*Question: Mr W.J. Johnston asked:* Why is it that five per cent of state agreement proponents currently do not comply with reporting obligations?

*Answer:* In 2010/11, the reason for aggregated performance not being 100% was primarily due to companies lodging their required reports after the specified date.

Under some State Agreement Acts, companies are obligated to submit various reports to the Department of State of Development by specified dates. The Department ensures that companies comply with those obligations and reports, via its Annual Report, the aggregated performance of those companies in meeting their obligations. In 2010/11, 96% of the reporting obligations of companies under State Agreement Acts were met exceeding the target of 95%. The target for the 2011/12 year remains at 95%.
