MY POSITION AND STATEMENT

- 1) I believe the current Western Australian laws on Advanced Health Directors and Enduring Power of Guardianship provide sufficient provision for citizens to make informed choices about their end of life options.
- 2) I do not support changing State laws to provide for voluntary euthanasia or physician assisted dying.

REASONING AND BACKGROUND

- 1) I have been present for my brother's and mother's death recently and seen palliative care in its best form.
- 2) I do not support euthanasia and physician assisted dying as they are currently promoted because this is not a way to address a difficult and complicated problem regarding suffering and end of life matters. There are significant risks associated with this change.
- 3) My knowledge of countries and states where assisted dying has been introduced indicated significant additional risks to the community. It has not been, in my view, successful.
- 4) Similar to mistakes made with capital punishment, there will be mistakes made with euthanasia, even if there are two physicians to decide.
- 5) Palliative care, properly managed, is a far better way to care for the less able within our society. It empowers our society and does not denigrate it as euthanasia does.
- 6) I believe we need to protect the chronically and mentally ill, together with those less able, in our society. Having the ability to euthanise them is not part of this care.
- 7) At the same time, I would strongly encourage more recognition and funding be applied to palliative care.

I'm happy to present my position to the committee if so required.
