheatbelt Public Health Unit for the BOWEL CANCER BEAT IT! Project.

ASTHMA FRIENDLY ALBANY is the catchy title of a new program being run by the Lower Great Southern Health Service. Aimed at increasing awareness of asthma and its correct management in the young, the workshops are being held with sport leaders, child care workers, pre-school teachers and other community leaders.

During the year approximately one third of the health project budget (over \$800,000) was allocated to programs involving young people. These included over \$30,000 provided for SMART grants allocated to a range of schools both primary and secondary, in metropolitan and regional areas. These grants enabled schools to implement smoking prevention campaigns that are designed by students, teachers and parents and involve the whole school community. Schools could apply for up to \$3,000 to run a range of smoking prevention strategies in their schools and community in support of the SMARTER THAN SMOKING campaign.

Young people are the target of the YOUTH ILLICIT DRUG PROGRAM jointly co-ordinated by WA Drug Strategy Office and Health Department of WA. The program was originally piloted in 1999 and assisted community groups to organise youth friendly events which aimed to reduce the uptake and use of drugs. The next stage of this program will build on these aspects and will incorporate training of community groups and the distribution of youth illicit drug educational resources.

Bega Garnbirringu Health Service received joint funding from Healthway and the Kulunga Research Network to develop a comprehensive antenatal and early postnatal health education program that can be used by Aboriginal health workers with indigenous women within the Kalgoorlie/Boulder region. The program will have broader application for other indigenous communities.

#### RESEARCH PROGRAM

New research scholarships are being offered to Aboriginal people to pursue further studies in health promotion as well as ensuring vital research is carried out among Aboriginal communities.

Dr Deborah Lehmann at the Institute for Child Health Research has received a further three year grant to continue her work with Aboriginal babies and young children in the Goldfields area enabling qualitative and quantitative studies of Otitis Media to be carried out.

To encourage research in rural and remote populations links have been strengthened with the Combined Universities Centre for Rural Health and Edith Cowan University Bunbury Campus.

In addition, a research starter grant was funded to Ms Naomi Ralph from Kimberley Aboriginal Medical Services Council titled A STUDY OF THE MENTAL HEALTH AND WELL BEING OF KIMBERLEY ABORIGINAL YOUTH AND COMMUNITY.

This year's Visiting Healthway Research Fellow also included seminars at the major rural centres of Bunbury, Albany, Geraldton and Carnarvon.

The health behaviours and attitudes of young people are the focus of three research scholarships awarded in the past year. Young people's attitudes to anti-drug messages is a topical research project which was awarded to Edith Cowan University Scholarship recipient Ms Fiona Perman. Curtin University student, Ms Liane McDermott's scholarship will enable her to investigate potential intervention strategies to reduce sun tan desirability and promote sun protective behaviour among young people. Yolanda Pintobona, also based at Curtin University, was awarded a scholarship titled BULLYING IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS: PSYCHOLOGICAL AND HEALTH OUTCOMES OF AN INTERVENTION TRIAL.

#### SPORT SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

The COUNTRY SPORT AND RECREATION CO-ORDINATORS SCHEME has been expanded following on from the success of the initial scheme where two positions were created in the central and central south regions of the wheatbelt. Healthway funded a further two groups of local government authorities to establish community sport and recreation co-ordinator positions. Promoting the *Be Active* message the objective of these sponsorships is to increase opportunities for physical activity amongst rural and remote communities.

Healthway also continued to sponsor the Department of Sport and Recreation's SPORTSFUN PROGRAM with the objective of increasing the number of country schools involved in the program. Designed to develop leadership skills and encourage sport participation, this program has been able to reach increasing numbers of country youth as a result of Healthway sponsorship.

Young people from rural and remote locations have also benefited from support to the DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOLS COUNTRY WEEK, COUNTRY SCHOLARSHIPS and STATE ASSOCIATION REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS.

The HEALTHY CLUB SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM attracted a large number of applications from rural and remote clubs. Some 34% of applications came from the country, with the same percentage being successful.

Within the sport setting 45% of sponsorships support projects aimed at basic skill development and increasing participation in traditional sports through school or club level activities. There were however an increasing number of applications which supported youth oriented extreme sports – activities which do not fall under the "traditional" sport umbrella but those which tend to attract the hard to reach and often "at risk" young people.

The Sport Sponsorship Program has continued and expanded programs which reach indigenous people. Examples include:

- CLONTARF FOOTBALL ACADEMY. Having supported the establishment of the program
  in 2000, Healthway provided a second year of sponsorship in 2001. The program has
  more than doubled the number of Aboriginal youth enrolled in regular classes at Clontarf
  and has also provided an opportunity to reach a high priority group with the Smarter than
  Smoking message.
- GARNDUWA. Healthway's continued sponsorship of a range of sport development programs co-ordinated by Garnduwa ensures that Aboriginal communities across the Kimberley are exposed to the No Grog No Play message.
- GERALDTON SPORTING ABORIGINAL CORPORATION. Continued sponsorship of STREETSPORT over a number of years has resulted not only in an increasing number of sporting options being provided to Aboriginal people in and around Geraldton but has also created a very strong partnership between the Geraldton Sporting Aboriginal Corporation and the Mid West Public Health Unit.

#### ARTS SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

The SPONSORSHIP INCENTIVE SCHEME (SIS) continued with sponsorship of \$120,000 offered to five new projects and two which had been supported last year. The scheme encourages major arts organisations to introduce new and innovative projects which will reach Healthway's priority populations through arts and cultural activities. One of the new SIS programs funded was the BSX BLACK SWAN YOUNG PEOPLE'S THEATRE PROGRAM. This enabled young people to take part in workshops and performances covering all aspects of theatre production. The program will also travel to Karratha, Roebourne and Port Hedland where it will involve Aboriginal youth.

Young people and their interest in modern music again provided avenues for sponsorship with a number of new initiatives being sponsored. A pilot program co-ordinated by Arts WA and involving a number of other strategic partners received \$100,000 towards the development of the WA DRUG AND ALCOHOL-FREE ALL-AGES EVENTS funding program. The pilot will involve young people in five regional and three metropolitan centres organising, managing and presenting a series of live music activities for their peers.

Another new initiative involving young people was sponsorship of the UWA Student Guild for the ORIENTATION DAY CELEBRATIONS which included leading DJs and rock bands and promoted the *Drug Aware* message to the 9,000 patrons. Evaluation at the concert showed 85% were aware of the health message and the majority of the audience understood that *Drug Aware* meant being well informed about drugs and their effects.

In a further effort to reach the right people a number of major arts organisations have introduced schemes to facilitate access to productions to low socio-economic groups. These include the WA Ballet which has introduced JUMP START PROGRAM which encourages "at risk" youth to attend dress rehearsals free of charge and the Black Swan Theatre Company which provided free tickets to students from five country towns to see "Away".

#### RACING SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

The *Smarter than Smoking* message has been linked to motor racing events through continued sponsorship of JUNIOR SEDAN RACING. This year Healthway has sponsored five new country speedway tracks where youth are involved in junior sedan racing. Currently there are over sixty (60) young drivers being targeted with a tobacco control message through these sponsorships. This has been complemented with a new sponsorship of JUNIOR DRAGSTERS at the QUIT Kwinana Motorplex. Both of these sports are increasing in popularity among the young and providing excellent opportunities to promote the *Smarter than Smoking* message.

A significant development during the year has been Healthway sponsorship for the first time of a number of country speedway venues. Whilst the *QUIT* message has high profile at the metropolitan speedway venue, *SmokeFree WA* has also been used in the country. Rural audiences are also targeted through continued sponsorship of karting as well as country turf and trotting clubs.

The value of sponsoring country trotting events is being measured through research conducted at Harvey Trots to discover the benefits to the individual and the community. The three highest benefits reported indicated that trotting is a social event, a family outing and provides economic benefits through part time work. Over 95% of survey participants indicated that the benefits of the trots were either very important or reasonably important from the viewpoint of the Harvey community as a whole.



# 3. Sharing the Responsibility

Healthway does not directly deliver health promotion programs but works to promote health through a range of settings and organisations including health, sports, arts, racing, recreation, community, education and workplaces. Successful health promotion must engage a number of settings and will involve a diverse range of partners.

Key Goals	3.1	Build strategic alliances with sectors, settings and organisations that have the potential to make substantial contributions to health gain.

#### PROGRESS REPORT

#### **GENERAL**

The encouragement of new partners and co-funders has seen a number of new relationships established.

Funding partners have included the Lotteries Commission, Department of Sport and Recreation, Arts WA, Office of Aboriginal Health, Youth Affairs, Rio Tinto, WA Drug Abuse Strategy Office, Channel 31, Fruit Growers Association and others.

#### **HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAM**

Organisations which apply to Healthway are encouraged through the health project guidelines to seek partners in order to provide expertise and skills to the project or co-funding.

New projects which have been jointly funded include TARGET 15 which has support from Healthway, the Health Department and the Cancer Foundation, and the DRUGS IN SPORT PROJECT which receives its funding from the WA Drug Abuse Strategy Office, Department of Sport and Recreation and the Sports Commission as well as Healthway.

Other example include the Kidsafe HOT WATER BURNS LIKE FIRE PROJECT which involved joint funding with corporate bodies such as Nescafe, 94.5FM and FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES AUTHORITY. The School Canteen Association has also developed strong links with corporate food companies as well as partnerships with the National Heart Foundation and Health Department of WA.

A partnership with the School Drug Education Project (SDEP) saw Healthway administering SDEP grants on behalf of that program. This involved the processing of over 130 applications from schools with 86 receiving grants. While Healthway provided administration assistance for these grants, the funding came from a Commonwealth Government Grant to the School Drug Education Program. In the interest of cross government co-operation, Healthway was delighted to assist with this initiative, which supports and reinforces Healthway's objectives.

#### RESEARCH PROGRAM

The partnership approach has been encouraged through the Research Program with applicants strongly encouraged to include a health promotion practitioner on the research team. This helps ensure that research results are readily translated into practice once the research is completed.

Research teams are also encouraged to form links with community groups in undertaking research projects. This is particularly important for those teams working with Aboriginal people. We have now supported several grants to explore issues related to Aboriginal mental health, where university based research teams are working closely with Aboriginal communities and Aboriginal medical services to share responsibility.

Healthway maintains a mailing list of over 700 interested contacts who receive information about upcoming seminars, opportunities for funding and copies of the Action Health Newsletter. Each year Healthway conducts a number of workshops to showcase Healthway funded health projects and research, sessions on grant writing and public seminars which capitalise on visiting experts to WA.

Action Health is a bi annual newsletter distributed to the health promotion/public health community via email, website and hard copy. The newsletter aims to link research and practice by providing information about new research and project funding, updates on results of funded projects and putting researchers and practitioners in touch with current practice and visiting experts.

#### SPORT SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Healthway continued to expand its involvement in the sport sector by offering opportunities to an ever-increasing range of organisations. In the report period 711 applications were received with 88% of the successful projects being small community based sponsorships of under \$5,000. The successful organisations represented over 40 different sport types and a range of different recreation activities.

#### ARTS SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

A strategic partnership has been developed with Country Arts WA whereby \$30,000 was allocated to a minimum of 10 youth oriented organisations to plan, organise and present an arts/cultural event in regional WA. With Country Arts WA personnel mentoring the young people on the ground this initiative has not only encouraged the development of skills and event management practices, it has also increased the level of arts and cultural activity in regional WA and promoted the 100% Control Respect Yourself message.

In a new partnership with the North Metropolitan Health Service Population Unit an innovative play promoting healthy eating habits in primary school students was sponsored. MR PICKLES MAKES A FRESH START was performed at some 80 schools in the North Metropolitan region and proved to be highly entertaining as well as informative.

In another joint initiative with Arts WA, Healthway was active in supporting the arts component of a number of Australia Day celebrations. Concerts promoting the *Smokefree* message were held as far a field as Gnowangerup and Shark Bay, Geraldton, Mandurah and Boddington.

#### RACING SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Healthway has developed many new partnerships during the year including working closely with police units to carry out blood alcohol checks at various speedway sponsorships.

In promoting the health message at racing events, Healthway has worked in conjunction with a number of commercial organisations including the Fruit Growers Association, Avocado Association and Spices Catering.

Strong links have also been established with the media. Racing sponsorships have featured regularly on Access television (Channel 31), Racing Radio and numerous local and country radio stations.



## 4. Sustaining the Impact

As an organisation which provides project based funding it is important to build sustainability into project development to maximise and prolong the impact of Healthway grants and sponsorships.

#### PROGRESS REPORT

#### **HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAM**

Applicants in receipt of health promotion project grants are asked to consider at the time of application how their project may be sustained beyond Healthway funding. For example, training components within projects such as PROMOTING ADOLESCENT SEXUAL HEALTH (PASH) and FOODCENT\$ ensure the impact of the project remains as trained leaders continue their work in the community beyond the actual grant completion date. In addition, the encouragement by Healthway of matched funding by organisations helps ensure sustainability,

The HEALTHWAY HEALTHY COMMUNITY PILOT PROJECTS established at Dongara/Denison and Narrogin are addressing the issue of sustainability with their host agencies – the local shires and public health units. The issue of sustainability remains on the agenda of all planning meetings to ensure that there will be strategies developed by 2003 when the funding ends.

As part of both the application and reporting requirements for health project grants, organisations provide detail on how their programs will be sustained and how the outcomes of the project will be shared with others. Organisations which have received a health project grant are encouraged to disseminate findings from their programs through presentations and reports and to link in with other groups working in similar areas.

#### **RESEARCH PROGRAM**

The research program requires applicants to include a health promotion practitioner on the research team. This link to practice ensures that research findings can readily be incorporated into programs. An example is the Combined Universities Centre which was funded for a research project titled THE PROMOTION OF PHYSICAL ACTIVITY AMONGST RURAL CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS. The Centre joined forces with health promotion practitioners from the Heart Foundation to ensure their research outcomes have strong links to health promotion practice.

The encouragement of wide dissemination of research results ensures that information is easily accessed and hopefully acted upon.

To date, the results of Healthway funded research have been presented at 209 local seminars, 199 national seminars and 141 international seminars. Further, there have been 210 publications of Healthway funded research in referred journals.

#### SPORT SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

The HEALTHY CLUB SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM which involves clubs developing policies which lead to healthier environments is one strategy which leads to sustainable structural change. There is no evidence to show that once healthy policies have been introduced the organisations revert back to the previous policies once sponsorship ceases. This leads to sustainable healthy change.

Evaluation of the effect of long-term Healthway sponsorship on health promotion and sport delivery outcomes produced mixed results:

- Eight sports were chosen to represent a range of sponsorship funding levels. In general, awareness and comprehension of the health message promoted by each sport increased over time.
- Few of the sports undertook comprehensive initiatives to improve the health of their members beyond their sponsorship requirements or linked promoting the health of their membership with their Healthway sponsorships.

In order to address the latter point and gain more sustainable health promotion benefits, a workshop involving a number of key sporting organisations and personnel from health agencies was held. This has resulted in strategies for sustainability being incorporated into sport sponsorship plans.



# 5. Building Capacity for Health

Effective health promotion must build the capacity of individuals, organisations, communities and environments so that they can take on and sustain health promotion.

Healthway continues to offer developmental and financial support to encourage leadership and building capacity in these areas.

Key Goals	5.1	Strengthen the capacity of individuals to improve their health.

#### PROGRESS REPORT

#### **HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAM**

The Health Advisory Committee allocated an additional \$10,000 to this area to enable the development of a new initiative, CAPACITY BUILDING SCHOLARSHIPS. To date, nine of these scholarships have been awarded to enable project co-ordinators and health sponsorship officers to present their work at conferences, or attend workshops which will provide them with valuable skills to assist them in their work. Under development is an exciting new initiative in health promotion leadership, which will be introduced in the next financial year. This initiative supports another Healthway funded program which enables graduates to gain practical health promotion experience, the Australian Health Promotion Association co-ordinated Scholarships and Traineeships.

HEALTH + MEDICINE, the health supplement of The West Australian newspaper, has also been supported in this year. This offers an outlet for health organisations around the state to provide information to the public in a credible and easily accessible format, while raising the profile of the organisations and the work that they do.

In a recent telephone survey of two hundred and twenty readers of the HEALTH + MEDICINE supplement, encouragingly 40% of readers reported having actually changed what they did in relation to their health behaviour as a result of reading a relevant article in the supplement. This is an excellent example of building capacity for health.

The Combined Universities Centre for Rural Health was provided with funding for five scholarships for indigenous participants undertaking the Graduate Certificate in Indigenous Health Promotion. Due to the increasing demand for these scholarships a further eight scholarships will be available in 2002.

#### **RESEARCH PROGRAM**

Capacity building initiatives in the research program include the VISITING RESEARCH FELLOW PROGRAM. This year the Visiting Research Fellow was Professor Gordon MacDonald from the University of Glamorgan in Wales. Through his visit and the many site visits and seminars in both metropolitan and country centres, professional development was facilitated for a large number of health promotion practitioners and researchers.

Other programs which have been maintained include RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS and FELLOWSHIPS as well as the STARTER GRANT PROGRAM to which new researchers or experienced researchers embarking on new research topics may apply. Seven starter grants totalling \$138,024 were awarded this year.

To encourage research grant applicants to support the development of research capacity, applicants are required to outline the opportunities their program will provide for capacity building. To date there have been 48 Masters, 46 PHDs awarded and 155 other opportunities for professional development arising from Healthway funded research.

Seminars run by Healthway provide opportunities for those involved in Healthway funded research and projects to present on work in progress as well as report on finished projects. These provide valuable opportunities to develop presentation skills as well as share information with peers.

#### SPORT SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Healthway, in conjunction with the Healthway Sponsorship Advisory Service, has participated in a range of training programs and seminars designed to increase the knowledge and skills of organisations applying to Healthway for sponsorship and those seeking to better manage the sponsorships they have received. In particular, a recent focus has been on the development and implementation of healthy policies.

#### ARTS SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

As well as general regional visits to promote Healthway's funding opportunities the Arts Program Manager has participated in joint presentations to potential arts applicants along with other funding authorities. For example a seminar for Aboriginal people was held in Geraldton and involved contributions from Arts WA, Lotteries Commission, Community Arts Network WA, Country Arts WA and the Artists' Foundation as well as Healthway.

#### **RACING SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM**

Through the Sponsorship Advisory Service, representatives of many racing organisations have attended seminars and professional development workshops on marketing, proposal writing and evaluation. As a result, the quality of racing applications has improved.

The Healthy Catering Guidelines have been widely used by racing organisations resulting in an increase in the range of healthy food choices offered at racing venues.



# **HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAMS – The year in review**

Healthway's health promotion program encompasses a number of areas including:

- Health Promotion Projects
- Health Promotion Research
- Promoting Health Through Sponsorship including Sport, Arts and Racing.

Healthway's definition of health promotion as "the combination of educational and environmental supports for action and conditions of living conducive to health" (1) has been expanded in the guidelines to indicate that applications to Healthway should "aim to increase individual knowledge and skills, and change behaviour and community and organisational policies and environments to improve health".

This acknowledges the importance of viewing the health of people not only as individuals, but also taking into account the environment in which they live, work and play.

#### **HEALTH PROMOTION PROJECTS**

#### **Objectives**

- To fund activities related to the promotion of good health in general, with particular emphasis on young people.
- To provide grants to organisations engaged in health promotion programs.

Tobacco Control Act 1990, Section 22 (1) (c)

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Health promotion organisations, as well as community based groups, may apply for grants to fund new approaches to health promotion and illness prevention that will change community attitudes and behaviour and create environments in which good health is encouraged.

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#### Features of the 2000/2001 Health Promotion Program

Seventy four health promotion project applications were received with 48 being approved for an amount of \$2.4m. Some were funded for up to three years. Included in this total are the multiple year commitments from previous grants.

- 29% of funds were allocated to projects specifically addressing children and/or adolescents, with 28% to projects for all age groups.
- 84% of the projects have a statewide reach, with 14% of funds exclusively directed to country areas and only 2% to metropolitan based projects.
- Analysis of the distribution of funding by health issue in 2000/2001 shows that over half (56%) of the total funding was allocated to the high priority area of tobacco smoking control. Alcohol/drug abuse control received 13% of the funding with good nutrition promotion receiving 10%. The allocation to the general area of health promotion (6%) included project funding, student scholarships and the award winning Health + Medicine Supplement in The West Australian newspaper.
- The cumulative allocation to health projects from 1991-2001 shows that tobacco smoking control accounts for 25% of the total allocation with 13% going to alcohol/drug abuse control.

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#### Features of the 2000/2001 Research Program

- The total research budget for 2000/2001 was \$2.290 million, of which \$914,122 was available for new grants and starter grants. The remaining monies were committed to previously allocated multiple-year grants and capacity building opportunities.
- Thirty six project grant applications were received with 28 proceeding to external assessment and nine being approved for funding.
- In the starter grants program 22 applications were received, with seven being approved for a total of \$138,024.
- It is pleasing to note that over 29% of the total allocation was directed to mental health promotion and just over 10% to tobacco smoking control which are two of Healthway's high priority areas. Around 14% of the research budget was allocated to research into the prevention of alcohol/drug related problems and over 11% have been allocated to research on the determinants of healthy behaviour.
- Of particular note is the amount of funding which has been allocated to research projects specifically addressing indigenous communities. Over the last ten years Healthway has allocated almost \$2 million or 9.4% of the total research budget to indigenous health promotion research. The allocation to indigenous research has doubled over the last year reflecting Healthway's commitment to funding health promotion research in indigenous communities.
- Over the last ten years health promotion research grants have been allocated in all of Healthway's priority areas.
- Three Healthway Scholarships were awarded in 2000/2001 increasing the total number of Healthway scholarships provided to date to 17. The three successful candidates are Ms Fiona Perman from Edith Cowan University who is studying YOUNG PEOPLE'S ATTITUDES TO ANTI-DRUG MESSAGES: DOES EXPERIMENTATION WITH MARIJUANA REDUCE SOURCE AND MESSAGE CREDIBILITY, Ms Lianne McDermott from Curtin University of Technology who's research is titled AN INVESTIGATION OF POTENTIAL INTERVENTION STRATEGIES TO REDUCE SUNTAN DESIRABILITY AND PROMOTE SUN PROTECTIVE BEHAVIOUR AMONG YOUNG PEOPLE and Ms Yolanda Pintabona also from Curtin University of Technology who is studying BULLYING IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS: PSYCHOLOGICAL AND HEALTH OUTCOMES OF AN INTERVENTION TRIAL.



# PROMOTING HEALTH THROUGH SPONSORSHIP

#### **Objective**

 To support sporting and arts activities which encourage healthy lifestyles and advance health promotion programs.

The Sponsorship Program includes sponsorship of sport, arts and racing activities which encourage healthy lifestyles and advance health promotion programs.

The Health Promotion aspects of the sponsorship program are undertaken by key health agencies which act as "support sponsors" or alternatively in the case of smaller value sponsorships by kits administered by Healthway.

#### Impact of the Sponsorship Program

Comprehensive evaluation of the sponsorship program continues through the Health Promotion Evaluation Unit. A summary of major findings of research carried out during the past year indicates:

#### **Sponsorship Monitor Results**

- Health message awareness at Healthway sponsored events remains at 77% (2).
- Message comprehension remains high with over 93% of those who were aware of the message correctly understanding it (1).
- Some 9% of the total sample were sufficiently stimulated to take some relevant action as a result of exposure to a health message (1).

As in previous years, this study confirms the effectiveness of sponsorship as a strategy to achieve high prompted awareness, comprehension and acceptance of a health message at sport, arts and racing events. It also confirms that sponsorship can achieve self-reported behaviour change.

#### Sponsorship in relation to risk factors, stages of change and sponsor type

- Among audiences at Healthway sponsored events 32% of adults and 9% of teenagers were classified as smokers. While almost 40% of the smokers were not thinking about giving up, 40% were considering it and 17% were trying to give up at the time of the survey (2).
- Overall 48% of adults and 32% of teenagers surveyed at Healthway sponsored events were classified as unsafe drinkers. Unsafe drinking was most prevalent among adults and teens attending rock music events (87% and 56% respectively) compared to those attending other types of events. Overall, behaviour in relation to alcohol reduction appeared to be most resistant to change. The proportion of unsafe drinkers not thinking of changing was very high (2).
- Overall 40% of respondents at Healthway sponsored events did not meet current exercise requirements (2).
- Sixty per cent (60%) of respondents reported having been sunburnt in the previous 12 months in each of the three years of the sponsorship monitor. Over 30% of those surveyed indicated that they were ready to take action to reduce sunburn and a further 40% reported always minimising their exposure to the sun in summer. Overall the response to the question about sunburn was most encouraging with the greatest proportion of those with high risk behaviour either attempting to change or having recently changed their behaviour (2).
- The proportion of those who consume less than the recommended amounts of both fruit and vegetables remains at 42%. Approximately one third of these were not thinking of changing their behaviour. This study found a high prevalence of high risk behaviours among audiences at sport, arts and racing events sponsored by Healthway (2).

The higher prevalence of some behaviours, such as smoking, compared to the WA population, indicates that sponsorships are reaching important target audiences and provides support for Healthway's endeavours to promote healthy behaviours among these audiences.

#### **Observational Audits at Sponsored Events**

 Perimeter signs and verbal acknowledgement were associated with greater audience awareness of the health message compared to projects that did not use these strategies (3).

The study suggested that the quality of promotional strategies such as visibility and placement may be more important than the number of strategies used (3).

#### Features of the 2000-2001 Sponsorship Program

- The sponsorship program received applications which requested amounts of over \$18m in the past year. Some 1160 applications were received with 843 or 73% being supported for a total of \$8,168,380.

Healthway sponsors sport and recreation programs which encourage development and participation as well as events, competitions and special programs which offer opportunities to promote health. Not less than 30% of the total funds received by Healthway were paid to sport organisations amounting to \$4.8m.

- In line with Healthway identifying young people as an important target audience some 53% of the funds was allocated to projects involving youth while 43% went to adult activities.
- Analysis by gender shows that 53% of funds went to activities involving male participation, with 47% being allocated to activities including females.
- The vast majority of funds were allocated to programs with statewide influence (77%) while 12% went directly to country and the remaining 11% to metropolitan activities.
- Sport development projects received the largest proportion of funds (75%). Fourteen
  percent went to promotional activities with 13% of funds going to the smaller value
  sponsorships which include ME NO FRY SUMMER SPORT and the new HEALTHY
  CLUB SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM. Indeed these two programs which are targeted to
  club level provided funds to more than 400 individual clubs in the past year.

#### ARTS SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Healthway sponsors arts activities which provide opportunities for health promotion and access to a wide range of audiences. Arts organisations receive not less than 15% of the total funds disbursed by Healthway.

#### Features of the 2000/2001 Arts Sponsorship Program

- The Arts Advisory Committee met seven times to consider 393 applications for sponsorship. This reflected a 17% increase in the number of applications compared to the previous year. Of the 393 applications 231 or 59% were approved.
- Arts organisations applied for sponsorships amounting to almost \$5m, twice as much as the funding available for distribution.
- Over 40% of applications were for amounts under \$5,000 and some 62% of these
  applications received support. This number shows a decrease of 9% on last year and
  was primarily due to the requirement that organisations could submit only one application
  to the Arts Sponsorship Program per year. This meant that a number of organisations
  grouped a number of events and activities within one application and requested a larger
  amount.
- Programs that had statewide reach received 33% of arts sponsorship funds. In addition, 23% was directly allocated toward programs involving exhibitions, theatre and music performances as well as community arts activities and festivals that took place outside the metropolitan area.

 Recent research confirms that those who attend modern music events have higher prevalence of smoking than other Healthway sponsored activities (1).

In addition, unsafe drinking was most common amongst adults and teens attending rock music events compared to those attending other types of events. This clearly justifies Healthway's pro-active sponsorship initiatives in this area. In the past year over 12% of funds was allocated to activities which engaged young people in modern music programs.

- Overall 38% of the arts program budget was allocated to activities involving children and adolescents.
- Some 40% of the arts budget was allocated to major arts organisations for their annual programs with an additional \$120,000 or 5% being offered for the SPONSORSHIP INCENTIVE SCHEME (SIS).

# Features of the 2000-2001 Racing Sponsorship Program

- The Racing Advisory Committee met six times and considered 56 applications of which 39 or 70% were supported.
- Racing sponsorships were distributed across four key health issues:

- The new nutrition message *Enjoy Healthy Eating* replaced *Eat More Fruit 'n' Veg* at all of the turf racing sponsorships.
- Sponsorship of the new QUIT Kwinana Motorplex achieved an unprompted recall of 60% of the *QUIT* message. In addition, 48% of patrons correctly identified QUIT as the naming rights sponsor of the QUIT Motorplex. These results were seen as encouraging after only four months of sponsorship.

# **CORPORATE SERVICES**

During the year, a number of enhancements and upgrades continued to be undertaken in Corporate Services in order to directly improve the level of support services provided to Healthway and its customers.

Key areas included a review of and improvements to the structure of the information technology network and hardware, upgrading of the grant management database, introduction of a new management accounting system called SUN and continued improvements in records management.

In addition, the Customer Service Charter was updated and the Healthway Code of Conduct was reviewed and reissued to Board, Committee and Staff Members.

### **Training and Development**

In 2000/2001 focus was placed on supporting staff through various development programs. Staff were offered a number of training opportunities and many staff also enhanced their software package skills.

Healthway also supports secondment opportunities for staff that will result in development of skills and competencies. During 2000/2001 one staff member has undertaken this type of professional development.

### Equal employment opportunity and valuing diversity

Healthway maintained its equal employment opportunity plan and diversity policy. Healthway executive management team is represented by three senior women and three senior men in management.

In addition to reflecting these policies in Healthway's work practices, the value of diversity is also recognised in the composition of the Board and Advisory Committees. During 2000/2001 increased diversity and gender balance continued to be encouraged on both the Board and Committees.

The provision of health promotion grants, research, scholarships and fellowships in key areas of Aboriginal health were also encouraged during the year.

# Workers' compensation claims

There were no workers' compensation claims lodged in 2000/2001.

### Regional customers

Healthway continued to focus on regional and remote communities as identified in the Strategic Plan. Regional visits were also undertaken in both Northern and Southern regions to increase awareness of Healthway's health promotion programs and funding opportunities in rural communities.

Healthway consults widely with regional representatives, regional health units and local government to ensure that programs are closely aligned to community expectations and are relevant to community needs.

#### Freedom of Information

No freedom of information applications were received during the year.

#### **Disability Services Plan**

Healthway has reviewed its Disability Services Plan and will be implementing additional procedures to ensure that people with disabilities are able to communicate and participate in Healthway's initiatives and programs.

Healthway also recognises people with disabilities in its sponsorship guidelines and provides funding to sporting and other groups involved with disabled people.

### Young People-Health and Well Being

Healthway has identified young people as a specific priority target group within its Strategic Plan. Accordingly, Healthway supports the promotion of health and well being of young people through a number of grant and sponsorship approaches. Grants are provided to undertake research and health promotion projects across a range of areas including mental health, smoking, drug use and nutrition as they impact on young people.

Widespread sponsorships are provided to agencies including schools as well as sport and arts organisations which target young people. These promote appropriate health messages including safe drinking and discouraging drug use and smoking.

Healthway will continue to provide funding where health promotion opportunities exist to reach young people.

## **Waste Paper Recycling**

Healthway has continued to actively maintain a paper recycling process. This involves optimising on opportunities to ensure that waste paper is recycled within the office or forwarded to paper recycling operators.

#### 1 Significant Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements. Unless otherwise stated these policies are consistent with those adopted in the preceding year.

#### (a) General

- (i) The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Financial Administration and Audit Act 1985.
- (ii)

  The statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting using the historical cost convention, with the exception of certain non-current assets which subsequent to initial recognition, have been measured on the fair value basis in accordance with the option under AAS 38(5.1) (see notes 1(t), 22 and 23).
- (iii) The accrual basis of accounting is being applied.
- (iv) The financial statements constitute a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and UIG Consensus Views as applied by the Treasurer's Instructions. Several of these are modified by the Treasurer's Instructions to vary the application, disclosure, format and wording. The Financial Administration and Audit Act and the Treasurer's Instructions are legislative provisions governing the preparation of financial statements and take precedence over Australian Accounting Standards and UIG Consensus Views. The modifications are intended to fulfil the requirements of general application to the public sector together with the need for greater disclosure and also to satisfy accountability requirements.

If any such modification has a material or significant financial effect upon the reported results, details of that modification and where practicable, the resulting financial effect is disclosed in individual notes to these financial statements.

#### (b) Depreciation of non-current assets

All non-current assets having a limited useful life are systematically depreciated in a manner which reflects the consumption of their service potential.

Depreciation is provided for on the straight line basis, using rates which are reviewed annually. Useful lives for each class of depreciable assets are:

Motor Vehicles 10 years
Furniture, Fixtures and Fittings 5 to 20 years
Office Equipment 5 to 20 years
Computing Equipment 3 years

#### (c) Inventories

Inventories are valued on an average cost basis.

#### (d) Employee Entitlements

#### (i) Provision for Annual and Long Service Leave

The Provision for annual leave represents the amount which Healthway has a present obligation to pay resulting from employees' services provided up to reporting date. The provision has been calculated on current remuneration rates.

The liability for employee entitlements to long service leave represents the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made by the employer resulting from employees' services provided up to reporting date.

Liabilities for employee entitlements which are not expected to be settled within twelve months are discounted using the rates attaching to national government securities at balance date, which most closely match the terms of maturity of the related liabilities.

In determining the liability for employee entitlements, consideration has been given to future increases in remuneration and experience with staff departures. Related on-costs have been included in the liability.

This methold of measurement of the liability is consistent with the requirements of Australia Accounting Standard AAS 30 "Accounting for Employee Entitlements".

#### (ii) Superannuation

Staff may contribute to Gold State Superannuation scheme, a defined benefits pension scheme now closed to new members. All staff who do not contribute to this scheme become non-contributory members of the West State Superannuation Scheme, an accumulation fund complying with the Commonwealth Government's Superannuation Guarantee (Administration) Act 1992.

The liabilities for superannuation charges under the Gold State Superannuation Scheme and West State Superannuation Scheme are extinguished by quarterly payments of employer contributions to the Government Employees Superannuation Board.

The note disclosure required by paragraph 51(e) of AAS 30 (being the employer's share of the difference between employees' accrued superannuation benefits and the attributable net market value of plan assets) has not been provided, as State scheme deficiencies are recognised by the State in its whole of government reporting. Further, the Government Employees Superannuation Board's records are not structured to provide the information for Healthway. Accordingly, deriving the information for Healthway is impractical under current arrangements, and thus any benefits thereof would be exceeded by the cost of obtaining the information.

#### (e) Leases

The Authority has entered into operating lease arrangements for the rent of the office building and photocopiers where the lessor effectively retains all of the risks and benefits incident to ownership of the items held under the operating leases. Equal instalments of the lease payments are charged to the Statement of Financial Performance over the lease term as this is representative of the pattern of benefits to be derived from the leased property.

#### (f) Formation of the Foundation

The Western Australian Health Promotion Foundation is a statutory authority established under Section 15 of the Tobacco Control Act, 1990. The Act was proclaimed on 8 February 1991. Until the end of July 1997, funding was received from the Consolidated Fund via a levy on the receipts of the Commissioner of State Revenue from the Business Franchise (Tobacco) Act 1975. In August 1997, the High Court of Australia determined that the States of Australia did not have the constitutional power to impose business franchise fees on the sale of fuel, tobacco and alcohol. This extinguished Healthway's principal sources of revenue. The Western Australian State Government amended the Tobacco Control Act to provide funding to Healthway directly from the Consolidated Fund thus ensuring Healthway's continued operations.

For the purposes of AAS16 Accounting Standard "Segment Reporting", Healthway operates predominantly in one industry being the provision of grants and sponsorships to the Western Australian community for activities related to the promotion of good health in general, with particular emphasis on youth. The revenue that Healthway receives in relation to this comes predominantly from the Consolidated Fund.

#### (g) Funding Arrangements

The funding arrangements are in accordance with Section 26 of the Tobacco Control Act 1990.

#### (h) Receivables, Payables, Accrued Salaries

Receivables are recognised at the amounts receivable and are due for settlement no more than 30 days from the date of recognition.

Payables, including accruals not yet billed, are recognised when the economic entity becomes obliged to make future payments as a result of a purchase of assets or services. Payables are generally settled within 30 days.

Accrued salaries represent the amount due to staff but unpaid at the end of the financial year as the end of the last pay period for that financial year does not coincide with the end of the financial year. Healthway considers the carrying amount approximates net fair value.

#### (i) Appropriations

Appropriations in the nature of revenue, whether recurrent or capital, are recognised as revenues in the period in which they are payable to Healthway from the appropriated funds. Appropriations which are repayable by the Authority to the Treasurer are recognised as liabilities.

#### (j) Net Fair Values of Financial Assets and Liabilities

Net fair values of financial instruments are determined on the following bases:

Monetary financial assets and liabilities not traded in an organised financial market - cost basis carrying amounts of accounts receivable, accounts payable and accruals (which approximates net market value);

Leave liabilities - current risk adjusted market rates.

Healthway has no financial assets where the carrying amount exceeds net fair value at balance date. The aggregate net fair values and carrying amounts of financial assets and financial liabilities are disclosed in the Statement of Financial Position and the notes to and forming part of these financial statements.

### (k) Cash Resources

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash resources includes funds held at Treasury and cash on hand.

Since 1992/93 quantitative evaluative data on the outcomes of Healthway funded projects have been available from the Health Promotion Evaluation Unit (HPEU), formerly known as HPDEP, an independent group established to evaluate Healthway's programs, which is based at the University of Western Australia.

Each program area has been reported on in accordance with the performance measures established in Healthway's Strategic Plan.

#### **Definition of Terms**

Each of the performance measures should be read in conjunction with the meaning of the measure used. The definitions are as follows:

#### Contractual Evaluation Measure

Healthway has adopted a six-point scale under its Graduated Project Evaluation which has been developed through the HPEU. Each completed project receives a score.

#### Population Measure

The population measure reflects the number of persons involved with the project including organisers and performers, participants and spectators.

### Publicity Measure

Involvement of mass media is crucial to public health marketing. This measure includes the number of occasions that the project received publicity in print, radio and television.

#### Publication Measure

Refers to the number of reports and publications in refereed journals resulting from a project. This measure primarily relates to health promotion projects and research.

### Development Measure

Refers to the level of community involvement in a project.

#### Structural Measure

Records the advances made in the implementation of public health policy, which results directly from the project. For example the provision of smoke free areas, low alcohol beverages and other safe serving practices, shaded areas and sunscreen, healthy food choices or differential pricing in favour of healthy food choices, parking, ramps, seating, toilets and other facilities for the disabled, and the adoption of policies that encourage the participation of disadvantaged groups.

# Educational Exposure Measure

Refers to the level of personal communication/education about a health issue between the funding recipient and a participant. This could include classroom presentations and discussions, workshops, demonstrations as well as telephone or direct counselling services.

### Promotional Measures

Refers to the level of promotional activity within the project and includes general profile, personal acknowledgment, signage and interactive activities.

# **EFFECTIVENESS INDICATORS (Audited)**

Healthway's outcome is to increase individual knowledge and skills, and change behaviour and community and organisational policies and environments to improve health. This is achieved through health promotion projects, research, sponsorship and support sponsorship.

#### NOTES TO EFFECTIVENESS PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

### **Note 1 - Analysis of Project Evaluation Data**

An analysis has been undertaken using the evaluation data collated from all completed projects and sponsorships funded from 1 July 1997 to 30 June 1998 (Evaluated 2000/2001). The results form the basis of the effectiveness indicators for funded projects and sponsorships. A comparison is drawn using the evaluation data from all completed projects and sponsorships funded from 1 July 1996 to 30 June 1997 (Evaluated 1999/2000). Each year of data is weighted according to the four previous years of funding to allow for comparison. The change to reporting by financial years allows for changing program patterns which have varied considerably from year to year.

#### Note 2 - Statistical Sampling Technique Applied

Where discrete information by year is available, analysis is based on 100% sample of data contained in the Healthway Grants Management System (GMS).

# **Costing Model**

It has been recognised that the size, complexity and duration of a project is directly related to the administrative costs associated with a project. In order to more precisely determine project administrative costs and to monitor trends, the Board approved a costing model which determined and associated administrative costs relative to the processing complexity and dollar value of sponsorship and health promotion sponsorship funding.

The costing model is used to monitor progress relating to:

- Streamlining the processing and reducing the administrative costs of small sponsorships.
- Increasing access to small organisations, particularly country groups
- Increasing the number of applications under \$5,000
- Reducing the average administrative cost in project categories
- Reducing the overall administrative costs as a percentage of project costs.
