MAGNETIC RESONANCE IMAGING MACHINE, PMH MEDICARE LICENCE

For once I took some comfort from comments made by the Prime Minister when he said this morning on a radio 6PR program that he would raise this issue with the federal Minister for Health and Ageing. I was totally amazed that three hours later in the federal Parliament the minister assisting the Minister for Health and Ageing said that this State had enough MRI machines. My concern is about the allocation of the machines. The Prime Minister said that five machines were within a five kilometre radius. This Government did not put those machines there or say what the allocation rule should be. I am sure that some groups and members on the other side of the House had a hand in the allocation. If members heard the mother who spoke on the radio today, they would know that the allocation system is flawed.
