David Neesham served as a member of the Board for twenty two years. His knowledge and counsel will be missed by future Boards and I thank him for his enormous contribution.

I am delighted to welcome four new Board members, Dr Neil Burman, Ms Bronwyn Davies, Dr Martin Glick and Dr Gerard Parkinson who have been appointed to replace the retiring Board members. The new Board members joined three reappointed members, Ms Marie Louise Matthews, Dr John Owen AM and myself to form the Dental Board of Western Australia. I wish to especially acknowledge the leadership of Dr Owen as President of the Board since 1999 and a Director of the ADC until 2002. In 2009 Dr Ron Townsend was appointed an Officer of the Board to assist in the area of enquiries and complaints which he has done extremely well. The Board thanks Ron for his dedication and commitment to the activities of the Board.

Finally I would like to thank the families of the Board members and the staff at their practices who are largely unacknowledged for the support they give Board members.

COMPLAINTS AND ENQUIRIES

With the move to national registration and accreditation (NRAS) considerable effort has been made to resolve as many outstanding issues as possible during the last year of this Board. Thirty six complaints were received by the Board up until 30th June 2010. Thanks to all the Board members and especially the newly appointed members for embracing the work load from day one of their appointment. The Boards complaint file has been reduced considerably by their efforts.

NATIONAL REGISTRATION SYSTEM

On October 1st 2010 the Board was advised that the Government Gazette has today published that the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law (WA) Act 2010 has been proclaimed from the 18th October 2010. In anticipation of this occurring the Board held its last meeting on Monday 11th October 2010. The first meeting of the West Australian Dental Board as it was originally called was held on the 25th February 1895 and the first dental bill proclaimed in 1894. For 115 years the Dental Board has served the public and the profession of Western Australia. I would like to pay tribute to all the past Board members for their contribution to the public and profession of our State. Personally I feel this is a very sad day and only hope that the new arrangements will be as enduring as the past and present Boards.

3. INOUIRIES

3.1 State Administrative Tribunal

Disciplinary matters that have the potential to result in a practitioner being suspended or struck off the Register are required to be referred by the Board to the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT). Additionally, in respect of lesser matters, a practitioner can elect for the SAT to hear a matter rather than the matter being dealt with by the Board under the disciplinary powers given to the Board in the Dental Act 1939. (Refer to 3.2 below). The penalties that can be imposed by the SAT are similar to the penalties that can be imposed by the Board with the exception being that the SAT can order that a practitioner be suspended from or struck off the Register. The Board does not have the power to Order that a practitioner be suspended from or struck off the Register.

The following matters were finalised since the date of the previous report of the Board.

3. INQUIRIES (CONT'D)

MATTER	ORDERS
1. Dr Allen Traianou	
The practitioner admitted misconduct in a professional respect by reason of carelessness or incompetence as follows:	The practitioner was: i) Struck off the Dental Register.
i) Following cessation of his suspension from the Dental Register on 18 May 2009 the practitioner practiced in breach of an undertaking made to the Board by practising on his own account as a principal and in circumstances other than as an employee in a practice approved by the Board.	ii) Ordered to pay the Board's costs in the sum of \$7,500.
ii) Between 10 August 2009 and 20 August 2009 the practitioner prepared six temporary crowns for a patient in circumstances where:	
 crown preparations underneath the temporary crowns had been completed on sub gingival calculus as well as dentine; 	
ii. the treatment compromised an already broken-down dentition;	
iii. the temporary crowns had been made in one piece, making interproximal cleaning impossible;	
iv. the temporary crowns did not fit well and the practitioner filled the gaps with a flowable restorative material that had been allowed to flow without guidance; and	
v. the practitioner failed to adequately anaesthetise the patient immediately prior to preparing her teeth for crowns.	
iii) The practitioner failed to advise the patient that anterior aesthetic treatment was likely to fail due to labial migration of her teeth.	

3. INQUIRIES (CONT'D)

2. Dr Anand Krishnan

The practitioner admitted misconduct in a professional respect by reason of carelessness or incompetence as follows:

- During a period of approximately 13 months, the practitioner failed to record the quantity of intravenous sedation (IV sedation) administered in the notes of any patients;
- ii) Breached an undertaking given to the Board.
- iii) During a period of approximately three months, administered IV sedation to four patients 30 minutes or more after those patients' preoperative blood pressure, heart rated and blood oxygen saturation had been taken.

The practitioner was:

- i) Censured by the Tribunal.
- ii) Required to provide a written undertaking not to perform nor assist in or supervise the administration of IV Sedation for a period of at least 12 months.
- iii) Required to completed an approved IV sedation (conscious sedation) approved course.
- iv) Fined \$2,000.
- v) Ordered to pay the Board's costs in the sum of \$8,000.

3. Dr Anand Krishnan

The practitioner admitted misconduct in a professional respect by reason of carelessness as follows:

- i) Cementing post and core crowns to four teeth without first completing the root canal treatment.
- ii) Not checking the patient's notes.
- iii) Not deleting an incorrect record of treatment.
- iv) Charging the patient with inserting gutta percha into four teeth when he had not done so.
- v) Charging the patient for three radiographs that he had not taken.

The practitioner was:

- i) Censured by the Tribunal.
- ii) Required to provide a written undertaking to the Board to complete an approved course of study in maintaining records of dental treatment and provide the Board with written confirmation that the course is complete.
- iii) Fined \$2,000.
- iv) Ordered to pay the Board's costs in the sum of \$5,000.

3. INQUIRIES (CONT'D)

4. Dr Michael Draper

The practitioner admitted misconduct in a professional respect by reason of carelessness and/or incompetence as follows:

- Failure to properly prepare a treatment plan for bridge and crown work.
- Failure to carry out series of dental treatments including crown and bridge work in a competent manner,
- iii) Failure to carry out a series of dental treatments including endodontics, periodontal treatment, application of veneers and bridge work in a competent manner.
- iv) Failed to maintain complete and accurate records.

The practitioner was:

- i) Struck off the Register.
- ii) Fined \$2,000.
- iii) Ordered to pay the Board's costs in the sum of \$5,000.

5. Dr Laurel Cetinic-Dorol

The practitioner admitted there was a proper cause for disciplinary action in that the practitioner was convicted of offences in the District Court of Western Australia relating to burglary and attempting to pervert the course of justice.

The practitioner was:

- i) Censured.
- Required to practice as only an employed dentist with an employer approved by the Board with no rights to private practice until December 2012.
- iii) Required to give an undertaking to remain employed by Dental Health Services as a dentist for at least four days a week until 31 December 2012.
- iv) Required to enter into supervised practice with Dental Health Services whereby the employer shall provide to the Board at no less than three monthly intervals a report on the practitioner's professional conduct.
- v) Fined \$2,000.
- vi) Ordered to pay the Board's costs in the sum of \$10,000.

The Orders of the State Administrative Tribunal are published on the Tribunal's website.

3. INQUIRIES (CONT'D)

3.2 Matters dealt with by the Board under the Board's "Informal Inquiry" powers

Under Section 30 of the Dental Act 1939, where the Board is of the opinion that a proceeding before the State Administrative Tribunal is not warranted by the nature of the allegations, the Board may deal with the matter, provided the Board has afforded the person concerned the option of the matter being heard before the State Administrative Tribunal. The Board may deal with the matter by imposing one or more of the following penalties:

- Censure;
- Impose conditions limiting practise;
- Impose a fine of up to \$2,500; and
- Require the dentist to contribute towards the costs of the proceedings.

The Board dealt with the following matters on this basis since the Board's previous report:

Ξ	MATTER	PENALTY
1	The practitioner was found guilty of misconduct in a professional respect by reason of carelessness on the grounds that the practitioner: i) omitted to take a periapical radiograph and/or diagnostic cast prior to the preparation of the patient's teeth 11 and 21 for full coverage crowns; and ii) failed to provide proper treatment and/or service to the patient as follows: a) the crowns on teeth 11 and 21 were over contoured on the labial surface. b) the crowns on teeth 11 and 21 were over contoured on the palatal surface. c) the colour match for crowns 11 and 21 was too light as compared with the patient's natural surrounding teeth.	 The practitioner was: i) Censured. ii) Required to provide an Undertaking to the Board to attend a total of five full days of continuing education courses prior to 31 December 2010 in the areas of radiography, diagnostic assessment, treatment planning and record keeping, with the courses being selected by the practitioner and approved by the Board before attendance.

3. INQUIRIES (CONT'D)

- The practitioner was found guilty of misconduct in a professional respect by reason of carelessness on the grounds that the practitioner failed to provide an adequate standard of care in respect of the following:
 - Inadequate standard of restorative care in what were essentially basic restorations.
 - ii) Failure to diagnose an internal tooth fracture in a tooth.
 - Failure to respond to the patient's complaint on a timely basis.
 - iv) Failure to provide adequate information to the patient regarding a more satisfactory restorative solution for a tooth in view of the internal fracture and extensive tooth destruction in that tooth.

The practitioner was required to undertake a course of re-education at the Oral Health Centre of Western Australia (OHCWA) in the area of Operative Dentistry.

4. OTHER MATTERS BEFORE THE STATE ADMINISTRATIVE TRIBUNAL OR THE ADMINISTRATIVE APPEALS TRIBUNAL

i) Dr G Varnavides - Application for Registration

In the Board's report for the year ended 30 June 2009 the Board reported the following:

- i) Dr Varnavides lodged an application with the Board for registration as a Dentist. The Board refused the application on the basis that the Dentist did not satisfy the requirement in section 44 of the Dental Act 1939 that the applicant is a person of good character.
- ii) Dr Varnavides lodged an application for review of this decision with the State Administrative Tribunal. The Tribunal upheld the Board's decision.
- iii) Dr Varnavides lodged an appeal with the Supreme Court of WA.

Since the Board's last report Dr Varnavides withdrew his appeal to the Supreme Court of WA.

5. COUNSELLING SESSIONS

Where there is insufficient evidence for the Board to deal with a matter or refer the matter to the State Administrative Tribunal pursuant to Section 30 of the Act but there are grounds for the counselling of the practitioner in relation to the practitioner's professional conduct, the Board will arrange for the dentist to be counselled.

During the year ended 30 June 2010, the Board conducted 7 counselling sessions.

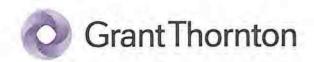

Responsibility of the Board and Registrar for the financial report

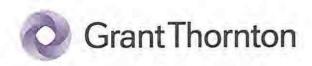

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Dental Act 1939.

The financial report covers the Dental Board of Western Australia as an individual entity. The Board is incorporated in Western Australia under the Dental Act 1939. The financial report was authorised for issue on 30 November 2010.

The following is a summary of the basis of preparation and the material accounting policies adopted by the Board in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Significant Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

The Board has not made any significant accounting judgements, estimates or assumptions in the process of applying the Board's accounting policies for the year.

Basis of Preparation

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, and financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

Accounting Policies

a) Income and Expense Recognition

Licence fees are brought to account as income on a time expiry basis under the accruals method of accounting.

Inquiry costs recoverable are brought to account as income in the financial year in which the Board issues a notice to a registered Dentist under which any Inquiry costs are recoverable.

Expenses are brought to account under the accruals method of accounting in the year incurred.

b) Income Tax

The income of the Dental Board of Western Australia is exempt from tax pursuant to Section 24AQ of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

c) Goods and Services Tax

Revenue and expenditure is stated net of the amount of the goods and services tax (GST).

d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

e) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the registration board during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

f) Adoption of New and Revised Accounting Standards

During the current year, the registration board has adopted all of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations applicable to its operations which became mandatory.

The adoption of these Standards has impacted the recognition, measurement and disclosure of certain transactions. The following is an explanation of the impact the adoption of these Standards and Interpretations has had on the financial statements of Dental Board of Western Australia.

AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements

In September 2007, the Australian Accounting Standards Board revised AASB 101, and as a result there have been changes to the presentation and disclosure of certain information within the financial statements. Below is an overview of the key changes and the impact on the association's financial statements.

Disclosure impact

Terminology changes — the revised version of AASB 101 contains a number of terminology changes, including the amendment of the names of the primary financial statements.

Reporting changes in equity — the revised AASB 101 requires all changes in equity arising from transactions with owners in their capacity as owners to be presented separately from non-owner changes in equity. Owner changes in equity are to be presented in the statement of changes in equity, with non-owner changes in equity presented in the statement of comprehensive income. The previous version of AASB 101 required that owner changes in equity and other comprehensive income be presented in the statement of changes in equity.

Statement of comprehensive income — the revised AASB 101 requires all income and expenses to be presented in either one statement — the statement of comprehensive income, or two statements — a separate income statement and a statement of comprehensive income. The previous version of AASB 101 required only the presentation of a single income statement.

The association's financial statements now contain a statement of comprehensive income.

Other comprehensive income — the revised version of AASB 101 introduces the concept of 'other comprehensive income' which comprises of income and expense that are not recognised in profit or loss as required by other Australian Accounting Standards. Items of other comprehensive income are to be disclosed in the statement of comprehensive income. Entities are required to disclose the income tax relating to each component of other comprehensive income. The previous version of AASB 101 did not contain an equivalent concept.

a) Capital Risk Management

The Board's management of capital risk is by way of holding cash funds in a major Australian banking institution that is regulated by APRA. Funds that are surplus to immediate operating requirements are held in fixed interest term deposits with a maturity date of no more than 1 year.

b) Interest Rate Risk

The Board's exposure to interest rate risk arises on financial assets and financial liabilities recognised at the end of the reporting period whereby a future change in interest rates will affect future cash flows.

c) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk arises from the possibility that the Board might encounter difficulty in settling its debts or otherwise meeting its obligations related to financial liabilities. The Board manages risk through the following mechanisms:

- holding the Board's assets largely in cash; and
- only investing surplus cash with major financial institutions.
