Who is Cystic Fibrosis WA Inc.

- Not-for-profit Charitable Organisation est. 1974
- Since 1993 CFWA Contracted to provide a range of Comprehensive Home Care Services to Children, Young Adults families and their carers living with CF
- The only provider of specialist CF community care in WA
- Under the current contract (renewal in June 2009) net savings through reduction of bed days estimated at \$2.8m over three years <u>but more</u> could be saved with the following approach

What do we want?

 A fully resourced Adult Outpatient Clinic at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital within 12 months

Problem Definition

- The outpatient clinic at SCGH is severely under resourced
- Number of FTE's in the clinic 3 versus recommendation in Standards Of Care 16.1 – Ask is for 8.1(additional 5.1 FTEs)
- Growing number of adult patients 50:50 in 2009 approx 300 people in WA with CF
- Imminent retirement of Dr Gerry Ryan only one other adult CF physician in WA
- Lack of multidisciplinary resources available for Adult CF Outpatient Clinic – gastro, physiotherapist, dietician, nurse, social worker, psychologist, microbiologist, genetic counselor (ref page 19 of Standards Of Care)

Imperative

- Freeing up hospital bed days effective outpatient clinic reduces the frequency of hospital admissions
- Accelerating need large number of young adults will be transitioning over to SCGH in the next 5 years versus inadequate resources at SCGH. Hospital is seeking help from CFWA to fund services
- If current direction does not change worsening outcomes for adult CF's, increased frequency of hospital admissions, further pressure on beds, increased costs to the public
- Current situation is not sustainable even in the medium term

Clear Benefits

- Saves money
- Frees up resources within the hospital.
- Low cost, quick fix solution which will deliver sustainable benefits into the future – health outcomes and quality of life
- Provides a good foundation for the development of the model of care
