





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Geraldton Population and dwellings

There are a number of different ways of measuring the population of an area, all of which give an insight into the size of the place and its rate of growth over different time periods. The Census counts people where they are on the night of the Census (enumerated population) and also by where they usually live (usual residence). Both these populations are useful and form the basis for a range of characteristics collected in the Census.

However, the most accurate count of the total population is Estimated Resident Population, which factors in an estimate of those missed in the Census and those who were overseas on Census night. It is usually higher than either Census count, and is also updated annually after the Census, providing preliminary estimates for up to 5 years.

This page provides the three population counts for Geraldton at the last Census, with comparisons to previous Census years for the Census counts only. The current estimate for Geraldton at the most recent year available is shown at the top of the page. This figure is a preliminary estimate only and is subject to review after the next Census data are released. Please use with caution.

Also included are a range of sub-population groups and key statistics from the Census (usual resident) population, such as citizens, employed persons and Indigenous population.

These figures all provide the context for the size of the population and growth rate within Geraldton and should be looked at in conjunction with other basic demographic information, such as Age Structure, Dwelling Type and Household Size.

The data on this page are sourced from a variety of different tables and designed to give a range of population and dwelling numbers for the area.

Geraldton Estimated Resident Population (ERP)

The Estimated Resident Population (ERP) is the Australian Bureau of Statistics' official 2021 population figure for all Local Government Areas (LGAs) - but is subject to review after the next Census release. For areas smaller than LGAs, the ERP is derived from SA1 geographies based on population distribution from the previous Census. As such, these smaller geographies are subject to a greater level of revision each Census due to the change in actual numbers and in population distributions.


Populations are counted and estimated in various ways. The most comprehensive population count available in Australia is derived from the Census of Population and Housing conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics every five years. However the Census count is generally an under-estimate of the actual population, due to people missed in the Census and people overseas on Census night. To provide a more accurate population figure more frequently, the ABS also produces ERP numbers.




Percentage change in ERP - Geraldton compared to Western Australia

Geraldton Service age groups

The Age Structure of Geraldton provides key insights into the level of demand for age based services and facilities such as child care. It is an indicator of Geraldton's residential role and function and how it is likely to change in the future.

Service age groups divide the population into age categories that reflect typical life-stages. They indicate the level of demand for services that target people at different stages in life and how that demand is changing.

To get a more complete picture Geraldton's Age Structure should be viewed in conjunction with Household Types and Dwelling Types.



Age structure - service age groups, 2021



Dominant groups

Analysis of the service age groups of Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of people in the younger age groups (0 to 17 years) as well as a higher proportion of people in the older age groups (60+ years).

Overall, 24.0% of the population was aged between 0 and 17, and 24.1% were aged 60 years and over, compared with 22.6% and 21.8% respectively for Western Australia.

The major differences between the age structure of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of 'Empty nesters and retirees' (11.8% compared to 10.6%)
- A *larger* percentage of 'Older workers & pre-retirees' (13.6% compared to 12.6%)
- A *smaller* percentage of 'Young workforce' (11.9% compared to 14.0%)
- A smaller percentage of 'Parents and homebuilders' (18.9% compared to 20.8%)

Emerging groups

From 2016 to 2021, Geraldton's population increased by 825 people (2.2%). This represents an average annual population change of 0.43% per year over the period.

The largest changes in the age structure in this area between 2016 and 2021 were in the age groups:

- Seniors (70 to 84) (+814 people)
- Empty nesters and retirees (60 to 69) (+593 people)
- Parents and homebuilders (35 to 49) (-382 people)
- Tertiary education and independence (18 to 24) (-220 people)

Five year age groups

The Age Structure of Geraldton provides key insights into the level of demand for age based services and facilities such as child care. It is also an indicator of Geraldton's residential role and function and how it is likely to change in the future.

Five year age groups present a classic age profile of the population. Each age group covers exactly five years, which enables direct comparison between each group.

To get a more complete picture Geraldton's Age Structure should be viewed in conjunction with Household Types and Dwelling Types.



Age structure - five year age groups, 2021



Dominant groups

Analysis of the five year age groups of Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of people in the younger age groups (under 15) as well as a higher proportion of people in the older age groups (65+).

Overall, 19.9% of the population was aged between 0 and 15, and 17.6% were aged 65 years and over, compared with 19.0% and 16.1% respectively for Western Australia.

The major differences between the age structure of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 60 to 64 (6.4% compared to 5.7%)
- A smaller percentage of persons aged 30 to 34 (6.0% compared to 7.4%)
- A smaller percentage of persons aged 35 to 39 (6.2% compared to 7.6%)
- A smaller percentage of persons aged 25 to 29 (5.9% compared to 6.6%)

Emerging groups


From 2016 to 2021, Geraldton's population increased by 836 people (2.2%). This represents an average annual population change of 0.43% per year over the period.

The largest changes in age structure in this area between 2016 and 2021 were in the age groups:

- 70 to 74 (+469 persons)
- 60 to 64 (+355 persons)
- 45 to 49 (-304 persons)
- 65 to 69 (+231 persons)

The age-sex pyramid is a demographic tool which shows patterns of change in the age structure and sex ratio of an area over time. Its name comes from the traditional pyramid shape of an area which indicates a lot of children in large families, with a lower life expectancy and relatively few elderly. This shape is quite rare in developed nations like Australia. As nations and areas transition over time this shape turns into a column where there are less children a mix of ages including many elderly. Older areas with a lot of retirees or relatively few births may have a "reverse" pyramid formation where the largest proportion of the population is at the top of the chart. The sex ratio of males to females can also be seen - young areas are likely to have more males, while elderly areas generally have more females due to longer life expectancy.

The age-sex pyramid should be used in conjunction with Household Types and Dwelling Types information to build up a picture of who is living in the area and how it is changing over time.

Geraldton Ancestry

Ancestry defines the cultural association and ethnic background of an individual going back three generations. Ancestry is a good measure of the total size of cultural groups in Geraldton regardless of where they were born or what language they speak.

Ancestry data, should be combined with data on **Birthplace**, **Language Spoken at Home** and **Religion** for a more complete picture of Geraldton's ethnic characteristics.

Please note that the "Australian Aboriginal" and "Torres Strait Islander" categories in this topic are not directly comparable from 2021 to previous years, due to a change in the wording of the question. In 2021, these options were marked boxes on the question rather than write-in options. The "Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Origin" question is still considered a more reliable count for this group, and can be found on the **Population summary** page.




Ancestry, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the ancestry responses of the population in Geraldton in 2021 shows that the top five ancestries nominated were:

- English (15,139 people or 38.9%)
- Australian (15,122 people or 38.8%)
- Irish (3,599 people or 9.2%)
- Scottish (3,406 people or 8.7%)
- Australian Aboriginal (3,400 people or 8.7%)

In combination these five ancestries account for 40,666 responses in total, or 104.45% of all responses.

The major differences between the ancestries of the population in Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of people with Australian ancestry (38.8% compared to 29.7%)
- A larger percentage of people with Australian Aboriginal ancestry (8.7% compared to 3.0%)
- A *smaller* percentage of people with Chinese ancestry (0.8% compared to 4.4%)
- A *smaller* percentage of people with Indian ancestry (0.9% compared to 2.9%)

Emerging groups

The largest changes in the reported ancestries of the population in this area between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Australian Aboriginal (+2,940 persons)
- Australian (-1,287 persons)
- Scottish (+138 persons)
- Croatian (+79 persons)

Geraldton Birthplace

Country of Birth data identifies where people were born and is indicative of the level of cultural diversity in Geraldton. The mix of Country of Birth groups is also indicative of historical settlement patterns, as source countries for Australia's immigration program have varied significantly over time.

To get a more complete picture of cultural and ethnic characteristics, Geraldton's Country of Birth data should be viewed together with Ancestry, Language Spoken at Home and Religion.

Please note: Due to changes in ABS rules around perturbation and additivity of data to protect the confidentiality of individuals, counts of individual birthplace groups and totals derived from them may differ slightly from those published by the ABS. 


Birthplace, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the country of birth of the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a smaller proportion of people born overseas.

Overall, 14.3% of the population was born overseas, compared with 32.2% for Western Australia.

The largest non-English speaking country of birth in Geraldton was Philippines, where 1.2% of the population, or 462 people, were born.

The major differences between the countries of birth of the population in Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *smaller* percentage of people born in United Kingdom (4.5% compared to 8.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage of people born in India (0.6% compared to 2.3%)
- A smaller percentage of people born in New Zealand (1.7% compared to 2.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of people born in Malaysia (0.2% compared to 1.2%)

Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of people born overseas decreased by 94 or 1.7%.

Geraldton Overseas arrivals

The Year of Arrival data records when the overseas born population arrived in Australia. The data shows the degree to which areas are 'ports' for new overseas arrivals and reveals the role of Geraldton in housing the overseas-born. The number of recent overseas arrivals in an area is often determined by housing affordability, employment opportunities and pre-existing communities located in the area.

Geraldton's Year of Arrival data, when used with **Birthplace**, **Religion** and **Language Spoken at Home** data, is a good indicator of the likely need for services in migrant communities.



Dominant groups

Analysis of the year of arrival for the overseas born population of Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a larger proportion of people who arrived before 2001, and a smaller proportion of recent overseas arrivals (those who arrived between 2016 to Aug 2021).

Overall, 47.0% of the overseas born population arrived before 2001, and 11% arrived during or after 2016, compared with 42.4% and 13.2% respectively for Western Australia.

The major differences in year of arrival data in the population between Geraldton and Western Australia are:

- A larger percentage of arrivals between 1961 to 1970 (13.2% compared to 8.4%)
- A larger percentage of arrivals between Arrived in 1960 or earlier (6.7% compared to 3.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of arrivals between 2001 to 2010 (22.2% compared to 25.5%)
- A *smaller* percentage of arrivals between 1981 to 1990 (9.1% compared to 11.9%)

Geraldton Proficiency in English

Proficiency in English measures the self-assessed proficiency in spoken English of people who speak a language other than English at home. The data, when viewed with other ethnic and cultural indicators, such as Ancestry, Country of Birth, Language Spoken at Home and Religion, reflects Geraldton's ethnic composition and how long the overseas born have been in Australia. This helps service providers determine whether they need to communicate with the local population in languages other than English.



Proficiency in English, 2021


Total persons

Analysis of the proficiency in English data of the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of people who spoke English only, and a lower proportion of people who spoke another language and English not well or not at all.

Overall, 82.7% of people spoke English only, and 0.8% spoke another language and English not well or not at all, compared with 75.3% and 2.3% respectively for Western Australia.




Language spoken at home, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the language spoken at home by the population of Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a larger proportion of people who spoke English only, and a smaller proportion of those speaking a non-English language (either exclusively, or in addition to English).

Overall, 82.7% of the population spoke English only, and 7.6% spoke a non-English language, compared with 75.3% and 18.4% respectively for Western Australia.

The dominant language spoken at home, other than English, in Geraldton was Filipino/Tagalog, with 0.9% of the population, or 354 people speaking this language at home.

The major difference between the languages spoken at home for the population of Geraldton and Western Australia in 2021 was:

• A *smaller* percentage speaking Mandarin at home (0.3% compared to 1.9%)

Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of people who spoke a language other than English at home increased by 141 or 5.0%, and the number of people who spoke English only increased by 240 or 0.8%.

Geraldton Religion

Geraldton's religion statistics provide an indicator of cultural identity and ethnicity when observed in conjunction with other key variables. Religion data reveal the major concentrations of religions as well as revealing the proportion of people with no religious affiliation. There are a number of reasons for different religious compositions across areas including the country of birth and ethnic background of the population, the age of the population (belief in religion is generally stronger, the older the population) and changes in values and belief systems.

Geraldton's religion statistics should be analysed in conjunction with other ethnicity statistics such as **Country of Birth** data and **Language Spoken** data to assist in identifying specific cultural and ethnic groups.




Religion, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the religious affiliation of the population of Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a lower proportion of people who professed a religion as well as a lower proportion who stated they had no religion.

Overall, 47.8% of the population nominated a religion, and 41.2% said they had no religion, compared with 49.1% and 42.8% respectively for Western Australia.

The largest single religion in Geraldton was Western (Roman) Catholic, with 22.2% of the population or 8,647 people as adherents.

The major differences between the religious affiliation for the population of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage who nominated Western (Roman) Catholic (22.2% compared to 18.6%)
- A *larger* percentage who nominated Anglican (12.0% compared to 10.1%)
- A smaller percentage who nominated Hinduism (0.4% compared to 2.0%)
- A *smaller* percentage who nominated Buddhism (0.9% compared to 2.2%)

Emerging groups

The largest changes in the religious affiliation of the population in Geraldton between 2016 and 2021 were for those who nominated:

- Anglican (-1,652 persons)
- Western (Roman) Catholic (-1,452 persons)




Highest qualification achieved, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the qualifications of the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a lower proportion of people holding formal qualifications (Bachelor or higher degree; Advanced Diploma or Diploma; or Vocational qualifications), and a higher proportion of people with no formal qualifications.

Overall, 46.0% of the population aged 15 and over held educational qualifications, and 41.8% had no qualifications, compared with 54.3% and 36.5% respectively for Western Australia.




Highest level of schooling completed, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the highest level of schooling attained by the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of people who had left school at an early level (Year 10 or less) and a lower proportion of people who completed Year 12 or equivalent.

Overall, 37.2% of the population left school at Year 10 or below, and 39.6% went on to complete Year 12 or equivalent, compared with 27.3% and 56.0% respectively for Western Australia.

The major differences between the level of schooling attained by the population in Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons who completed year 10 or equivalent (26.8% compared to 19.7%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons who completed year 11 or equivalent (13.2% compared to 9.6%)

Geraldton Education institution attending

The share of Geraldton's population attending educational institutions reflects the age structure of the population, as it is influenced by the number of children attending school; proximity to tertiary education, which can mean young adults leaving home to be nearer to educational facilities and; the degree to which people are seeking out educational opportunities in adulthood, especially in their late teens and early twenties.

This data is often combined with Age Structure to identify areas with significant university student populations.




Education institution attending, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the share of the population attending educational institutions in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a similar proportion attending primary school, a similar proportion attending secondary school, and a lower proportion engaged in tertiary level education.

Overall, 8.2% of the population were attending primary school, 6.8% of the population were attending secondary institutions, and 4.3% were learning at a tertiary level, compared with 8.4%, 6.6% and 6.5% respectively for Western Australia.

The major differences between the share of the population attending learning institutions in Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *smaller* percentage of persons attending University (1.6% compared to 4.2%)
- A smaller percentage of persons attending a Government primary school (4.5% compared to 5.9%)

From 2016 to 2021, Geraldton's population increased by 1,293 people (+3.4%). This represents an average annual change of 0.68% per year over the period.

Geraldton Need for assistance



Need for assistance with core activities, 2021




Persons who need assistance by age group (years)

Dominant groups

Analysis of the need for assistance of people in Geraldton compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of people who reported needing assistance with core activities.

Overall, 5.4% of the population reported needing assistance with core activities, compared with 4.6% for Western Australia.

The major differences in the age groups reporting a need for assistance in Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A larger percentage of persons aged 75 to 79 (17.8% compared to 14.3%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 70 to 74 (10.8% compared to 8.9%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 5 to 9 (4.6% compared to 3.6%)

Emerging groups

The major differences in the age groups reporting a need for assistance between 2016 and 2021 in Geraldton were in the age groups:

- 5 to 9 (+69 persons)
- 85 and over (+67 persons)
- 75 to 79 (+57 persons)
- 10 to 19 (+55 persons)

Geraldton

The 2021 Census looked for the first time at the level of incidence of selected long-term health conditions in the community. The Census question asked respondents if they have been diagnosed with a specific condition (or other condition) from a list of ten conditions plus "other". Combined, these ten conditions comprise approximately 60% of Australia's deaths, and even those which are not deadly contribute substantially to the burden of disease.

It is well known that socio-economic factors also contribute to morbidity and health outcomes, with lower-socio economic characteristics correlated with higher incidence of some health conditions. The inclusion of this topic in the Census enables these factors to be explored in more detail.

Also, in society, health conditions tend to increase with age. For these reasons, it is recommended that long-term health conditions data for be viewed at in conjunction with age structure, household income, educational qualifications, and need for assistance datasets, along with the SEIFA index of disadvantage.



Dominant groups

Analysis of the long term health conditions of Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of people with a long-term health condition 32.5% compared to 29.9% in Western Australia.

The major differences in the long-term health conditions between Geraldton and Western Australia are:

- A *larger* percentage with asthma (8.7% compared to 7.3%)
- A larger percentage with diabetes (5.6% compared to 4.4%)
- A *larger* percentage with arthritis (8.6% compared to 7.6%)
- A *larger* percentage with mental health condition (9.2% compared to 8.3%)

Geraldton Employment status

Geraldton's employment statistics are an important indicator of socio-economic status. The levels of full or parttime employment, unemployment and labour force participation indicate the strength of the local economy and social characteristics of the population. Employment status is linked to a number of factors including Age Structure, which influences the number of people in the workforce; the economic base and employment opportunities available in the area and; the education and skill base of the population (Occupations, Industries, Qualifications).

The two most important measures are:

- Unemployment rate the number of people looking for work, as a percentage of the labour force (employed and unemployed over 15)
- Participation rate the labour force expressed as a percentage of the total population over 15

Please note that in the 2021 Census, due to the COVID pandemic and lockdowns in many areas, the proportion of people who were employed but away from work in the week before Census has increased. We have no information on whether these people were normally employed full or part time so this is shown separately.



Employment status, 2021


Total persons in the labour force

Dominant groups

The size of Geraldton's labour force in 2021 was 18,708, of which 6,042 were employed part-time and 10,490 were full time workers.

Analysis of the employment status (as a percentage of the labour force) in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a similar proportion in employment, as well as a similar proportion unemployed. Overall, 94.8% of the labour force was employed, and 5.2% unemployed, compared with 94.9% and 5.1% respectively for Western Australia.

Analysis of the labour force participation rate of the population in Geraldton in 2021 shows that there was a lower proportion in the labour force (60.0%) compared with Western Australia (63.9%).

Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of people employed in Geraldton showed an increase of 1,238, and the number unemployed showed a decrease of 628. In the same period, the number of people in the labour force showed an increase of 610 or 3.4%.

Geraldton Industry sector of employment

Geraldton's industry statistics identify the industry sectors in which the residents work (which may be within the residing area or elsewhere). This will be influenced by the skill base and socio-economic status of the residents as well as the industries and employment opportunities present in the region.

When viewed in conjunction with **Residents Place of Work** data and **Method of Travel to Work**, industry sector statistics provide insights into the relationship between the economic and residential role of the area.



Industry sector of employment, 2021


Total employed persons

Dominant groups

An analysis of the jobs held by the resident population in Geraldton in 2021 shows the three most popular industry sectors were:

- Health Care and Social Assistance (2,745 people or 15.5%)
- Retail Trade (1,888 people or 10.6%)
- Education and Training (1,846 people or 10.4%)

In combination, these three industries employed 6,479 people in total or 36.5% of the total employed resident population.

In comparison, Western Australia employed 13.6% in Health Care and Social Assistance; 8.8% in Retail Trade; and 8.8% in Education and Training.

The major differences between the jobs held by the population of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons employed in transport, postal and warehousing (6.4% compared to 4.5%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons employed in health care and social assistance (15.5% compared to 13.6%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons employed in professional, scientific and technical services (3.7% compared to 6.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons employed in manufacturing (2.6% compared to 5.3%)

Emerging groups

The number of employed people in Geraldton increased by 1,251 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest changes in the jobs held by the resident population between 2016 and 2021 in Geraldton were for those employed in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance (+646 persons)
- Mining (+287 persons)
- Education and Training (+192 persons)
- Accommodation and Food Services (+127 persons)

Geraldton Occupation of employment

Geraldton's occupation statistics quantify the occupations in which the residents work (which may be within the residing area or elsewhere). This will be influenced by the economic base and employment opportunities available in the area, education levels, and the working and social aspirations of the population. When viewed with other indicators, such as Educational Qualifications and Individual Income, Occupation is a key measure for evaluating Geraldton's socio-economic status and skill base.



Occupation of employment, 2021


Total employed persons

Dominant groups

An analysis of the jobs held by the resident population in Geraldton in 2021 shows the three most popular occupations were:

- Professionals (3,009 people or 17.0%)
- Technicians and Trades Workers (3,002 people or 16.9%)
- Community and Personal Service Workers (2,399 people or 13.5%)

In combination these three occupations accounted for 8,410 people in total or 47.4% of the employed resident population.

In comparison, Western Australia employed 22.0% in Professionals; 15.3% in Technicians and Trades Workers; and 11.8% in Community and Personal Service Workers.

The major differences between the jobs held by the population of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons employed as Labourers (11.3% compared to 9.4%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons employed as Community and Personal Service Workers (13.5% compared to 11.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons employed as Professionals (17.0% compared to 22.0%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons employed as Managers (10.1% compared to 12.3%)

Emerging groups

The number of employed people in Geraldton increased by 1,242 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest changes in the occupations of residents between 2016 and 2021 in Geraldton were for those employed as:

- Community and Personal Service Workers (+505 persons)
- Professionals (+339 persons)
- Technicians and Trades Workers (+181 persons)
- Machinery Operators And Drivers (+144 persons)

Geraldton Method of travel to work

Geraldton's commuting statistics reveal the main modes of transport by which residents get to work. There are a number of reasons why people use different modes of transport to get to work including the availability of affordable and effective public transport options, the number of motor vehicles available within a household, and the distance travelled to work.

Commuting data is very useful in transport planning as it informs decision-makers about the availability, effectiveness and utilisation of local transport options, particularly when analysed with Residents Place of Work data and Car Ownership.

WARNING: Method of travel to work relates to Census day, which for the 2021 Census occurred during COVID-19 lockdowns for large parts of Australia. In lockdown, many occupations were required to work from home if possible, and some industries were closed, so people did not go to work. For this reason, these categories may have increased, with corresponding declines in other methods of travel. Use the data with caution when comparing over time. 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

Method of travel to work, 2021


Total employed persons

Dominant groups

In 2021, there were 260 people who caught public transport to work (train, bus, tram or ferry) in Geraldton, compared with 13,614 who drove in private vehicles (car – as driver, car – as passenger, motorbike, or truck).

Analysis of the method of travel to work of the residents in Geraldton in 2021, compared to Western Australia, shows that 1.5% used public transport, while 75.3% used a private vehicle, compared with 7.4% and 66.7% respectively in Western Australia.

The major differences in persons between the method of travel to work of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons who travelled by car (as driver) (69.6% compared to 62.1%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who travelled by train (0.1% compared to 4.0%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who worked at home (4.2% compared to 7.5%)
- A smaller percentage of persons who travelled by bus (1.4% compared to 3.3%)

Emerging groups

The number of employed people in Geraldton increased by 1,244 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest changes in the method of travel to work by resident population in Geraldton between 2016 and 2021 were for those nominated:

- Car as driver (+836 persons)
- Did not go to work (+433 persons)
- Other (+331 persons)
- Train (-278 persons)

Geraldton Disengagement by age

Engagement in employment and education looks at the level of participation by age and sex of the population in the labour market, or full or part-time education. A full time employed or full-time student would be "Fully engaged", while part-time students may be fully engaged if they are also employed, or partly engaged if they are not working. Engagement in the labour and education market is highly dependent on age. Retirees are generally disengaged, while stay-at-home parents are also likely to be disengaged. The rate of engagement, particularly in the younger and working age groups can be affected by access to strong employment and education markets and is a measure of socio-economic status and the level of welfare dependency in an area. For more detail on employment and educational characteristics associated with disengagement, please look at Employment Status, Qualifications and Educational Institution Attending.



Disengaged persons by age, 2021


Total disengaged persons under 65 years

The number of people aged 15 to 24 years in Geraldton in 2016 was 4,524, of this, 12.1% were disengaged and 16.7% were partially engaged, compared to 8.8% and 13.0% respectively for Western Australia.

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of people 15 to 24 years in Geraldton showed a decrease of -330.

The number of disengaged people aged 15 to 24 years showed a decrease of 173 or 24.0%.

Geraldton Volunteer work

The voluntary work sector is an important part of Australia's economy. The level of volunteering can indicate the cohesiveness of the community and how readily individuals are able to contribute to that community. Factors impacting on the level of volunteering in Geraldton include the Age Structure of the population, the level of Proficiency in English, Income and Education levels.

Volunteer numbers for the 2021 Census declined in many parts of Australia due to lockdowns and COVID-19 distancing measures.





Analysis of the voluntary work performed by the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a similar proportion of people who volunteered for an organisation or group.

Overall, 16.2% of the population reported performing voluntary work, compared with 15.9% for Western Australia.

Emerging groups

The number of volunteers in Geraldton decreased by 1,096 people between 2016 and 2021.

Geraldton Unpaid domestic work

There has been increased interest in identifying, acknowledging and valuing the unpaid work that supports home and community life. The changing amount of time spent on unpaid housework in different Household Types and, particularly the distribution of this work within the household, can indicate the changing roles of males, females and older children in society. The level of unpaid domestic work in Geraldton may also be related to Household Income, as higher income households are able to outsource some of these tasks.





Dominant groups

Analysis of the unpaid domestic work performed by the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of persons who performed 15 hours or more of unpaid domestic work per week.

Overall, 21% of the population reported performing 15 hours or more of unpaid domestic work, compared with 20.1% for Western Australia.

The major differences between the share of the population performing unpaid domestic work in Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons who did 30 hours or more of domestic work (9.6% compared to 8.7%)
- A smaller percentage of persons who did less than 5 hours of domestic work (17.9% compared to 20.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who did unpaid domestic work (total) (65.7% compared to 67.9%)
- A smaller percentage of persons who did no unpaid domestic work (23.7% compared to 24.8%)

Emerging groups

The largest changes in the number of people performing unpaid domestic work in Geraldton, between 2016 and 2021 were those who:

- Did no unpaid domestic work (+1,290 persons)
- Between 5 and 14 hours (+513 persons)
- 30 hours or more (-308 persons)
- Less than 5 hours (-267 persons)

Geraldton Unpaid care

The proportion of people providing unpaid care for the aged and disabled in Geraldton can be an important indicator of the level of demand for aged care services and facilities by local and state governments. An increasing proportion of carers among the population may indicate inadequate aged care provision, or the need for in-home support, or support for the carers themselves. The level of care provided by individuals is likely to be affected by Household Income, Age Structure and the ethnic makeup of the community (Language Spoken), as well as the sense of community cohesiveness.





Dominant groups

Analysis of the unpaid care provided by the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a similar proportion of people who provided unpaid care either to family members or others.

Overall, 10.9% of the population provided unpaid care, compared with 10.7% for Western Australia.

Emerging groups

The number of people who provided unpaid assistance to a person with a disability, long term illness or old age in Geraldton increased by 286 between 2016 and 2021.

Geraldton Unpaid childcare

The role of unpaid childcare in Geraldton is determined by many different factors. For example areas with high levels of unpaid child care may have a dominance of single income families with one significant earner, or there could be a lack of provision of paid child care in the area. The level to which people care for others children can also indicate the role of extended family (eg. grandparents caring for grandchildren, family day care).

The role of unpaid child care is a complex one so this topic should be viewed in conjunction with several others, including Household Type, Employment, Household Income and Educational Attendance.





Dominant groups

Analysis of the unpaid child care provided by the population in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a lower proportion of people who provided unpaid child care either to their own or to other children. Overall, 26.4% of the population provided unpaid child care, compared with 28.5% for Western Australia.

The major differences between the share of the population providing unpaid child care in Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A *smaller* percentage who provided unpaid childcare for own child/ren (18.4% compared to 20.5%)
- A *smaller* percentage who did not provide care for children (63.2% compared to 64.4%)

Emerging groups

The number of people who provided unpaid child care for their own and/or other people's children in Geraldton decreased by 200 between 2016 and 2021.

- No unpaid child care provided (+1,325 persons)
- Cared for own child/ren (-220 persons)

Analysis of individual income levels in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a lower proportion of people earning a high income (those earning \$2,000 per week or more) and a similar proportion of low income people (those earning less than \$500 per week).

Overall, 11.6% of the population earned a high income, and 31.4% earned a low income, compared with 14.7% and 31.3% respectively for Western Australia.










Household income quartiles, 2021

Equivalised household income

While **Household Income** is a useful measure, it is difficult to tell if changes over time and between geographic areas are due to actual changes in income levels, or due to changes in household size and composition. For example, an increase in lower income households could be due to job losses in key economic sectors, or simply due to decreasing household size as adult children leave home.

Equivalised Household Income puts all households on an equal footing independent of household size and composition to enable a true comparison between areas and over time. It is an indicator of the income resource available to a household of standard size and is the best measure of the changing economic fortunes of households living in Geraldton.









Dominant groups

Analysis of the household/family types in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a lower proportion of couple families with child(ren) as well as a higher proportion of one-parent families. Overall, 24.5% of total families were couple families with child(ren), and 11.3% were one-parent families, compared with 30.2% and 10.0% respectively for Western Australia.

There were a higher proportion of lone person households and a higher proportion of couples without children. Overall, the proportion of lone person households was 25.3% compared to 23.8% in Western Australia while the proportion of couples without children was 26.0% compared to 25.4% in Western Australia.

Emerging groups

The number of households in Geraldton increased by 880 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest changes in family/household types in Geraldton between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Lone person (+569 households)
- Couples without children (+168 households)
- Couples with children (-162 households)
- One parent families (+76 households)

Geraldton Households with children

Households with Children require different services and facilities than other household types, and their needs change as both adults and children age. When many families in an area are at the same stage in their individual lifecycles, it creates a suburb lifecycle. Knowing where a suburb is in a cycle of change helps planners make evidence-based decisions about the demand for services both now and in the future.

For Households with Children in Geraldton, life stage is based on the age of children in the household. The age of the parent(s) is not taken into account.

- Young children: Children aged under 15 only
- **Mixed age children:** One or more children under 15 and one or more children over 15 (must have 2 or more children)
- Older children: Children aged 15 and over only





Dominant groups

Analysis of the families with children in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a smaller proportion of couples with young children, as well as a smaller proportion of couples with older children.

Overall, 14.1% of total households with children were couple with young children, and 6.7% were couples with older children, compared with 17.1% and 8.8% respectively for Western Australia.

There were a larger proportion of single parent households with young children and a similar proportion of single parent households with older children. Overall, the proportion of single parent households with young children was 4.8% compared to 3.9% in Western Australia while the proportion of single parent households with older children was 4.8% compared to 4.8% in Western Australia.

Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of households with children decreased by 86 households or 1.5%.

The largest changes in households with children in this area between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Couples with older children (-83 households)
- Single parents with older children (+56 households)

Geraldton Households without children

Households without Children include couples without children and lone person households. They require different services depending on the age of the people in the households. For example young couples who have not had children (yet) compared to older "empty nester" couples whose children may have left home.

For Households without Children in Geraldton, life stage is based on the age of the household reference person (usually person 1 on the Census form):

- Young: Aged 15-44
- Middle-aged: Aged 45-64
- Older: Aged 65 and over




Households without children, 2021

Dominant groups

Analysis of the households without children in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a smaller proportion of young couples without children, a larger proportion of middle-aged couples without children, and a similar proportion of older couples without children.

In addition, there were a similar proportion of young lone person households, a larger proportion of middle-aged lone person households, and a similar proportion of older lone person households.

Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of households without children increased by 728.

The largest changes in households without children in Geraldton, between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Older lone persons (+268 persons)
- Older couples without children (+202 persons)
- Middle-aged lone persons (+160 persons)

Geraldton Household size

The size of households in general follows the life-cycle of families. Households are usually small at the stage of relationship formation (early marriage), and then increase in size with the advent of children. They later reduce in size again as these children reach adulthood and leave home. Household size can also be influenced by a lack (or abundance) of affordable housing. Overseas migrants and indigenous persons often have a tradition of living with extended family members which significantly affects household size.

Household size in Australia has generally declined since the 1970s, but the rate of decline has slowed in recent years.

An increasing household size in an area may indicate a lack of affordable housing opportunities for young people, an increase in the birth rate or an increase in family formation in the area. A declining household size may indicate children leaving the area when they leave home, an increase in retirees settling in the area, or an attraction of young singles and couples to the area.

For greater insight, Geraldton's Household Size data should be viewed in conjunction with Household Summary, Age Structure, Dwelling Type, Household Income and Language Spoken at Home.





Dominant groups

Analysis of the number of persons usually resident in a household in Geraldton compared with Western Australia shows that there were a higher proportion of lone person households, and a lower proportion of larger households (those with 4 persons or more). Overall there were 28.0% of lone person households, and 21.8% of larger households, compared with 25.4% and 25.2% respectively for Western Australia.

The major differences in the household size for Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A larger percentage of households with 1 person usually resident (28.0% compared to 25.4%)
- A larger percentage of households with 2 persons usually resident (35.6% compared to 33.5%)
- A smaller percentage of households with 4 persons usually resident (13.0% compared to 15.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage of households with 3 persons usually resident (14.6% compared to 15.9%)





Dominant groups

Analysis of the family blending in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a higher proportion of step families as well as a higher proportion of blended families. Overall, 18.5% of total couple families with children were step families, and 5.3% were blended families, compared with 13.5% and 3.8% respectively for Western Australia.

There were a similar proportion of other families and a lower proportion of couples without children. Overall, the proportion of other families was 0.9% compared to 0.6% in Western Australia while the proportion of intact families was 75.3% compared to 82.2% in Western Australia.

Emerging groups

The number of couple families with children in Geraldton decreased by 161 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest changes in family blending in Geraldton between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Intact Family (-561 couples with children)
- Step family (+410 couples with children)

Geraldton Dwelling type

Dwelling Type is an important determinant of Geraldton's residential role and function. A greater concentration of higher density dwellings is likely to attract more young adults and smaller households, often renting. Larger, detached or separate dwellings are more likely to attract families and prospective families. The residential built form often reflects market opportunities or planning policy, such as building denser forms of housing around public transport nodes or employment centres.

Dwelling Type statistics should be viewed in conjunction with Household Size, Household Types, Housing Tenure and Age Structure for a more complete picture of the housing market in Geraldton.





Dominant groups

In 2021, there were 14,644 separate houses in the area, 2,469 medium density dwellings, and 50 high density dwellings. In addition, there were 321 caravans/cabins/houseboats in the area.

Analysis of the types of dwellings in Geraldton in 2021 shows that 82.9% of all dwellings were separate houses; 14.0% were medium density dwellings, and 0.3% were in high density dwellings, compared with 77.1%, 15.9%, and 4.8% in the Western Australia respectively.

In 2021, a total of 88.4% of the dwellings in Geraldton were occupied on Census night, compared to 89.5% in Western Australia. The proportion of unoccupied dwellings was 11.4%, which is larger compared to that found in Western Australia (10.3%).

Emerging groups

The total number of dwellings in Geraldton increased by 226 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest changes in the type of dwellings found in Geraldton between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Separate house (+515 dwellings)
- Other (-82 dwellings)
- Caravans, cabin, houseboat (+51 dwellings)

Geraldton

Number of bedrooms per dwelling

The Number of Bedrooms in a dwelling is an indicator of the size of dwellings, and when combined with **Dwelling Type** information, provides insight into the role Geraldton plays in the housing market. For example, an area of high density dwellings that are predominantly 1-2 bedroom are likely to attract students, single workers and young couples, whereas a high density area with dwellings that are predominantly 2-3 bedroom may attract more empty nesters and some families.


In combination with **Household Type** and **Household Size**, the Number of Bedrooms can also indicate issues around housing affordability, overcrowding and other socio-economic factors.



Dominant groups

Analysis of the number of bedrooms in dwellings in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a lower proportion of dwellings with 2 bedrooms or less, as well as a lower proportion of dwellings with 4 or more bedrooms.

Overall, 15.5% of households were in dwellings with 2 bedrooms or less, and 40.7% of 4 or more bedroom dwellings, compared with 16.9% and 42.2% for Western Australia respectively.

An internet connection is now an important utility for most households in Australia. It is increasingly required for accessing essential information and taking part in the digital economy. Australia-wide in 2016, nearly 80% of all households had internet access. However, this decreases with age – seniors are less likely to have internet access at home. The lack of internet access is likely to indicate a level of disadvantage and could be related to socio-economic factors, age, or geographical isolation.



Type of internet connection



Number of cars per household

The ability of the population to access services and employment is strongly influenced by access to transport. The number of motor vehicles per household in Geraldton quantifies access to private transport and will be influenced by **Age Structure** and **Household Type**, which determine the number of adults present; access to **Public Transport**; distance to shops, services, employment and education; and **Household Income**. Depending on these factors, car ownership can be seen as a measure of advantage or disadvantage, or a neutral socio-economic measure, which impacts on the environment and quality of life.





Dominant groups

Analysis of the car ownership of the households in Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that 87.2% of the households owned at least one car, while 4.5% did not, compared with 89.8% and 4.8% respectively in Western Australia.

Of those that owned at least one vehicle, there was a smaller proportion who owned just one car; a smaller proportion who owned two cars; and a similar proportion who owned three cars or more.

Overall, 32.5% of the households owned one car; 35.1% owned two cars; and 19.6% owned three cars or more, compared with 33.2%; 37.0% and 19.5% respectively for Western Australia.

Emerging groups

The largest changes in the household car ownership in Geraldton between 2016 and 2021 were:

- 1 motor vehicle (+751 households)
- 2 motor vehicles (+341 households)

Geraldton Housing tenure

Geraldton's Housing Tenure data provides insights into its socio-economic status as well as the role it plays in the housing market. For example, a high concentration of private renters may indicate a transient area attractive to young singles and couples, while a concentration of home owners indicates a more settled area with mature families and empty-nesters (Household Summary). Tenure can also reflect built form (Dwelling Type), with a significantly higher share of renters in high density housing and a substantially larger proportion of home-owners in separate houses, although this is not always the case.

In conjunction with other socio-economic status indicators in Geraldton, Tenure data is useful for analysing housing markets, housing affordability and identifying public housing areas.



Dominant groups

Analysis of the housing tenure of households of Geraldton in 2021 compared to Western Australia shows that there was a larger proportion of households who owned their dwelling; a smaller proportion purchasing their dwelling; and a larger proportion who were renters.

Overall, 29.8% of households owned their dwelling; 32.1% were purchasing, and 27.7% were renting, compared with 28.3%, 37.6% and 26.4% respectively for Western Australia.

Emerging groups

The largest changes in housing tenure categories for the households in Geraldton between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Fully owned (+410 households)
- Renting Private (+334 households)
- Renting Social housing (-195 households)
- Mortgage (+185 households)

The total number of households in Geraldton increased by 758 between 2016 and 2021.

Geraldton Housing loan repayments

Mortgage repayments are directly related to house prices in Geraldton, length of occupancy and the level of equity of home owners. When viewed with **Household Income** data it may also indicate the level of housing stress households in the community are under. In mortgage belt areas it is expected that households will be paying a higher proportion of their income on their housing compared to well-established areas. First home buyer areas are also likely to have larger mortgages than upgrader areas where households move in with equity from elsewhere.



Dominant groups

Analysis of the monthly housing loan repayments of households in Geraldton compared to Western Australia shows that there was a smaller proportion of households paying high mortgage repayments (\$2,600 per month or more), and a larger proportion of households with low mortgage repayments (less than \$1,200 per month).

Overall, 13.6% of households were paying high mortgage repayments, and 28.3% were paying low repayments, compared with 21.8% and 19.6% respectively in Western Australia.

The major differences between the household loan repayments of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A larger percentage of \$600 \$999 (11.8% compared to 6.5%)
- A larger percentage of \$1,200 \$1,399 (10.8% compared to 7.7%)
- A larger percentage of \$1,000 \$1,199 (8.5% compared to 5.7%)
- A *smaller* percentage of \$3,000-\$3,999 (5.4% compared to 8.5%)

Geraldton Housing loan quartiles

Mortgage repayments in Geraldton are directly related to house prices, length of occupancy and the level of equity of home owners. When viewed with **Household Income** data it may also indicate the level of housing stress in the community.

The quartile method is the most objective method of comparing change in the mortgage payment profile of a community over time.





Housing loan repayment quartiles allow us to compare relative repayment liabilities across time. Analysis of the distribution of households by housing loan repayment quartiles in Geraldton compared to Western Australia shows that there was a smaller proportion of households in the highest repayment quartile, and a larger proportion in the lowest repayment quartile.

Emerging groups

The total number of households with a mortgage in Geraldton decreased by 4,632 between 2016 and 2021. The most significant change in Geraldton during this period was in the lowest quartile which showed an increase of 240 households.

Geraldton Housing rental payments

Rental payments can be a better measure of the cost of housing in Geraldton than mortgage repayments because they are not contingent on length of occupancy or equity in the dwelling.

High rental payments may indicate desirable areas with mobile populations who prefer to rent, or a housing shortage, or gentrification. Low rental payments may indicate public housing (check **Tenure Type**), or areas where low income households move by necessity for a lower cost of living.

Rental payments are not directly comparable over time because of inflation. For comparison of rental payments over time, go to Housing Rental Quartiles.



Dominant groups

Analysis of the weekly housing rental payments of households in Geraldton compared to Western Australia shows that there was a smaller proportion of households paying high rental payments (\$450 per week or more), and a larger proportion of households with low rental payments (less than \$250 per week).

Overall, 3.8% of households were paying high rental payments, and 39.6% were paying low payments, compared with 19.4% and 21.6% respectively in Western Australia.

The major differences between the housing rental payments of Geraldton and Western Australia were:

- A larger percentage of \$200-\$249 (17.9% compared to 7.2%)
- A larger percentage of \$250-\$299 (19.1% compared to 11.2%)
- A *larger* percentage of \$150-\$199 (12.8% compared to 5.3%)
- A *smaller* percentage of \$400-\$449 (4.1% compared to 11.2%)

Geraldton Housing rental quartiles

Rental payments in Geraldton are indicative of its residential role and function and are directly related to the value of residential property. When viewed with **Household Income** data they may also indicate the level of 'housing stress' in the community.

The quartile method is the most objective method of comparing change in the rental costs of a community over time.





Rental payment quartiles allow us to compare relative rental liabilities across time. Analysis of the distribution of households by rental payment quartiles in Geraldton compared to Western Australia shows that there was a smaller proportion of households in the highest payment quartile, and a larger proportion in the lowest payment quartile.

Emerging groups

The total number of households renting their dwelling in Geraldton increased by 87 between 2016 and 2021. The most significant change during this period was in the lowest quartile which showed an increase of 265 households.

Residential building approvals

The Western Australia Parliamentary Library's building approvals are used as a leading indicator of the general level of residential development, economic activity, employment and investment. Residential building activity depends on many factors that vary with the state of the economy including interest rates, availability of mortgage funds, government spending, and business investment. Large financial changes or shocks, such as the Global Financial Crisis of 2008/09 can be observed in the data. However, the number of building approvals can fluctuate substantially from year to year simply as a result of the short-term nature of many construction projects, and the cyclical nature of the industry.



About the community profile

Demographic change across Australia is recorded by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) in the Census collections every five years. Population experts .id (informed decisions) analyse and convert these raw figures into stories of place to inform council staff, community groups, investors, business, students and the general public.

The Western Australia Parliamentary Library Electorate Profiles provides demographic analysis for the State and its suburbs based on results from the 2016, 2011, 2006, 2001, 1996 and 1991 Censuses of Population and Housing. The profile is updated with population estimates when the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) releases new figures such as the annual Estimated Resident Population (ERP).

Suburb boundaries and Census questions change over time, but .id manages the data to ensure that there is an accurate time series provided for the current geographic boundaries. You can read more about this in the **Geography Notes** section.

Results for the Western Australia Parliamentary Library include population, age structure, ethnicity, ancestry, religion, income, qualifications, occupations, employment, unemployment, disability, disadvantage, volunteering, childcare, family structure, household structure, housing tenure, mortgage and rental payments, and the size and type of the dwellings people live in.

The Community Profile presents this information in clear maps, tables and charts with concise factual commentary to answer three important questions:

- 1. What are the characteristics of the people who live here?
- 2. How are they changing?
- 3. How do they compare to other areas?
