WorkCover WA

Hon Peter Katsambanis asked:

(Supp Info B1): 2016/17 Strategic Initiative Legislative Review

1) Can the Minister provide copies of the submissions made by the people who are listed at appendix 4 of the Legislative Review final report?

Answer:

The submissions were given to WorkCover WA in the course of its legislative review and contain confidential information that was obtained in circumstances of confidence.

I attach for the Committee only those submissions that were published in the public domain by the person or entity making the submission i.e. those in relation to which I am satisfied no obligation of confidence exists. These include 7 of the 66 submissions from the following persons/ organisations:

- (a) Australian Petroleum Production and Exploration Association WA
- (b) Combined Small Business Alliance of Western Australia (Inc)
- (c) Faculty of Pain Medicine, Australia and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists
- (d) Housing Industry Association Ltd (Western Australia)
- (e) Insurance Council of Australia Limited
- (f) National Insurance Brokers Association of Australia
- (g) The Law Society of Western Australia

I have decided that it is reasonable and appropriate not to provide the remaining submissions to the Committee. The contents of the submissions are not in the public domain and are known only to a small or limited number of persons (and are, as such, confidential). Further, the submissions were sought by WorkCover WA in circumstances where assurances of confidentiality were given to those who provided submissions. Those assurances are reflected in the statement on page 8 of the Review of the Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981: Discussion Paper. I consider that the disclosure of this information is contrary to the assurances of confidentiality given to those providing the submissions and would detrimentally impact on the conduct of future legislative reviews that rely in part, on the voluntary provision of submissions by stakeholders.

Pursuant to section 82(1)(a) of the *Financial Management Act 2006*, I will be giving notice to both houses that I have decided not to provide the submissions to Parliament.

Hon Sally Talbot asked:

(Supp Info B2):2016/17 Strategic Initiative Legislative Review

2) Would the Minister be prepared to give the Committee a copy of the drafting instructions?

Answer:

I have decided that it is reasonable and appropriate not to provide a copy of the drafting instructions sought by the Committee. The drafting instructions were submitted to Cabinet for its consideration, consistent with the usual practice followed by Government for drafting and enactment of legislation in Western Australia. As such, they formed part of the deliberations of Cabinet. Cabinet confidentiality is necessary to ensure the proper functioning of Cabinet. It ensures that members of Cabinet may exchange differing views and maintains the principle of collective responsibility. Cabinet secrecy has been recognised by the Courts as an essential part of the structure of government. In these circumstances, the drafting instructions are subject to Cabinet confidentiality and therefore attract public interest immunity and I have decided not to provide them on that basis.

Pursuant to section 82(1)(a) of the *Financial Management Act 2006*, I will be giving notice to both houses that I have decided not to provide the drafting instructions to Parliament.

Hon Sally Talbot asked:

(Supp Info B3): Initiative 3: Clinical Guidelines for Mental Health Compensation Claims

- 3) Who is WorkCover WA's engagement with in the research process?
 - a) Is it something the AMA, the college of GPs or individual practitioners; are there stakeholder groups or something?
 - b) Yes, if you could as much detail as you can provide?

Answer:

A number of workers' compensation authorities are collaborating through the Department of General Practice at Monash University to develop national clinical practice guidelines for GPs about diagnosing and managing work-related mental health problems.

The goal is to create clinical practice guidelines that are relevant, useful and usable by Australian GPs who are caring for people with work-related mental health conditions. The guidelines will be developed by clinicians and be approved by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) and Royal Australian College of General Practice (RACGP).

This study will:

- Use qualitative methods to engage with end-users to determine key guideline requirements
- Use an expert development group which includes representatives from the RACGP and the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists (RANZCP) to:
 - o Define the scope and content areas for the guidelines
 - o Evaluate the current evidence
 - Create draft guidelines
 - o Release the draft guidelines for public consultation
 - Refine and finalise the guidelines
 - o Develop an implementation and translation plan for embedding the guidelines into clinical practice
- Seek approval from the NHMRC and endorsement from the RACGP
- Publish and disseminate the guidelines following NHMRC approval, in accordance with NHMRC publication requirements.

The project is being overseen by a steering committee consisting of representatives from the RACGP and participating workers' compensation jurisdictions. The steering committee will ensure the project follows an established and rigorous methodology for clinical guideline development, which includes extensive consultation and collaboration with stakeholders and end-users.

Recommended premium rates are published annually for **480** industry classifications based on the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification* (1993 edition) issued by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

WorkCover WA is required to publish recommended premium rates and the actuarial information on which they are based by section 151, 151A of the *Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981*.

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WORKERS' COMPENSATION AND INJURY MANAGEMENT ACT 1981 AND

EMPLOYERS' INDEMNITY POLICIES (PREMIUM RATES) ACT 1990

In pursuance of the Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981 and section 4 of the Employers' Indemnity Policies (Premium Rates) Act 1990, the WorkCover Western Australia Authority (WorkCover WA) has determined that the recommended premium rates in respect of employer indemnity policies shall be as set out in the attached schedule, effective from and after 4.00 pm on 30 June 2016.

The recommended premium rates have been calculated **exclusive** of the 10% Goods and Services Tax (referred to as GST), which was implemented by the Commonwealth Government on 1 July 2000.

An employer indemnity policy is defined under section 3 of the Employers' Indemnity Policies (Premium Rates) Act 1990 as a policy of insurance that gives to an employer, in addition to the insurance required by the Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981, such insurance against liability arising under the Fatal Accidents Act 1959, the Law Reform (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1941, the Law Reform (Contributory Negligence and Tortfeasor's Contribution) Act 1947 or at common law, as limited by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981, for personal injury sustained by a person employed by the employer under a contract of service or apprenticeship, as may be specified in the policy.

The recommended premium rate shall be applied to the aggregate amount of remuneration paid to an employer's workers, in accordance with the provisions of section 160 of the *Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981*.

For premium rating purposes, all premiums for a particular industry will be calculated on the same rate. Only one rate will apply for each establishment. An establishment is defined as a unit covering all the operations of a company conducted at or from a single location. If an employer conducts more than one industry at the same single location, the classification of the employer's predominant industry (based on gross remuneration) shall apply.

Depending upon an employer's individual risk factor, insurers may discount the recommended rate by any amount, or surcharge it within the limit imposed by section 152 of the Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981.

Appeals against classification or insurance premium assessed by the insurer, must be lodged under the provisions of section 154 of the *Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981* within one month from the date of being informed of the classification or premium payable.

7) In relation to WorkCover WA's KPI indicators on page 9 – will the Minister be able to tell the Committee, in relation to the number of non-compliance events, the proportion of conciliations completed in eight weeks and the proportion of disputes that were completed within six months – how many were based on a mental illness, recognising there may well be psychiatric implications for other injuries?

Answer:

Mental Conditions accounted for 3 per cent of all claims lodged between 1 July 2011 and 30 June 2016. WorkCover WA has data only on claims and disputes where mental health issues are the primary cause of illness.

KPI 1.1

KPI 1.1 reports the number of claims paid from the proceeds of the General Account administered by WorkCover WA. The fund operates as a 'safety net' arrangement so that injured workers employed by employers who do not hold insurance cover are not disadvantaged.

Between 2011/12 and 2015/16 there were no claims paid from the General Account to workers suffering from a primary mental health condition.

KPI 1.2

KPI 1.2 reports the proportion of conciliations completed within 8 weeks. The timeframe to complete an application for conciliation is measured from the date an application for conciliation is accepted to the date a certificate of outcome is issued by the Conciliation Officer.

8,575 conciliations were completed in the Conciliation and Arbitration Service between 1 December 2011 and 30 June 2016. 8,292 were resolved within 8 weeks. Of these 18 per cent involved mental health issues.

The dispute resolution timeframe is the period from the day a dispute is registered as accepted for conciliation through to the day the dispute is either recorded as completed (for conciliation) or closed and/or final orders issued, where the matter has proceeded to arbitration.

8,546 disputes were completed in the Conciliation and Arbitration Service between 1 December 2011 and 30 June 2016. Of those 17 per cent involved mental health issues.
