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PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

On behalf of the Board, I am pleased to present the Annual Report for the year ended 30 June 2007.

1. Board Participation

As always, I sincerely thank my fellow Board members, Ms Marie Matthews, consumer representative, Ms Maree Crouch, legal representative, and Dr's Holly Edwards, Graeme Ewers, Michael McGuinness and David Neesham for their dedication and commitment to the Dental Board of Western Australia. Our Registrar, Mr Wayne Clark, ably assisted by Kylie Reichelt and staff at HLB Mann Judd, continue to provide very professional support and management for the Board and its Members. This is absolutely essential as Board Members continue to receive minimal remuneration for their time, effectively only receiving a meeting sitting fee. This amount represents approximately 5% of the Board's annual budget. With an anticipated increase from seven to eleven or twelve Board Members under the Dental Bill 2005, revision of fees to Board members needs to occur. This would significantly increase total payments, but this should be able to be absorbed into our current license fee structure.

2. External Network

It is important to acknowledge the assistance provided to the Board by all external parties, including government agencies such as the Legal & Legislative Services Division of the Department of Health, the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) and other organizations, in particular, the Executive of ADA (WA Branch), the Australian Dental Council, the other six State/Territory Dental Boards and the New Zealand Dental Council.

3. New Dental Act

Compared to 2005-2006 where considerable time was spent assisting, advising and interacting with the Legal & Legislative Services Division of the Department of Health with regard to the drafting of the Dental Bill 2005, the past twelve months has been relatively quiet with the Bill stalled in the Upper House of State Parliament. The main reason for this delay appears to the Opposition's desire to support Independent Right of Practice for Dental Hygienists. The Board's position is straight forward. The curriculum for and the clinical training of Dental Hygienists, has always been based on the premise that Dental Hygienists work under the supervision of a Dentist or Specialist. In view of this intended supervision, many areas of a Dental Hygienist's education are devoid of knowledge relevant to diagnosis and treatment planning. Without a complete review of this training, the Board cannot support the removal of supervision as we believe this would put the public at unnecessary risk. Finally on this matter, at no time in the past decade, to the best of my knowledge, has the Board received any submission from any registered Dental Hygienist, any Professional Body, member of the public, teaching institution or registered Dentist, indicating how the introduction of this proposal would benefit the public in any form, let alone, be superior to the current situation. This indicates to the Board that only a very small part of the Dental and Dental Hygiene profession are promoting this change.

Whilst the Board is yet to receive for comment the first draft of the regulations that will be required to support the new Act, the Board has continued to develop policy and guidelines in preparation for those Regulations. Areas that have continued to receive considerable attention include, Compulsory Professional Indemnity Insurance, National Infection Control Protocols and Guidelines, Use of Botox in Dental Practice and Tooth Whitening.

4. License Fees

As advised in 2004-2005 report, the Minister approved an increase in registration (license fees) and other Board fees as of the 1st January 2006. The Board has not sought to increase general registration fees for 2007 or 2008. Penalties will be reviewed in the new Dental Act.

5. National Registration and Accreditation

Of significant importance to all Professions including the Dental profession is the planned introduction of a system of National Registration and Accreditation. The national system was originally proposed to be implemented with effect from 1 July 2008, but this date has recently been postponed to 1 July 2009. The proposal is an initiative of the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) and was developed from the recommendations from the Productivity Commission. The development of the proposal has been directed by the Office of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, and unfortunately has had little or no input from the eight Australian State and Territory Dental Boards. At the recent meeting of all Australasian Dental Registration Boards held in Perth in August 2007 it was unanimously resolved that all State and Territory Registration Boards would write to their respective Health Ministers requesting to be involved in the development of the proposal. To date the Board has witnessed a predictable degree of politics involved when proposals are being considered that will move decision making processes from State to Federal Governments and from State Registration Boards to Federal peak bodies. Hopefully common sense from the perspective of the consuming public will eventually prevail and a number of factors will come into focus including:

- a) A national system of uniform registration criteria is highly desirable, but it can be achieved without the disadvantages of a centralised registration body.
- b) The current system of State/Territory based registration has operated effectively and efficiently for many decades.
- c) The current system has operated at no cost to the taxpayer.
- d) States that have significant regional issues such as Western Australia would or may not be well served by a centralised administration.
- e) Knowledge of Board members at a regional level is invaluable and would be likely to be lost in the event of the registration system being centralised in an eastern seaboard location.
- f) Under Mutual Recognition Legislation, Australia effectively has many of the benefits that are being sought under a system of National Registration.
- g) One key objective was to "reduce the red tape" but after almost 2 years the model is still being debated, therefore no-one knows what the system will be to determine whether there is less red tape.
- h) Currently, registration fees subsidize the Boards disciplinary functions and if this fee base is lost to a National Registering body, State fees may need to be levied to fund this necessary, local disciplinary role. Dental Registration has traditionally and continues to be at a very low relative cost, especially compared to other professions. It is expected that costs of registration with this new initiative, will rise significantly for the same outcome.

6. Statute of Limitations and Record Keeping

Please also remember, the Statute of Limitations regarding patient records requires records to be retained and able to be produced on demand by any authority, including the Dental Board of WA, for specified periods of time. In the case of an adult, the period is 7 years after the treatment is provided. In the case of a child, the period is 7 years from the patient reaching the age of majority. As the age of majority is 18, this requires a practitioner to retain the records until the patient's 25th birthday. The Board continues to investigate the implications of the Limitations Act 2005 on the above.

It is important to remind all registrants that the Board continues to be concerned at the lack of appreciation some retiring, relocating, locum or associate practitioners have for this issue when they sell, close, move interstate, relinquish control or possibly, eventually, corporatise their practices.

Some Practitioners take detailed photographic or digital / scanned copies to assist with both storage and recovery of all records. This is acceptable to the Dental Board of WA, presuming the quality, completeness and overall approach towards these valuable and often irreplaceable records is done in a professional manner.

7. Term of the Current Board Members

The term of the current members of the Board expires on 31 October 2009. The Board will be dissolved and a new, larger Board will be appointed if the Dental Act 2005 receives assent prior to that date.

I believe it is essential registrants continually familiarise themselves with their obligations under the Dental Act and not wait for Board action to be required. INQUIRIES 3.

State Administrative Tribunal 3.1

The State Administrative Tribunal commenced operations in January 2005. The penalties that can be imposed by the State Administrative Tribunal ("SAT") are similar to the penalties that can be imposed by the Board with the exception being that the SAT can order that a practitioner be suspended from or struck off the Register. The Board does not have the power to Order that a practitioner be suspended from or struck off the Register.

No matters were referred to SAT during the year ended 30 June 2007.

One matter that had been previously referred to SAT was dealt with by the Board during the year ended 30 June 2007 under the Board's "Informal Inquiry" powers.

3. INQUIRIES (CONT'D)

3.2 Matters dealt with by the Board under the Board "Informal Inquiry" powers

Under Section 30 of the Dental Act 1939, where the Board is of the opinion that a proceeding before the State Administrative Tribunal is not warranted by the nature of the allegations, the Board may deal with the matter, provided the Board has afforded the person concerning the option of the matter being heard before the State Administrative Tribunal. The Board may deal with the matter by imposing one or more of the following penalties:

- censure;
- impose conditions limiting practice;
- impose a fine of up to \$2,500; and
- require the dentist to contribute towards the costs of the proceedings.

The Board dealt with the following matters on this basis during the year.

1	The patient had a CLII division 2 malocclusion with a deep anterior bite and some loss of molar support, combined with a severe bruxing habit. The practitioner embarked on a comprehensive treatment programme without considering the occlusal forces when: i. Placing indirect porcelain veneers ii. Placing a bridge to replace canine using an inadequate abutment on tooth 22 The practitioner made no suggestion to the patient to use an occlusal splint at night to minimise her severe nocturnal parafunction.	The practitioner was: i. Censured ii. Fined \$500.
2	The practitioner failed to respond in a timely manner to correspondence from the Board, despite undertaking to do so.	The practitioner was: i) Censure ii) Ordered to pay the Board's external legal costs of \$1,001.
3	 i. Failed to maintain adequate clinical dental records; ii. Provided dental services through a company when under Section 50 of the Dental Act 1939 "no person, other than a Dentist and no company shall a) practise Dentistry or perform any Act of Dentistry: or b) hold himself, or hold itself out, either directly or by implication, as practising, or being prepared to practise, dentistry in any of its branches."; and iii. Placed instruments on the patient's chest whilst providing treatment in an un-chaperoned environment. 	The practitioner was: i) Censured ii) Fined \$1,100.

3. INQUIRIES (CONT'D)

The practitioner:

- i. Failed to maintain adequate medical and dental history records;
- ii. Had no record of certain treatments completed, material used or letter of referral to the Endodontist; and
- iii) Had no evidence of an overall treatment plan for a complex case involving a gross occlusal breakdown.

The practitioner was:

- i) Fined \$2,500: and
- Ordered to enter into an ii) Undertaking to attend, at the practitioner's cost, three full day equivalent courses in relation to crown and bridgework and/or treatment planning by selected the Practitioner and as approved in writing by the Board.

4. COUNSELLING SESSIONS

Where there is insufficient evidence for the Board to deal with a matter or refer the matter to the State Administrative Tribunal pursuant to Section 30 of the Act but there are grounds for the counselling of the practitioner in relation to the practitioner's professional conduct, the Board will arrange for the dentist to be counselled.

During the year ended 30 June 2007, the Board conducted four counselling sessions.

5. COMPLAINTS

During the year, the Board received 28 formal complaints.

Report on the financial report

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Dental Act 1939.

The financial report covers the Dental Board of Western Australia as an individual entity. The Board is incorporated in Western Australia under the Dental Act 1939. The financial report was authorised for issue on 19 November 2007.

The following is a summary of the basis of preparation and the material accounting policies adopted by the Board in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of Preparation

The financial report of the Dental Board of Western Australia as an individual entity complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) in their entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, and financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

Accounting Policies

a) Income and Expense Recognition

Licence fees are brought to account as income on a time expiry basis under the accruals method of accounting.

Inquiry costs recoverable are brought to account as income in the financial year in which the Board issues a notice to a registered Dentist under which any Inquiry costs are recoverable.

Expenses are brought to account under the accruals method of accounting in the year incurred.

b) Taxation

The income of the Dental Board of Western Australia is exempt from tax pursuant to Section 24AQ of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

c) Goods and Services Tax

Revenue and expenditure is stated net of the amount of the goods and services tax (GST).
