RADIO LOLLIPOP

Statement by Member for Hillarys

MR JOHNSON (Hillarys) [12.55 pm]: As this is the International Year of Volunteers, I place on the record my appreciation of a group of volunteers, of which I am chairman; that is, Radio Lollipop (Australia) Ltd. I place on the record my thanks, and the thanks of all the families of sick children, for the care, comfort and entertainment they receive from the 200 or 300 volunteers throughout Australia. The predominant area for Radio Lollipop in Western Australia is Princess Margaret Hospital for Children. Western Australia has about 150 volunteers. They work every day of the year, including Christmas Day. The oldest volunteer is almost 80 years old. He has a regular weekly spot, and comes with his Zimmer frame. He is known as the grand-dad.
