Question No 1: The Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations asked –

We refer to page 22 of the Annual report under 'Ensure all students attend school regularly' – how many staff whose primary role relates to increasing school attendance is employed by the Department and what regions are they located in?

Answer: Every teacher in every school is responsible for supporting students to maintain regular attendance. Schools designate and manage the role of badged attendance officers according to individual circumstances and need. Designated staff accept the responsibilities of a badged attendance officer as part of their normal duties. As at 13 October 2014, there are 417 badged attendance officers in Western Australian public schools.

Each country education region has one officer and each metropolitan region has two officers who have the responsibility for supporting student attendance.

Question No 2: The Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations asked –

We refer to page 23 of the Annual Report states 'in 2013, 229 schools, most of which had Aboriginal student attendance rates below 90% received Aboriginal Education Attendance Grants (which) included Aboriginal attendance officers and youth workers..', and ask-

a) What was the total value of these grants in 2013-14?

Answer: \$3,440,250.

b) Do the grants include Commonwealth funding? If so, how much of the grants were funded by the Commonwealth?

Answer: No.

c) Please specify the number Aboriginal attendance officers and youth workers were employed as a result of these grants and the schools or locations where they were employed.

Answer: This information is not kept centrally. In 2013, the grants were allocated to schools through the School Support Program Resource Allocation (SSPRA) process to enable targeted schools to implement local strategies to raise the attendance levels of Aboriginal students. This may have included the employment of staff as Attendance Officers and/or Youth Workers.

Question No 3: The Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations asked –

We refer to page 45 of the Annual Report, under 'Priority 3: High quality teaching and leadership', and states 'Suitable housing at an acceptable cost both the Department and staff continued as a strategy to attract and retain staff in country schools'. Table 3 shows that the number of GROH houses used by Education decreased in every region in 2013-14 from 2012-13, except in North Metropolitan, which stayed the same. The total number of GROH houses in 2012-13 was 2181, compared to 2094 in 2013-14, and ask-

a) Why has the number of GROH properties decreased in 7 of the 8 regions?

Answer: This decrease has been as a result of changes in the management of vacant properties, including placing a greater emphasis on returning, rather than retaining, long-term vacant properties to Government Regional Officers' Housing (GROH).

All eligible employees continue to have the same access to housing.

Question No 4: Hon Sue Ellery MLC asked –

I refer to page 17 of the Annual Report and the 53 re-registered schools and the 30 quality audits, and ask –

- a) *Were any causes for concern or areas of improvement identified and if so how many for each of Catholic schools and independent non-government schools?*

Answer: 53 independent non-government schools were re-registered during the reporting period. Under s.165 and 166 of the *School Education Act 1999*, a total of 368 'Quality Improvements Required' were issued, 76 'Conditions' were issued and 2 'Directions' were issued.

No concerns or areas of improvement were identified for Catholic schools as the Department does not re-register Catholic schools. This is because, under s.169 of the *School Education Act 1999*, the Minister has an approved System Agreement with the Catholic Education Commission. Under this Agreement, the supervision, implementation and monitoring of standards of educational instruction and the level of care of Catholic schools is exercised through the Catholic Education Office of Western Australia (CEOWA).

- b) *Please identify what were the nature/types of the concerns or areas of improvement in a)?*

Question No 6: Hon Sue Ellery MLC asked –

6. *I refer to page 18 of the Annual Report and the 64 Independent Public Schools (IPS) reviewed, and ask-*

a) *Were there different categories of commendation reported and if so-*
i. *what were those categories; and*

Answer: IPS reviews are undertaken across four broad categories and commendations can be reported across any of these categories. They include:

1. The school's self-review process. This category relates to the effectiveness of the school's self-review in accounting for its performance during the period of the Delivery and Performance Agreement, and Business Plan.

2. School performance – Student learning. This category relates to the performance of the school in improving learning (achievement, progress and engagement) for all students.

3. School performance – Quality of the learning environment. This category relates to the school's performance in creating an environment that promotes learning and wellbeing for all students and the attainment of the school vision.

4. School performance – Sustainability. This category relates to how well the school is placed to sustain and improve its performance into the next planning cycle.

ii. *how many schools received each type of commendation?*

Answer: -The school's self-review process - 42 schools.

-School performance – Student learning - 30 schools.

-School performance – Quality of the learning environment - 64 schools.

-School performance – Sustainability - 38 schools.

b) *Were there different categories of areas for improvement reported and if so-*
i. *what were those categories; and*

Answer: IPS reviews are undertaken across four broad categories and areas for improvement can be identified across any of these categories.

1. The school's self-review process. This category relates to the effectiveness of the school's self-review in accounting for its performance during the period of the Delivery and Performance Agreement, and Business Plan.

2. School performance – Student learning. This category relates to the performance of the school in improving learning (achievement, progress and engagement) for all students.
3. School performance – Quality of the learning environment. This category relates to the school’s performance in creating an environment that promotes learning and wellbeing for all students and the attainment of the school vision.
4. School performance – Sustainability. This category relates to how well the school is placed to sustain and improve its performance into the next planning cycle.

Answer: The school’s self-review process - 28 schools.

i. who does provide financial oversight of IPS; and

Answer: No, the Department of Education Services does not examine the financial management, accountability of each IPS. The Department of Education provides the financial oversight of IPS.

ii. how are financial early warning signs identified before a school encounters financial problems?

Answer: The Department of Education provides this oversight of IPS.

d) If yes to c), were any schools required to improve their financial management practices and if so –

i. What was the specific nature of each of those improvements?

Answer: Not applicable as No to c.

7. I refer to page 20 of the Annual Report, and ask-

a) In reference to the 500 amendments to registrations – what was the nature of those amendments and how many in each category of amendment?

Answer: The 500 amendments to registration fall into two categories:

1 - 'Extensions to Registration' (163 amendments). In these instances, the training organisation applies to deliver units of competency, qualifications or nationally accredited courses that are either (i) in a new industry area that is not part of their existing scope of delivery; or (ii) at a higher Australian Qualifications Framework level than approved under their current scope of registration.

2 - 'Addition within Registration' (337 amendments). In these instances, training organisations amend the scope of their registration by adding units of competency, qualifications, or nationally accredited courses within existing overarching industry areas and within existing Australian Qualifications Framework levels approved under their current scope of registration.

b) In reference to the 99 initial or renewal of registrations, how many of each?

Answer: Initial registration - 30
Renewal of registration - 69

c) Of the 347 risk assessments, please provide a breakdown of the results including areas of improvement identified?

Answer: A risk assessment is conducted following the receipt of an application from a training organisation. Following the assessment, a rating of low, medium, high or extreme is assigned, which then informs whether an audit will be conducted. The risk assessment and rating process does not identify areas of improvement. The breakdown of risk assessments undertaken during the year is provided below:

*These relate to initial registration applications that are still in progress. No risk rating has been assigned at this stage of the application process.

d) *Of the 323 audits of training providers, please provide a breakdown of the results including areas of improvement identified?*

Answer: Audits of training providers assess the level of compliance against each particular Standard or Condition being audited. Where a finding of non-compliance has been reached, this is categorised as being either 'minor', 'significant' or 'critical'. The breakdown of the audit findings during the period is as follows:

Answer: Santa Maria College (Attadale).

- b) *I refer to the international education conciliation service and ask:*
- c) *what is the breakdown for the 117 disputes for each school?*

Answer: The international education conciliation service encompasses all education providers in Western Australia and is not confined to schools. Of the 117 disputes, 2 applied to schools in the following categories:

- Homestay/Accommodation Issues
- Poor Academic Progress.

- d) *Of the 12% not finalised, how many have been finalised to date; and*

Answer: Of the 12% (i.e. 14) cases where conciliation or mediation was not finalised within the reporting period, half (i.e. 7) of these cases remain outstanding.

- e) *When is it expected the remainder will be finalised?*

Answer: Most of these cases will be finalised by the end of 2014 based mainly on negotiated outcomes with the Department of Immigration and Border Protection, the Overseas Student Ombudsman, the Australian Skills Quality Authority (ASQA), the Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency (TEQSA) and relevant international education service providers.

Question No 11: Hon Sue Ellery MLC asked –

I refer to page 40 of the Annual Report and to the Australian Curriculum, and ask –

a) In what specific ways will the Department's reviews of non-government schools be "adjusted accordingly"?

Answer: Under the registration standards, non-government schools in Western Australia are required to meet the requirements of the Western Australian Curriculum which encompasses the Australian Curriculum. These are prescribed by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) through the requirements embedded in the Curriculum and Assessment Outline and the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE). Reviews of non-government schools will be adjusted to assess the extent to which compliance with these new requirements has occurred.

b) Will the Department need to undertake fewer reviews and if so, what will be the target number of reviews?

Answer: The Australian Curriculum will not result in fewer reviews of non-government schools. In fact, in 2014-15, 87 registration visits and inspections are expected to be undertaken (67 were undertaken in 2013-14).

I refer to page 41 of the Annual Report and the Independent Public Schools and the need to maintain and “efficient” and “sustainable” review process, and ask –

a) Will fewer schools be reviewed and if not, in what specific ways will the review process change so that the same number can be reviewed?

Answer: An increased number of IPS reviews are proposed for the 2015 school year (118). In order to maintain an efficient and sustainable review process, the IPS Review model is being refined to make greater use of desk-top review techniques. These techniques are anticipated to remove the requirement for the initial half-day visit to the school, leaving a single two-day visit. The desk-top review will be a robust process which will involve comprehensive analysis of a particular school’s information and ensure that school reviewers are adequately prepared prior to the two-day visit. The proposed replacement of the initial half-day visit with the desk-top review is also consistent with feedback received from schools on the IPS Review model.

b) If fewer schools will be reviewed, what is the target number of schools for review?

Answer: Not applicable.

b) Has the Board sought to determine if any of these teachers have resigned or retired from teaching and if so, how many have:

Answer: The Board has not sought to determine if any of those teachers whose registration has been cancelled have resigned or retired from teaching.

Question No 16: Hon Sue Ellery asked –

I refer to the Child and Parent Centres, and ask-

a) What's the reporting system on operations of Child and Parent Centres?

Answer: Under Service Agreement contracts the non-government organisations that operate Child and Parent Centres are required to provide bi-annual reports on service delivery and outcomes. The reports are provided to the Department of Education's contract manager.

b) What's the catchment for each centre?

Answer: Each Child and Parent Centre has a unique catchment known as the 'Child and Parent Centre community'. It includes the host school, nominated surrounding public and private schools, and extends to areas surrounding these schools. Child and Parent Centre communities are approximately 5 km in radius from the host school in the Perth metropolitan area, and around 10 km in radius from the host school in regional locations.

c) What is number of families serviced by child & parent centres operating in 2014 to date?

Answer: The non-government organisations operating the Child and Parent Centres are required to keep data on the number of children and adults accessing services and programs, rather than the number of families.

The estimated number of children and adults accessing services and programs at and through all Child and Parent Centres from 1 February 2013 to 30 June 2014 was 12,089 and 13,371 respectively¹.

d) What is range of services offered at each centre?

Answer: The mix of programs and services varies between centres and is based on identified community needs. These include a range of early learning; child and maternal health; parenting and family support; and community wellbeing programs and services.

¹The estimated number was derived from data that was reviewed across three six-month reporting periods from 1 February 2013 to 30 June 2014. The data does not distinguish between new participants and returning participants

e) Do any of the Child and Parent Centres have General Practitioner (GPs)?

Answer: Yes. As at 30 September 2014, two of the Child and Parent Centres offer occasional general practitioner services.

Answer: 147 teachers will have completed *Switch* training by the end of 2014. A further 260 teachers will have completed *Switch* training by the end of January 2015. This means a total of 407 teachers will have completed their *Switch* training prior to the start of the school year in February 2015.

A further 61 teachers will be part way through their training and will still be eligible to apply for secondary positions in 2015. Principals may offer appointments to partially-trained *Switch* teachers and may make an offer of employment that is conditional on the completion of *Switch*.

Answer: The data in the table attached represents central allocations to all public schools through use of the School Psychology Service Allocative Mechanism. In practice, the specific allocation to each school may vary slightly from this figure, according to local factors as determined by the Regional Executive Director.

Regional Executive Directors also receive an additional allocation of regional FTE for discretionary use in schools on a needs basis; this can be used to boost FTE for schools.

The allocations do not include school psychologist FTE purchased by schools using their own funds.

The figures do not include specialist school psychologists not directly allocated to regions, such as behaviour centre school psychologists. These personnel are available to service all schools on a needs basis.

An additional two FTE service private schools located in the Kimberley Education Region, funded through an agreement with the Catholic Education Office of Western Australia.

Question No 21: Hon Sue Ellery asked –

I refer to the increase demand for education provision for students with a disability and English language needs as referred to in the Departments Annual Report on page 13, and ask-

a) What was the FTE of ESL support in 2013?

Answer: 186 teacher FTE was allocated to schools for English as an Additional Language/Dialect (EAL/D) support and primary EAL/D cell programs in 2013.

b) What is the FTE of ESL support to date in 2014?

Answer: 169 teacher FTE has been allocated to schools for EAL/D Support Programs in 2014.

As part of the transition to the student-centered funding model in 2015, cell programs ceased and were replaced with support programs.

From 2015, under the new student-centered funding model, all eligible EAL/D students will be resourced. Schools will not be required to enroll a minimum number of eligible students. Funding for eligible EAL/D students is distributed through the model, with principals having flexibility to make local decisions regarding expenditure.

The Aboriginal Affairs Coordinating Committee (AACC) Education Sub-Committee (ESC) was established in 2013 and has met six times to consider initiatives and/or key deliverables to progress the educational outcomes of Aboriginal children through improved engagement, attendance, retention, participation and attainment.

Specific actions thus far include:

- provision of advice relating to the effectiveness of existing legislation and policies supporting the regular attendance of Aboriginal students. This advice was considered as part of the changes to the legislation currently before Parliament as the *School Education Amendment Bill 2014*;
- development of strategies to address post-school transitions, which is being led by the Department of Training and Workforce Development as a member of the sub-committee. Draft plans have been prepared for the sub-committee to consider;
- identifying and developing strategies to support schools in building their capacity for cultural responsiveness. The Department is developing a project plan for consideration by the sub-committee; and
- options for intervention initiatives to improve access to an early learning environment for Aboriginal children are being progressed.

Question No 25: Hon Sue Ellery asked –

I refer to the Minister for Education's answer to a question where he said 'all Western Australian public primary schools are expected to use systematic and explicit approaches to teaching numeracy', and ask-

a) Where in the Department for Education's annual report is a reference to how schools are measuring the direct instruction teaching method?

Answer: The introduction to the question and the question itself confuses two concepts.

Direct instruction (commonly referred to as DI) is a “program” that has historically been used throughout Australia, US, Canada and UK for remedial teaching purposes. The program is highly scripted with comprehensive teacher materials, student textbooks and workbooks.

Explicit teaching is an “approach” to teaching in any learning area that is characterised by a step by step systematic teaching of concepts, skills and knowledge with continual verification that students are learning what is being taught before progressing to new content. It features modelling and demonstrating as key lesson strategies.

This is a departure from the “whole language” approach where students were expected to learn by immersion and experience and where the teacher played a more facilitative role than an explicit instruction role.

More recently the Commonwealth Government released its “Explicit Direct Instruction” model based on research by John Hollingsworth and Dr Silvia Ybarra, which brings together features of both the “direct instruction program” and the “explicit instruction approach”.

The Department’s Annual report does not reference how schools are measuring the direct instruction teaching method, as schools are not required to use it. The Department does however, expect its schools to use systematic and explicit approaches to teaching literacy and numeracy.

This is a statement of the expected effect of the changes being implemented by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority and includes students with a vocational qualification. There is no target for either the number of ATAR or vocational qualifications.

b) How will the Department measure its success?

Answer: The achievement of either an ATAR or a Certificate II or higher vocational qualification is one of the new requirements of WACE achievement from 2016. The Department will closely monitor the WACE achievement rate for public schools.
