SYNOPSIS OF BILLS

2005

The following synopsis of Bills introduced during the First Session of the Thirty-Seventh Parliament is intended only to give a brief outline of the main features of each Bill at the stage when the second reading motion of the Bill was moved. The full second reading speech for each Bill is available in *Parliamentary Debates (Hansard)* which are available from the State Law Publisher or from the Parliament of WA Internet site (address: www.parliament.wa.gov.au). The ultimate stage reached by each Bill is also indicated. While it does not take into account amendments made in either House, reference can be made to the *Votes and Proceedings* of the Legislative Assembly and the *Minutes* of the Legislative Council where amendments have been agreed to.

- * Indicates the Act or parts thereof, comes into operation on a date or dates to be fixed by Proclamation.
- LC Indicates the Bill originated in the Legislative Council; all other Bills without LC originated in the Legislative Assembly.
- (P.D.p.) Indicates the *Hansard* page number for the second reading of the Bill in the House in which it was first introduced.
- Note: Explanatory Memorandum are provided with all bills First Read in the Legislative Assembly (S.O 162)

Acts Amendment (Higher School Leaving Age and Related Provisions) Bill 2005 (No. 077)

This Bill raises the school leaving age and at the same time ensures that there is legislative provision for the broadest possible range of participation options for the young people affected by the raised age. The Bill also provides for a database of student records which will ensure that accurate information on young people's participation in education, training and employment is maintained from the eighth to the twelfth year of the extended compulsory education period. The Bill seeks to achieve these three objectives through amendments to the *School Education Act 1999* and the *Curriculum Council Act 1997*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 25 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4630).

(Act No. 22 of 2005 – assented to on 18 November 2005)

Agriculture and Related Resources Protection Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 052)

The purpose of this Bill is to effect a change in the ability to raise rates to control declared plants and animals in the pastoral area of the State. The amendments will remove current provisions for a general agriculture protection rate on land held under pastoral lease, and instead enable the quantum of the rate to be set in relation to pastoral leases within particular zones, with the funds raised still matched dollar-for-dollar by the State Government. The ability to raise further, unmatched rates will remain.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3336).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Alcohol and Drug Authority Repeal 2005 (No. 070)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Alcohol and Drug Authority Act 1974*. The Bill dissolves the Western Australian Alcohol and Drug Authority and as a consequence:

- staff employed by the Authority will be employed by the Minister for Health in his incorporated capacity pursuant to section 7 of the *Hospitals and Health Services Act 1927*; and
- all liabilities, rights and assets of the Authority will be appropriately invested in the Minister for Health.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5015).

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

ANZAC Day Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 066)

The Bill proposes the deletion of sections 5(4) and 7(3) of the Principal Act as a result of the removal of the legislative restriction prohibiting race meetings or sporting events being held on Anzac Day if it falls on a Sunday.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3596).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 1) 2005 (No. 047)

The purpose of this Bill is to grant supply and to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Fund certain sums for the recurrent services and purposes for the year ending 30 June 2006.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 26 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2480).

(Act No. 6 of 2005 – assented to on 7 July 2005)

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 2) 2005 (No. 048)

The purpose of this Bill is to grant supply and to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Fund certain sums for the capital purposes for the year ending 30 June 2006.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 26 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2491).

(Act No. 7 of 2005 – assented to on 7 July 2005)

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 3) 2005 (No. 111)

This Bill seeks to appropriate out of the Consolidated Fund the sums of –

- \$159,187,516.82 for recurrent payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2003, for the purposes and services detailed in Schedule 1 of the Bill;
- \$146,527,783.50 for recurrent payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2004, for the purposes and services in Schedule 2 of the Bill; and
- \$492,858,461.52 for recurrent payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2005, for the purposes and services detailed in Schedule 3 of the Bill.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7377).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 4) 2005 (No. 112)

This Bill seeks to appropriate out of Consolidated Fund the sums of –

- \$13,073,030.00 for capital payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2003, for the purposes detailed in Schedule 1 of the Bill;
- \$81,776,310.87 for capital payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2004, for the purposes detailed in Schedule 2 of the Bill; and
- \$180,918,654.05 for capital payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2005, for the purposes detailed in Schedule 3 of the Bill.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7378).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

BHP Billiton (Termination of Agreements) Agreement Bill 2005 (No. 092)

The purpose of this Bill is to ratify an agreement between the State and BHP Billiton Limited (BHPB) and BHP Billiton Minerals Pty Ltd (BHPM) for the termination of –

- an agreement made on 7 October 1952 and subsequently varied, titled the *Broken Hill Proprietary Steel Industry Agreement Act 1952* (the 1952 Agreement); and
- an agreement made on 18 November 1960 and subsequently varied, titled the *Broken Hill Proprietary Company's Integrated Steel Works Agreement Act 1960* (the 1960 Agreement),

between the State and BHPB (under its former name, The Broken Hill Proprietary Company Limited).

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 24 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7712).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Censorship Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 065)

This Bill amends the *Censorship Act 1996* (WA) (the Act) to ensure that the name of the Act reflects its revised purpose, as a result of the amendments that made Western Australia a full member of the National Classification Scheme. It addresses deficiencies in certain forfeiture, evidentiary and infringement notice provisions contained in the Act. Finally, it amends the Act so as to incorporate the new combined classifications for films and computer games.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3606).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Chiropractors Bill 2005* (No. 056)

The Bill repeals the *Chiropractors Act 1964* and provides a modern framework for the regulation of the practice of chiropractics and registration of persons as chiropractors. The Bill thereby enhances protection of the public from harm and is consistent with national competition principles.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3601).

(Act No. 31 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Coal Industry Superannuation Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 014)

This Bill seeks to give the Coal Industry Superannuation Board the ability to be competitive with other superannuation funds by providing for spouse accounts and allocated pensions. The Bill also implements the legislative amendments recommended in the “Review of the Coal Industry Superannuation Board and the *Coal Industry Superannuation Act 1989*”.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 578).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Coal Miners’ Welfare Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 016)

The purpose of the Bill is to implement the recommendations of the October 2002 Review of the Board and the Principal Act, carried out in response to the report of the Machinery of Government Taskforce. The Bill improves the effectiveness of the operation of the Coal Miners’ Welfare Board and the Coal Miners’ Welfare Fund.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 577).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 5 May 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Commissioner for Children and Young People Bill 2005* (No. 053)

The purpose of this Bill is to establish an office of Commissioner for Children and Young People as an office outside the public service. The Bill invests the Commissioner with certain functions and powers, including to advocate for the well-being of children and young people, and to conduct special inquiries in particular circumstances. The Commissioner will not have the role of investigating particular complaints but will be able to refer those to appropriate investigative agencies.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 June 2005 (P.D.p. 2582).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 25 August 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Commonwealth Powers (De Facto Relationships) Bill 2005* (No. 086)

The purpose of the Bill is to refer legislative power to the Commonwealth Parliament under section 51(xxxvii) of the Commonwealth *Constitution* in relation to the superannuation interests of de facto partners whose relationship has broken down.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6733).

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Community Protection (Offender Reporting) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 062) (Mr M.J. Birney)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend Schedule 2 of the *Community Protection (Offender Reporting) Act 2004*. The amendment ensures that those convicted under sections 60 and 101 of the *Censorship Act 1996* are to comply with the reporting requirements of the *Community Protection (Offender Reporting) Act 2004*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3235).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Constitution Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 001)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Constitution Acts Amendment Act 1899*, by giving the President a deliberative vote on all questions that come before the House, and by removing the President's casting vote.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 29).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Constitution and Electoral Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 037)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend the *Constitution Acts Amendment Act 1899* and the *Electoral Act 1907* by increasing the number of members of the Legislative Assembly from 57 members to 59 members.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 4 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1242).

(Act No. 2 of 2005 – assented to on 23 May 2005)

Consumer Protection Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2005* (No. 084)

The purpose of this Bill is to make amendments to a number of Acts within the portfolio of Consumer Protection. The amendments correct anomalies, improve consumer protection, streamline administrative practices and remove unnecessary legislation. The Bill repeals one Act and amends 11 Acts. In particular, the Bill:

- amends the *Builders' Registration Act 1939* to correct a drafting oversight so that the building licence levy will apply throughout the State as intended by the *Building Legislation Amendment Act 2000*;
- amends the *Consumer Affairs Act 1971* to extend the term of membership of members of the Consumer Product Safety Committee from one to three years and to enable the Commissioner for Fair Trading to make product safety orders in the interests of public safety, that have been promulgated under product safety laws in other States and Territories, or by the Commonwealth;
- amends the *Credit (Administration) Act 1984* to establish a Consumer Credit Fund in order for civil penalty amounts awarded against credit providers who have breached the Consumer Credit Code to be able to be distributed for the purposes of advancing consumer credit issues such as providing counselling services, legal advice, and information and research about the use of consumer credit;
- amends the *Land Valuers Licensing Act 1978* to increase all penalties under the Act in line with the recommendations of the Temby Royal Commission;
- amends the *Motor Vehicle Dealers Act 1973* to correct a drafting oversight from the *Motor Vehicle Dealers Amendment Act 2002* where the term “agent” was used instead of “dealer” in a trust account provision;
- amends the *Residential Tenancies Act 1987* to overcome inconsistencies by enabling decisions regarding tenancy disputes made by Registrars in the Magistrates Court to be able to be appealed and amends the Regulations to provide for the electronic lodging of bond monies;
- amends the *Real Estate and Business Agents Act 1978* to exempt holiday accommodation managers from licensing provisions of the Act;
- amends the *Retirement Villages Act 1992* to exempt residential aged care facilities that achieve and maintain Commonwealth certification or accreditation under the provisions of the Commonwealth *Aged Care Act 1997* from the provisions of the *Retirement Villages Act 1992*;
- amends the *Settlement Agents Act 1981* to provide certainty for the vendor’s settlement agent being able to withdraw trust monies after settlement to pay the commission, or balance of the commission, of the real estate agent in accordance with the authorisation of the vendor;

- repeals the *Trading Stamps Act 1981* to overcome outmoded concepts which prohibit businesses offering coupons, that can be redeemed from a third party, in connection with the sale of their goods or services, and as a result of the repeal, amends the *Fair Trading Act 1987* to provide for the Minister to approve benign third party trading schemes and prohibit others that are contrary to fair trading principles; and
- amends the *Travel Agents Act 1985* to implement a National Competition Policy review recommendation to remove the Crown's exemption from compliance with the Act.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5745).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 20 October 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Contaminated Sites Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 022)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend section 27 of the *Contaminated Sites Act 2003*. The amendment rectifies a discrepancy between the intention of section 27 of the Principal Act, regarding land owners' responsibility for remediation, and its actual effect. The intention of section 27 was that where contamination had migrated from a contaminated site (the "source site") to affect other land or groundwater (the "affected site") that the person responsible for remediating the source site should, in the first instance, also be responsible for remediating the affected site.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 571).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 30 November 2005.

(Act No. 40 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Criminal and Found Property Disposal Bill 2005* (No. 114)

The *Criminal and Found Property Disposal Bill 2005* provides police officers with a simplified method of disposing of property that is seized under the *Criminal Investigation Bill*. The Bill also provides methods of disposal for any other property that may come into possession of police.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7643).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Criminal Code Amendment (Alternative Offences to Wilful Murder) Bill 2005 (No. 091)
(Mr M.J. Birney)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Criminal Code* to provide for the return to the statutes of alternatives to wilful murder, allowing a jury to convict on an alternative offence if the prosecution is unable to prove that the accused intended to kill. Wilful murder requires a prosecution to prove that A intended to kill B under section 278. As the *Criminal Code* now stands a person charged with the most serious offence in the *Criminal Code* has to be acquitted if the jury cannot find that the act of murder was intentional. As the *Criminal Code* now stands if the jury is not satisfied that intent was proved they have to acquit as there is no alternative charge.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 12 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6195).

Second reading not agreed to in the Legislative Assembly on 12 October 2005.

Criminal Code Amendment (Cyber Predators) Bill 2005* (No. 087)

This Bill seeks to update the law relating to crimes of child exploitation by addressing the modern methods with which it is committed. The Bill is based on Queensland legislation, and:

- creates an offence for using electronic communication to procure a child to engage in sexual activity, or to expose a child to indecent material;
- provides for the issue of a court order requiring a suspect, or person controlling a data storage device, to provide police with access to evidence of child exploitation offences that is contained within the device; and
- amends the *Working With Children (Criminal Record Checking) Act 2004* to include in Schedule 2 of that Act the offences of using electronic communication to procure children for sexual activity or to expose children to indecent material.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6725).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Criminal Investigation Bill 2005* (No. 116)

The Criminal Investigation Bill is an amalgamation of statutory police powers currently available to police by virtue of the *Police Act* and the *Criminal Code*; it also codifies the majority of police common law powers; and introduces new powers that reflect the needs of a contemporary police force. The Bill introduces significant controls on these powers to ensure that an individual's human rights are protected and to minimise the opportunity for misuse of powers. The bill draws on legislation from the United Kingdom, Queensland and New South Wales but takes into account the unique circumstances in Western Australia, particularly with respect to regional areas.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7639).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Criminal Investigation (Consequential Provisions) Bill 2005* (No. 115)

This Bill makes amendments to various pieces of legislation to accommodate the introduction of the *Criminal Investigation Bill 2005* and the *Criminal and Found Property Disposal Bill 2005*. Broadly, these changes include repealing antiquated provisions that will be repealed by modernised provisions in the *Criminal Investigation Bill*, amending references in the other Acts, amending other Acts to come into line with the *Criminal Investigation Bill's* concepts and replacing repealed provisions where it is inappropriate to include the replacement within the *Criminal Investigation Bill*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7645).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Dangerous Sexual Offenders Bill 2005* (No. 105)

This Bill provides for the detention in custody or the supervision of persons of a particular class, to ensure adequate protection of the community and to provide continuing control, care and treatment of those persons.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7005).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 15 November 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Defamation Bill 2005 (No. 072)

The object of this Bill is to enact the model provisions agreed to by the Attorneys General of the States and Territories. The principal features of the model provisions are:

- the retention (with some modifications) of the common law of defamation to determine civil liability for defamation;
- the abolition of the distinction at common law between slander and libel;
- the creation of a statutory cap on the amount of damages for non-economic loss that may be awarded in civil proceedings for defamation;
- the enactment of provisions to facilitate the resolution of civil disputes about the publication of defamatory matter without litigation;
- the delineation of the respective roles of juries and judicial officers in the jury trial of civil proceedings for defamation by limiting the role of juries to the determination of whether a person has been defamed and leaving the award of damages to judicial officers;
- the abolition of exemplary and punitive damages in civil proceedings for defamation;
- the establishment of truth alone as a defence to a civil action for defamation;
- the imposition of a limitation period for civil actions for defamation of 1 year, subject to an extension (in limited circumstances) to a period of up to 3 years following publication; and
- the enactment of provisions dealing with criminal defamation.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4129).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 20 September 2005.

Amended in the Legislative Council on 1 December 2005.

(Act No. 44 of 2005 – assented to on 19 December 2005)

Dental Bill 2005* (No. 113)

This Bill provides for the effective registration of persons practising dentistry and for dental prosthetics. It controls the use of the titles “dentist”, “dental prosthetist”, “dental therapist”, “school dental therapist” and “dental hygienist” and seeks to prevent conduct from non-dental professionals that may be misleading to consumers and the general public. Importantly the Bill adequately identifies members of the dental profession, enabling the consumers of dental services to make informed decisions when engaging a practitioner.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7646).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Electoral Amendment and Repeal Bill 2005 (see One Vote One Value Bill 2005)

Electricity Corporations Bill 2005* (No. 039)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Electricity Corporations Act 1994* to provide for the restructure of Western Power Corporation. The Bill establishes four new Government-owned corporations:

- Electricity Generation Corporation;
- Electricity Retail Corporation;
- Electricity Networks Corporation; and
- Regional Power Corporation,

and includes their functions, powers and governance arrangements as well as providing for the transfer of assets and liabilities from Western Power.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 5 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1399).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 29 June 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 13 September 2005.

(Act No. 18 of 2005 – assented to on 13 October 2005)

Electricity Industry (Western Australian Renewable Energy Targets) Amendment Bill 2005*
(LC No. 097) (Hon. P. Llewellyn)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Electricity Industry Act 2004* to impose as a condition of holding a retail license to sell electricity in the South West interconnected system an obligation to acquire target levels of electricity generated from renewable energy sources.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 1 December 2005 (P.D.p. 7964).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Emergency Management Bill 2005* (No. 013)

The purpose of this Bill is to establish the necessary overarching emergency management arrangements for Western Australia's emergency services, including local governments and support organisations. This includes matters relating to framework/infrastructure, policy, planning and coordination, and additional powers in the event of a higher-level emergency such as an "emergency situation" or a "state of emergency".

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4120).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 23 August 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 15 September 2005.

(Act No. 15 of 2005 – assented to on 27 September 2005)

Energy Operators (Powers) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 068)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal section 55 of the *Energy Operators (Powers) Act 1979*, which requires the approval of the Coordinator of Energy prior to any new gas undertaking being established and to make a consequential amendment to the *Gas Pipeline Access (Western Australia) Act 1998* which references the approval power.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5746).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Energy Safety Bill 2005* (No. 094)

This Bill seeks to establish adequate long-term funding by the energy industry for technical and safety regulation of the electricity and gas industries and other related activities, which are carried out by the Director of Energy Safety and his staff of the Energy Safety Division of the Department of Consumer and Employment Protection.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 19 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6612).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 16 November 2005.

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Energy Safety Levy Bill 2005* (No. 095)

The purpose of this Bill is to impose the levy which is the cornerstone of the funding arrangements proposed under the Energy Safety Bill. A separate Bill is required under section 46(7) of the *Constitution Acts Amendment Act 1899*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 19 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6614).

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Financial Administration Legislation Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 012)

The Bill amends the *Financial Administration and Audit Act 1985* (FAAA), the *Government Financial Responsibility Act 2000* (GFRA) and makes consequential amendments to various other Acts. The Bill provides for the introduction from the financial year commencing 1 July 2005 of the most urgent components of a larger package of financial legislation reforms which:

- reduces the number of reports by the Treasurer;
- tightens the timing of reports by the Treasurer and agencies (i.e. both departments and statutory authorities);
- amends the title and role of Principal Accounting Officers;
- facilitates agency access to moneys held in the 27th pay suspense account; and
- corrects the name in legislation of the Parliamentary Services Department.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 580).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 3 May 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 23 June 2005.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Public Administration and Finance on 26 May 2005.

(Act No. 5 of 2005 – assented to on 27 June 2005)

First Home Owner Grant Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 061)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *First Home Owner Grant Act 2000* to provide access to the first home owner grant to applicants who have a licence or right of occupancy granted by a local government.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3760).

(Act No. 26 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Food Bill 2005* (No. 110)

The purpose of the Bill is to provide for the safety and suitability of food for human consumption, and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7657).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Gene Technology Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 018)

This Bill provides for a person, who is the holder of a licence to deal with genetically modified organisms, to pay a charge for the licence. The amount of the charge is prescribed by regulations.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 580).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Gene Technology Bill 2005* (No. 019)

The purpose of the Bill is to establish the Western Australian component of a national regulatory scheme for activities involving gene technology and genetically modified organisms. The regulatory framework will operate in conjunction with other Commonwealth and state regulatory schemes relevant to genetically modified organisms (GMOs) and GM products. These include the existing schemes for the regulation of foods, therapeutic goods, agricultural and veterinary chemicals, and industrial chemicals.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 578).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 5 May 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Health Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 011)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend parts of the *Health Act 1911* to provide improved communicable disease notification, so as to facilitate public health programs for the prevention and control of communicable diseases in Western Australia.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 566).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

**Health (Fresh Produce—State or Territory of Origin) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 067)
(Mr D.T. Redman)**

This Bill provides for origin labelling of “fresh produce” such as fruits, vegetables and nuts. It means that all fresh produce displayed for retail sale, originating from within the Commonwealth, must be labelled indicating the item’s state or territory of origin.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3630).

Referred to the Legislative Assembly Economics and Industry Standing Committee on 29 June 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Hospitals and Health Services Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 079)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend the *Hospitals and Health Services Act 1927*. The Bill will implement the recommendation of the report entitled “*A Review of the Licensing of Private Sector Aged Care Facilities in Western Australia*” to remove the requirement for private operated nursing homes to be licensed under the Act if they have received and maintained certification under the *Aged Care Act 1997* (Cwlth).

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5011).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Housing Societies Repeal Bill 2005* (No. 038)

The purpose of this Bill is to make arrangements for the winding up and cessation of housing societies. The Bill also repeals the *Housing Societies Act 1976* and the *Housing Loan Guarantee Act 1957*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1868).

(Act No. 17 of 2005 – assented to on 5 October 2005).

Human Tissue and Transplant Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 080)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend the *Human Tissue and Transplant Act 1982*. The Bill will eliminate an unnecessary restriction on live organ donation such as paired kidney exchange.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5012).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Industrial Relations Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 074)

This Bill will amend the *Industrial Relations Act 1979* (IR Act) to:

- enable an acting appointment of the President of the Western Australian Industrial Relations Commission (Commission), for a period of up to two years;
- enable the Governor to both extend a Commission member's period of office and appoint a new member to that office in prescribed circumstances;
- designate the Chief Commissioner as administrative head of the Commission;
- clarify that the Chief Commissioner may reconstitute the Commission once proceedings have commenced;
- enable the Chief Commissioner to delegate any of his powers or duties under the IR Act to another Commission member; and
- clarify that Industrial Inspectors may use their investigation powers under the IR Act for the purposes of the *Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993* (MCE Act), or any other Act that confers functions on them.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4126).

(Act No. 14 of 2005 – assented to on 21 September 2005)

Integrity of Parliamentary Process Bill 2005 (LC No. 002) (Hon. P.G. Foss)

The purpose of this Bill is to protect the integrity of the parliamentary process from undue influence from outside or within the Parliament and to assist Members in making decisions as parliamentary representatives in the best interests of their electorate.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 33).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Legal Aid Commission Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 085)

This Bill amends section 37 of the *Legal Aid Commission Act 1976* to give the Attorney General the power to authorise the Commission to provide legal aid without applying the means test in certain circumstances. However, the Commission will still consider whether it is reasonable, in all the circumstances, for legal aid to be granted.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6732).

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Limitation Bill 2005 (No. 006)

The purpose of this Bill is to update and modernise Western Australia's law in relation to time limits for commencing civil legal proceedings and arbitrations. The objective is to achieve a modern limitations regime that is fairer and more flexible than the current law and that delivers a large measure of certainty.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 562).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 24 May 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 20 October 2005.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 23 August 2005.

(Act No. 19 of 2005 – assented to on 15 November 2005)

Limitation Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2005 (No. 007)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Limitation Act 1935* and makes consequential amendments to various Acts as a result of the introduction of the *Limitation Bill 2005*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 566).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 24 May 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 20 October 2005.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 23 August 2005.

(Act No. 20 of 2005 – assented to on 15 November 2005)

Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 089)

The proposed changes in this Bill are to the *Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions Act 1960* (the Act) and include:

- some amendments carried over from the *Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Amendment Bill 2003* (the 2003 Bill) which lapsed on 23 January 2005;
- some revised amendments based on provisions in the 2003 Bill; and
- other changes not contemplated in the 2003 Bill.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 10 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7138).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Local Government (Official Conduct) Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 104)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Local Government Act 1995* to provide a disciplinary framework to deal with individual misconduct by local government council members. At present, apart from prosecution, the only avenue for action in response to inappropriate behaviour is against the whole council.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7380).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Machinery of Government (Miscellaneous Amendments) Bill 2005* (No. 017)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend various Acts to implement certain recommendations of the Machinery of Government Taskforce, and to help reduce the excessive number and fragmented nature of departments and agencies within the Western Australian Public Sector.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3336).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Medical Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 106)

This Bill will allow the chief executive officer to nominate a medical practitioner employed within the Public Service such as from the Department of Health or a salaried officer who is a medical practitioner and employed at a public hospital or health service to sit on the Medical Board. This would give the chief executive officer greater flexibility when nominating a medical practitioner to sit on the Board and ensure that a range of interests and qualities are reflected in the Board's membership.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7378).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Medical Radiation Technologists Bill 2005* (No. 088)

The purpose of this Bill is to provide for the regulation of the practice of medical radiation technology and registration of persons as medical radiation technologists, to amend the *Radiation Safety Act 1975*, to make consequential amendments to various Acts, and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6734).

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Metropolitan Region Improvement Tax Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 027)

The purpose of this Bill is to make certain amendments consequential to the *Planning and Development Bill 2005*. While the amendments constitute the imposition of taxation for the purposes of section 46(7) of the *Constitution Acts Amendment Bill 1899*, and therefore require a separate Bill, this Bill does not impose a new tax.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 574).

(Act No. 39 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

**Minimum Conditions of Employment (Blue Flu) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 081)
(Mr T.R. Buswell)**

The purpose of the Bill is to make amendments to section 22 of the *Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993* for the purposes of adding the following provisions:

- an employee has no entitlement to paid leave where the employer considers, on reasonable grounds, that the period of absence was industrially motivated, unless the employee provides a medical certificate and statutory declaration to support their claim;
- providing a penalty for employees who attempt to disguise industrial action as sick leave; and
- providing a definition of “industrially motivated” action.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5774).

Second reading not agreed to in the Legislative Assembly on 16 November 2005.

Mining Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 049)

This Bill contains changes to the *Mining Act 1978* relating to the reversion licence application scheme included in new section 120AA, which was introduced by section 99 of the *Mining Amendment Act 2004*. It provides that the Governor may by Order introduce a scheme to allow the applicant for a mining lease to “revert” to a prospecting or exploration licence. These changes are necessary to overcome inconsistencies between the provisions of the *Mining Act 1978* and the proposed Order.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 25 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2289).

(Act No. 27 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Motor Vehicle (Third Party Insurance) Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 040)

The purpose of this Bill is to:

- enable the Minister for Government Enterprises to vary the Scales of Premiums for compulsory third party (CTP) insurance on more than one occasion in any financial year, should it be deemed necessary;
- remove a means by which an Incorporated Insurance Office, as defined under the *Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981*, can transfer risk intended to be insured under a workers' compensation/employers' indemnity policy, to the compulsory Third Party Insurance Fund (TPIF); and
- introduce a cap on all economic loss for all motor vehicle personal injury claims, consistent with the outcome of the *Civil Liability Act 2002*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1864).

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Nurses and Midwives Bill 2005* (No. 103)

This Bill provides a modern framework to protect the health and safety of members of the public by providing for the registration of nurses and midwives and the regulation of the practice of nursing and midwifery.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7379).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Oaths, Affidavits and Statutory Declarations Bill 2005* (LC No. 004)

The purpose of this Bill is to consolidate legal provisions relevant to making oaths, affirmations, affidavits and statutory declarations, and to provide for a religiously neutral form of oaths and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 6 April 2005 (P.D.p. 371).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 12 October 2005.

(Act No. 23 of 2005 – assented to on 2 December 2005)

**Oaths, Affidavits and Statutory Declarations (Consequential Provisions) Bill 2005*
(LC No. 005)**

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Declarations and Attestations Act 1913* (WA) and four adopted Imperial Acts relating to oaths, and amend a number of other Western Australian Acts as a consequence of the enactment of the proposed *Oaths, Affidavits and Statutory Declarations Act 2005* (WA), and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 6 April 2005 (P.D.p. 372).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 12 October 2005.

(Act No. 24 of 2005 – assented to on 2 December 2005)

Occupational Therapists Bill 2005* (No. 059)

This Bill repeals the *Occupational Therapists Act 1980* and provides a modern framework for the regulation of the practice of occupational therapy and registration of persons as occupational therapists. It thereby enhances protection of the public from harm and is consistent with national competition principles.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3604).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 30 November 2005.

(Act No. 42 of 2005 – assented to on 19 December 2005)

One Vote One Value Bill 2005 (No. 033) (name changed to *Electoral Amendment and Repeal Bill 2005*)

The Bill seeks to amend the *Electoral Act 1907* and the *Constitution Acts Amendment Act 1889* and repeal the *Electoral Distribution Act 1947* to provide for one vote one value. The Bill seeks to:

- provide for all Legislative Assembly seats (except five seats in the Mining and Pastoral region) to have approximately the same enrolment of votes allowing for a 10% variation;
- increase the membership of the Legislative Council from 34 members to 36 members; and
- entrench the one vote one value principle with any future amendment requiring an absolute majority in both Houses of Parliament.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 61).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 5 May 2005.

Short title of the Bill changed to *Electoral Amendment and Repeal Bill 2005* by the Legislative Council on 5 May 2005 and agreed to by the Legislative Assembly on 17 May 2005.

(Act No. 1 of 2005 – assented to on 20 May 2005)

Optical Dispensers Repeal Bill 2005 (No. 036)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Optical Dispensers Act 1966* and the *Optical Dispensers Regulations*. The Bill is introduced as part of the Western Australian Government's obligation under the competition principles agreement to review and reform all legislation that restricts competition unless it can be demonstrated that the restrictions are in the public interest.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1866).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 23 November 2005.

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Optometrists Bill 2005* (No. 069)

The purpose of the Bill is to:

- regulate the practice of optometry and registration of persons as optometrists;
- repeal the *Optometrists Act 1940*; and
- make consequential amendments to various Acts, and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5014).

(Act No. 29 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Osteopaths Bill 2005* (No. 055)

This Bill repeals the *Osteopaths Act 1997* and provides a modern framework for the regulation of the practice of osteopathy and registration of persons as osteopaths. It thereby enhances protection of the public from harm and is consistent with national competition principles. This Bill also provides the template for all health practitioner legislation.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3602).

(Act No. 33 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Parental Support and Responsibility Bill 2005* (No. 041)

The purpose of this Bill is to provide for responsible parenting agreements and responsible parenting orders. The Bill provides for information sharing between Government agencies, and makes consequential amendments to the *Children's Court of Western Australia Act 1988*, the *Young Offenders Act 1994* and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 June 2005 (P.D.p. 2585).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 30 November 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Partnership Amendment Bill 2005 (LC No. 009)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Partnership Act 1895*. This amending Bill proposes to restrict the circumstances in which a partnership can be liable when a partner commits a wrongful act or omission as a director of a corporation.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 29).

(Act No. 3 of 2005 – assented to on 1 June 2005)

Pawnbrokers and Second-hand Dealers Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 096)

The changes to the Act contained within the current Bill are consistent with the outcome of the National Competition Policy review of the *Pawnbrokers and Second-hand Dealer Act 1994*. Specifically, the Bill does the following:

- allows standard conditions or restrictions to be prescribed that would apply to all pawnbrokers and/or second-hand dealers' licences;
- ensures that the distinguishing numbering of transaction details maintained by pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers and forwarded to the Commissioner of Police are consecutive;
- provides the Commissioner with the discretion to determine that pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers' premises are to be licensed separately where a licensee owns and operates more than one premise;
- makes second-hand property that is subject to the 14 day retention period more readily identifiable to police officers inspecting second-hand dealers' premises;
- allows pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers to use electronic imaging (digital), in lieu of photographs of their clients;
- creates the ability to fine licensees who breach their licensing conditions or restrictions. This extension of penalty options is of benefit to the pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers as at present the only penalty option available to a Court for a breach of conditions or restrictions is the suspension or cancellation of a licence;
- removes the identification documents detailed in the Act and prescribes them in the regulations for consistency purposes;
- increases the 21 day limitation period on the issue of infringement notices to 90 days, which provides greater flexibility to police in proceeding with minor offences through the infringement process. As a result, this reduces some of the penalties and legal costs imposed on licensees by avoiding the necessity of such minor offences having to go before the courts;
- requires licensees to display their licence number when advertising. This is a great benefit to the public, as it enables easier identifying of properly licensed persons;
- ensures that pawnbrokers retain pawned goods at the store into which the goods were pawned until they are redeemed or sold, unless they are removed specifically for auctioning; and
- makes "options to repurchase" subject to the same conditions and requirements as if the items were pawned, thus preventing circumvention of the legislation thereby protecting the interests of the community and other legitimate pawnbrokers.

The Bill also addresses a potential anomaly that has arisen as the result of a recent High Court decision in May 2005 of *Palgo Pty Ltd v Gowans*, in which it was held that lending money with goods as security was not necessarily pawnbroking.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7008).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Perry Lakes Redevelopment Bill 2005 (No. 082)

The purpose of this Bill is to:

- allow for the resumption of certain land by the State;
- provide a specific scheme for compensation that generally reflects agreements previously reached between the State and the Town of Cambridge in respect of the Perry Lakes land;
- in respect of the AK Reserve land, provide a specific scheme for compensation whereby the State is liable to pay compensation on the basis that the use and development of the land is restricted solely to recreational purposes;
- enable the sustainable redevelopment of the Perry Lakes land and the construction of sporting facilities on land designated as AK Reserve in a timely manner; and
- provide for the disposition of financial and land assets to the Town of Cambridge upon the completion of the sporting facilities.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 15 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5471).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 22 September 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 1 December 2005.

(Act No. 43 of 2005 – assented to on 19 December 2005)

Perth International Centre for Application of Solar Energy Repeal Bill 2005 (No. 029)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Perth International Centre for Application of Solar Energy Act 1994*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1867).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Petroleum Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2005* (No. 020)

This Bill amends the *Petroleum (Submerged Lands) Act 1982*, the *Petroleum Act 1967* and the *Petroleum Pipelines Act 1969* with respect to the occupational safety and health of persons at offshore petroleum facilities, petroleum operations and petroleum pipeline operations. The Bill also repeals the *Petroleum Safety Act 1999* and makes consequential amendments to other Acts.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 576).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and General Purposes on 18 May 2005.

(Act No. 13 of 2005 – assented to on 1 September 2005)

Physiotherapists Bill 2005* (No. 057)

This Bill repeals the *Physiotherapists Act 1950* and provides a modern framework for the regulation of the practice of physiotherapy and registration of persons as physiotherapists. It thereby enhances protection of the public from harm and is consistent with national competition principles.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3603).

(Act No. 32 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Planning and Development Bill 2005* (No. 023)

The purpose of this Bill is to consolidate the existing planning legislation. The Bill also includes several amendments to the current planning legislation to streamline planning processes and provide a more clear, certain and workable planning system.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 572).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 19 October 2005.

(Act No. 37 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Planning and Development (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2005* (No. 026)

The purpose of this Bill is to make consequential amendments to several Acts as a result of the *Planning and Development Bill 2005*. These amendments are predominantly to replace references to the titles of the current planning legislation or refer to the new descriptions of region and local planning schemes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 573).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 19 October 2005.

(Act No. 38 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Podiatrists Bill 2005* (No. 058)

This Bill repeals the *Podiatrists Registration Act 1964* and provides a modern framework for the regulation of the practice of podiatry and registration of persons as podiatrists. It thereby enhances protection of the public from harm and is consistent with national competition principles.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3605).

(Act No. 30 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Psychologists Bill 2005* (No. 071)

The purpose of the Bill is to:

- regulate the practice of psychology and registration of persons as psychologists;
- repeal the *Psychologists Registration Act 1976*; and
- make consequential amendments to various Acts and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5013).

(Act No. 28 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Public Notaries Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 008)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Public Notaries Act 1979*. This Bill proposes to simplify procedures by transferring the functions of the Attorney General to the Legal Practice Board, which will then report directly to the Chief Justice regarding the suitability and fitness of an applicant and the need for a further appointment.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 30).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Railway Discontinuance Bill 2005 (No. 078)

The purpose of this Bill is to formally discontinue sections of the Midland Junction-Welshpool Railway and the Fremantle-Kwinana Railway.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 31 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4864).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Rates and Charges (Rebates and Deferments) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 035)

This Bill amends the *Rates and Charges (Rebates and Deferment) Act 1992* to permit administrative authorities to allow rebates on prescribed charges payable by eligible pensioners and seniors to be extended to:

- residents of retirement villages operating under the *Retirement Villages Act 1992* who occupy their home on a long term, or lease-for-life arrangement; and
- owner-occupiers of park homes or caravans with a site lease of a minimum seven years or more.

The Bill also provides for:

- an extension of the concessions for seniors and pensioners to a broader range of court orders for property settlements in Western Australia; and
- financial arrangements between de facto couples.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1861).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 30 June 2005.

(Act No. 9 of 2005 – assented to on 7 July 2005)

Residential Parks (Long-stay Tenants) Bill 2005* (No. 021)

The purpose of this Bill is to:

- balance the needs of residential park residents for greater security of tenure while supporting the maintenance of existing, and the development of new, residential parks;
- mirror appropriate provisions of the *Residential Tenancies Act 1987*, but recognise that this form of accommodation is different from traditional tenancy relationships and provide for those differences;
- include requirements for pre-contractual disclosure to provide greater contractual certainty;
- require the establishment of a Park Liaison Committee (obligatory where there are 20 or more sites used for long-stay residential purposes) to enable the park's residents to assist the park operator in the development and changes to park rules and policies; and
- give the parties access to a simple and cost-effective dispute resolution process, outside the court system, through the State Administrative Tribunal.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6735).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 17 November 2005.

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Retail Shops and Fair Trading Legislation Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 098)

The purpose of the *Retail Shops and Fair Trading Legislation Amendment Bill 2005* is to confirm the existing arrangements for retail trading hours in Western Australia. The Bill also introduces the Small Business Legislative Protection Package.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7006).

The Bill passed the Third Reading stage in the Legislative Assembly and transmitted by message to the Legislative Council but had not been introduced into the Legislative Council as at 1 December 2005.

Revenue Laws Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 043)

The Bill makes amendments to the *Stamp Act 1921* and the *Pay-roll Tax Assessment Act 2002* to:

- address a number of possible avoidance opportunities that have been identified;
- improve the efficiency of a number of concessions, exemptions and rebates for taxpayers; and
- improve the administration of the revenue legislation and correct a number of minor anomalies.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1862).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 17 August 2005.

(Act No. 11 of 2005 – assented to on 30 August 2005)

Revenue Laws Amendment Bill (No. 2) 2005 (No. 042)

The Bill makes amendments to the *Land Tax Assessment Act 2002*, the *Stamp Act 1921* and the *Taxation Administration Act 2003* to:

- correct an anomaly in the land tax rebate for certain land on which a private residence is being constructed;
- require an owner of land to notify the Commissioner of State Revenue of errors and omissions in their land tax assessment notice;
- clarify the time period for making an application for stamp duty corporate reconstruction exemption in certain circumstances;
- allow responsible parties under special tax return arrangements to correct minor errors; and
- provide clarification where the Commissioner seeks directions on an objection.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1864).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 18 August 2005.

(Act No. 12 of 2005 – assented to on 30 August 2005)

Revenue Laws Amendment Bill (No. 3) 2005 (No. 050)

The purpose of this Bill is to introduce a new land tax scale for 2005–06 and subsequent financial years and provide a 50% land tax concession for land used for caravan park, park home park, or camping ground purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 31 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2520).

(Act No. 10 of 2005 – assented to on 29 August 2005)

Road Traffic Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 063)

The purpose of this Bill is to implement the National Driver Licensing Scheme. The National Driver Licensing Scheme, developed in consultation with the States and Territories in accordance with the agreed National Road Transport Commission (NRTC) process, is aimed at achieving nationally consistent licensing processes and requirements.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3760).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 20 September 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Road Traffic Amendment (Drug Impaired Driving) Bill 2005* (No. 101)

The purpose of the Bill is to strengthen road traffic legislation in relation to ‘driving under the influence’. The Bill will introduce a new offence of ‘driving while impaired by drugs’. The amendments include a number of provisions to facilitate proof of the core offence including:

- the requirement for standardised impairment assessment procedures to be conducted by the Western Australia Police;
- provisions to govern the collection and assessment of blood samples; and
- facilitating the use of expert evidence.

The Bill also includes new provisions aimed at the rehabilitation of offenders with drug-related problems.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7009).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Royal Commissions (Powers) Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 010)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Royal Commissions Act 1968* and the *Surveillance Devices Act 1998* as recommended by the Kennedy Police Royal Commission. First, the bill makes the powers in part 3 of the *Royal Commission (Police) Act 2002*, which relate to arrest, available to all royal commissions. Second, the powers in part 8 of the *Royal Commission (Police) Act 2002*, which relate to the use of electronic surveillance devices, will be available to a royal commission if the governor has declared that those powers are to be available to that royal commission. Third, the procedures for dealing with contempt in the face of a royal commission are improved.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 31).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Scrutiny of Government Publicity Bill 2005* (No. 064) (Mr M.J. Birney)

The objectives of this Bill are to:

- ensure that, as far as possible, public money is not expended on government publicity for a partisan political purpose; and
- constitute a committee to scrutinise government publicity that appears to the committee to have the capacity or to be likely to have the capacity, in whole or in part, to be used for that purpose.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3628).

The Bill requires a message from His Excellency the Governor recommending appropriation to pass the Second Reading stage.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Stamp Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 090)

This Bill amends the *Stamp Act 1921* to:

- provide that no duty is payable for vehicle licences granted or transferred to a motor vehicle dealer, where the vehicle is to be loaned for charitable or other specified purposes; and
- allow for an exemption from mortgage duty for mortgage re-financing loans undertaken by owner-occupiers of homes and small business owners.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 19 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6611).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 16 November 2005.

(Act No. 34 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Stamp Amendment (Assessment) Bill 2005* (No. 075)

The *Stamp Amendment (Assessment) Bill 2005* and the *Stamp Amendment (Taxing) Bill 2005* seek to amend the *Stamp Act 1921* by rewriting Part III F, which contains provisions relating to the duty payable in respect of policies of insurance, and providing an exemption from insurance duty for that part of an insurance premium that relates to property or risk outside of Australia.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4128).

(Act No. 36 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Stamp Amendment (Taxing) Bill 2005* (No. 076)

The *Stamp Amendment (Assessment) Bill 2005* and the *Stamp Amendment (Taxing) Bill 2005* seek to amend the *Stamp Act 1921* by rewriting Part III F, which contains provisions relating to the duty payable in respect of policies of insurance, and providing an exemption from insurance duty for that part of an insurance premium that relates to property or risk outside of Australia. The amendments contained in this Bill are to the Second and Third Schedules of the *Stamp Act 1921*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4129).

(Act No. 35 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Standard Time Bill 2005 (No. 054)

This proposed legislation will result in Western Australia's standard time being based on the internationally accepted time standard. The Bill also ensures that any reference in legal instrument to time is to be constructed as a reference to time based on Co-ordinated Universal Time.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3204).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 23 August 2005.

Amended in the Legislative Council on 20 October 2005.

(Act No. 21 of 2005 – assented to on 15 November 2005)

Statute Law Revision Bill 2005 (LC No. 032)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal various obsolete written laws, to consequentially amend various written laws and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 31 March 2005 (P.D.p. 147).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 15 November 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Superannuation Legislation Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 109)

The purpose of this Bill is to implement a number of necessary changes to the superannuation arrangements in the State public sector and parliamentary superannuation schemes, namely to:

- fully implement the Commonwealth's "clean break" approach to splitting superannuation upon marriage breakdown;
- reinstate the protection of superannuation death benefits for members of public sector schemes from claims by creditors of the estate;
- provide the Government Employees Superannuation Board with the ability to be a successor fund;
- validate the long-standing funding obligations in place for Pension Scheme members employed by TAFE colleges;
- validate benefits paid in West State Super to visiting Medical Practitioners from 1 July 1992 until 30 June 2001; and
- rectify an unintended drafting error in the superannuation legislation in 2001 which had removed the entitlements of a small group to membership of West State Super.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7659).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Swan and Canning Rivers (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2005* (No. 108)

The *Swan and Canning Rivers Management Bill 2005* impacts on a number of other Acts; therefore, consequential amendments to these Acts are required. In addition, the *Planning and Development Bill 2005* is currently before Parliament and its passage will require a number of amendments to the *Swan and Canning Rivers Management Act 2005* and the Metropolitan Region Scheme to maintain consistency. Most of these amendments are of a minor nature, replacing references to titles and provisions of other legislation. This Bill includes transitional and saving provisions to ensure a smooth transition from the existing to the consolidated legislation.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7591).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Swan and Canning Rivers Management Bill 2005* (No. 107)

The purpose of this Bill is to make provisions for the protection and enhancement of the ecological and community benefits and amenity of the Swan and Canning Rivers and associated lands. The new legislation improves the State's ability to coordinate management of activities that may affect the Swan and Canning Rivers. The legislation will replace the *Swan River Trust Act 1988* and the *Environmental Protection (Swan and Canning Rivers) Policy 1997*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7589).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Swan Valley Planning Legislation Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 028)

The purpose of the Bill is to provide a framework that will protect and preserve the Swan Valley for current and future generations. The Bill implements recommendations from the review of the *Swan Valley Planning Act 1995*, tabled in the Legislative Assembly on 22 September 2004.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 574).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 24 May 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Taxi Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 093)

This Bill amends the *Taxi Act 1994* to enable the Government to buy-back transferable Multi-Purpose Taxi (MPT) plates.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6717).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 10 November 2005.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 1 December 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Terrorism (Extraordinary Powers) Bill 2005* (No. 083)

The purpose of this Bill is two-fold:

- to confer special powers on police to deal with imminent threats of terrorist acts and to respond to terrorist acts; and
- to enable the covert entry and search of premises, under the authority of a special covert search warrant, by police officers for the purposes of responding to or preventing terrorist acts.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 14 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5307).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 12 October 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 29 November 2005.

(Act No. 41 of 2005 – assented to on 19 December 2005)

Terrorism (Preventative Detention) Bill 2005 (No. 120)

The object of this Bill is to give effect in Western Australia to the decision of 27 September 2005 by the Council of Australian Governments that States and Territories introduce legislation regarding preventative detention of persons for up to 14 days to prevent terrorist acts or preserve evidence following a terrorist act.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 December 2005 (P.D.p. 8118).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Tobacco Products Control Bill 2005* (No. 060)

The purpose of the Bill is to prohibit the sale of tobacco products to persons under 18 years of age. The Bill also:

- requires proof of age for purchase of tobacco products, cigarette papers, pipes and other smoking implements;
- requires those who sell tobacco products to be licensed;
- controls the sale and promotion of herbal cigarettes;
- prohibits the sale of confectionary, toys and other products that are designed to resemble tobacco products;
- applies control to Internet sales;
- restricts tobacco product displays; and
- restricts information signs about availability and price of tobacco products.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3598).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 25 August 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Trade Measurement Administration Bill 2005* (No. 045)

The purpose of the Bill is to provide for the administration of the *Trade Measurement Bill 2005*. The Bill is designed to accommodate the unique administrative requirements that apply in Western Australia.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 24 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2193).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 1 September 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Trade Measurement Bill 2005* (No. 046)

The purpose of the Bill is to:

- impose conditions that apply to measuring instruments used for trade in weighing or measuring articles;
- impose conditions for the measurement of articles and substances for determining their sale price;
- provide for disciplinary action against a licensee who transgress and rights for administrative decisions to be reviewed;
- provide for the appointment of inspectors and confers powers on inspectors so that they can undertake compliance functions;
- establish evidence requirements and liabilities of employers, directors and bodies corporate; and
- provide for transitional arrangements that will apply for the measurement of alcoholic liquor.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 24 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2192).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 1 September 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Trans-Tasman Mutual Recognition (Western Australia) Bill 2005* (LC No. 015)

The purpose of this Bill is to adopt the *Trans-Tasman Mutual Recognition Act 1997* of the Parliament of the Commonwealth. The Trans-Tasman Recognition Arrangement provides for the recognition within each State and Territory of the Commonwealth of regulatory standards adopted in New Zealand regarding goods and occupations, and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 21 June 2005 (P.D.p. 2789).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 1 December 2005.

Treasurer's Advance Authorisation Bill 2005* (No. 034)

The Bill authorises the Treasurer to make certain payments and advances for authorised purposes chargeable to the Consolidated Fund or the Treasurer's Advance Account within the monetary limit available for the financial year commencing 1 July 2005.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 562).

Universities Legislation Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 044)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend:

- the *Curtin University of Technology Act 1966*;
- the *Edith Cowan University Act 1984*;
- the *Murdoch University Act 1973*;
- the *University of Notre Dame Act 1989*; and
- the *University of Western Australia Act 1911*,

so that each University will be enabled to be fully compliant with the requirements of the Commonwealth's National Governance Protocols for Universities.

Water Legislation Amendment (Competition Policy) Bill 2005* (No. 051)

The purpose of this Bill is to implement the Water Legislation Reforms recommended by the National Competition Policy Reviews completed in 1999 which are to:

- clarify the objectives of the relevant legislation;
- identify the nature of any restrictions on competition;
- analyse the likely effect of the restrictions on competition;
- assess and balance the costs and benefits of the restrictions;
- consider alternative means for achieving the same result including non-legislative approaches; and
- remove anti-competitive elements that cannot be justified.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 June 2005 (P.D.p. 2581).

(Act No. 25 of 2005 – assented to on 12 December 2005)

Workers' Compensation Legislation Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 073)

The purpose of this Bill is to:

- restore the ability for working directors to be covered by the statutory scheme and more directly and clearly address the issue of legal uncertainty created by past Court decisions;
- address the practice of some employers in certain industries requiring workers to form companies and undertake work as directors, as a condition of obtaining work;
- entitle dependants of workers who die as a result of an injury sustained between 1 July 2005 and 14 November 2005 access to the higher benefit of \$200,000 provided for in the *Workers' Compensation Reform Act 2004* (the Reform Act), due to the deferral in the proclamation of the Reform Act from 12 July 2005 to 14 November 2005; and
- make minor technical and drafting amendments to the Reform Act and the *Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981* (the Principal Act).

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4125).

Yallingup Foreshore Land Bill 2005 (No. 003)

The purpose of this Bill is to ensure the retention of approximately 13.5 hectares of beach front land at Yallingup near the foreshore and Caves House. The Bill proposes to preclude a claim that the land had been invalidly acquired in 1938; to prevent sections 29 and 29A of the *Public Works Act 1902* applying to the Land; and to overcome the claim that the caravan park, parking area and bush fire brigade depot were unlawfully used, by reason of a failure to comply with section 29 of the *Public Works Act 1902*. When enacted, this legislation will settle the rights of the parties which are currently in dispute in Supreme Court proceedings.
