Hon JIM CHOWN: I bring members’ attention to the Chairman’s foreword, the bottom paragraph of which reads —

An expedient government response is particularly important to ensure an efficient appointment process is in place when it will be needed at the end of 2017 following the expiration of the current Parliamentary Inspector on the Corruption and Crime Commission’s five year term.

Obviously, the parliamentary inspector’s appointment is due for renewal and the process needs to be expedited by the government. Part of the problem has been, of course, that the prorogation of the Parliament and the dissolution of the Legislative Assembly on 30 January 2017 has interrupted the process. I bring that to the attention of the government and the house.
