SYNOPSIS OF BILLS

2006

The following synopsis of Bills introduced during the First Session of the Thirty-Seventh Parliament is intended only to give a brief outline of the main features of each Bill at the stage when the second reading motion of the Bill was moved. The full second reading speech for each Bill is available in *Parliamentary Debates (Hansard)* which are available from the State Law Publisher or from the Parliament website: www.parliament.wa.gov.au. The ultimate stage reached by each Bill is also indicated. While it does not take into account amendments made in either House, reference can be made to the *Votes and Proceedings* of the Legislative Assembly and the *Minutes* of the Legislative Council where amendments have been agreed to.

- * Indicates the Act, or parts thereof, comes into operation on a date or dates to be fixed by Proclamation.
- LC Indicates the Bill originated in the Legislative Council; all other Bills without LC originated in the Legislative Assembly.
- (P.D.p.) Indicates the *Hansard* page number for the second reading of the Bill in the House in which it was first introduced.
- Note: Explanatory Memorandum are provided with all Bills First Read in the Legislative Assembly (SO 162).

Acts Amendment (Advance Health Care Planning) Bill 2006* (No. 149)

[Name changed to Acts Amendment (Consent to Medical Treatment) Bill 2006]

This Bill reforms the law relating to medical treatment for the dying. This Bill is necessary to give people certainty when dealing with end of life issues, enabling terminally ill people to govern their medical treatment and protecting medical professionals who adhere to their wishes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 June 2006 (P.D.p. 4061).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 29 November 2006.

Short title of the Bill changed to Acts Amendment (Consent to Medical Treatment) Bill 2006.

Acts Amendment (Consent to Medical Treatment) Bill 2006* (No. 149)

[Name changed from Acts Amendment (Advance Health Care Planning) Bill 2006 (No. 149)]

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Agriculture and Related Resources Protection Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 052)

The purpose of this Bill is to effect a change in the ability to raise rates to control declared plants and animals in the pastoral area of the State. The amendments will remove current provisions for a general agriculture protection rate on land held under pastoral lease, and instead enable the quantum of the rate to be set in relation to pastoral leases within particular zones, with the funds raised still matched dollar-for-dollar by the State Government. An ability to raise further, unmatched rates will remain.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3336).

(Act No. 6 of 2006 – assented to on 12 April 2006)

Alcohol and Drug Authority Repeal Bill 2005 (No. 070)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Alcohol and Drug Authority Act 1974*. The Bill dissolves the Western Australian Alcohol and Drug Authority and as a consequence:

- staff employed by the Authority will be employed by the Minister for Health in his incorporated capacity pursuant to section 7 of the *Hospitals and Health Services Act 1927*; and
- all liabilities, rights and assets of the Authority will be appropriately invested in the Minister for Health.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5015).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

ANZAC Day Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 066)

The Bill proposes the deletion of sections 5(4) and 7(3) of the principal Act as a result of the removal of the legislative restriction prohibiting race meetings or sporting events being held on Anzac Day if it falls on a Sunday.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3596).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 1) 2006 (No. 140)

The purpose of this Bill is to grant supply and to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Fund certain sums for the recurrent services and purposes of the year ending 30 June 2007.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 11 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2642).

(Act No. 33 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 2) 2006 (No. 141)

The purpose of this Bill is to grant supply and to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Fund certain sums for the capital purposes of the year ending 30 June 2007.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 11 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2649).

(Act No. 34 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 3) 2005 (No. 111)

This Bill seeks to appropriate out of the Consolidated Fund the sums of:

- \$159,187,516.82 for recurrent payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2003, for the purposes and services detailed in Schedule 1 of the Bill;
- \$146,527,783.50 for recurrent payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2004, for the purposes and services in Schedule 2 of the Bill; and
- \$492,858,461.52 for recurrent payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2005, for the purposes and services detailed in Schedule 3 of the Bill.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7377).

(Act No. 38 of 2006 – assented to on 30 August 2006)

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 4) 2005 (No. 112)

This Bill seeks to appropriate out of Consolidated Fund the sums of:

- \$13,073,030.00 for capital payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2003, for the purposes detailed in Schedule 1 of the Bill;
- \$81,776,310.87 for capital payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2004, for the purposes detailed in Schedule 2 of the Bill; and
- \$180,918,654.05 for capital payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2005, for the purposes detailed in Schedule 3 of the Bill.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7378).

(Act No. 39 of 2006 – assented to on 30 August 2006)

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 5) 2006 (No. 178)

This Bill provides for a sum to be appropriated from the Consolidated Fund the sum of \$247,117,833.38 for recurrent payments made during the financial year ended 30 June 2006, for purposes and services as detailed in Schedule 1 of the Bill. These payments, which were all of an extraordinary and unforeseen nature, were made under authority of the *Treasurer's Advance Authorisation Act 2005*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 2 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8162).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Appropriation (Consolidated Fund) Bill (No. 6) 2006 (No. 179)

This Bill provides for a sum to be appropriated out of the Consolidated Fund for the purpose of capital payments made during the year ended 30 June 2006 under the authority of the *Treasurer's Advance Authorisation Act 2005*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 2 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8163).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Auditor General Bill 2006* (No. 99)

The purpose of this Bill is to establish and guide the activities of the Auditor General of Western Australia, a function previously performed by the *Financial Administration and Audit Act 1985*. The changes introduced in this Bill seek to:

- enhance and protect the Auditor General's independence;
- strengthen the relationship with the Parliament;
- widen some powers;
- introduce new accountabilities for the Auditor General; and
- clarify some provisions in the current legislation.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2006 (P.D.p. 4589).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 27 September 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 7 December 2006.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations on 24 October 2006.

(Act No. 75 of 2006 – assented to on 21 December 2006)

Betting and Racing Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 146)

The purpose of this Bill is to protect the integrity of the Western Australian racing industry. The Bill proposes to prohibit the:

- establishment/operation and use of betting exchange; and
- publication of Western Australian race fields without the appropriate approval.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 June 2006 (P.D.p. 4066).

(Act No. 70 of 2006 – assented to on the 13 December 2006).

BHP Billiton (Termination of Agreements) Agreement Bill 2005 (No. 092)

The purpose of this Bill is to ratify an agreement between the State and BHP Billiton Limited (BHPB) and BHP Billiton Minerals Pty Ltd (BHPM) for the termination of:

- an agreement made on 7 October 1952 and subsequently varied, titled the *Broken Hill Proprietary Steel Industry Agreement Act 1952*; and
- an agreement made on 18 November 1960 and subsequently varied, entitled the *Broken Hill Proprietary Company's Integrated Steel Works Agreement Act 1960*;

between the State and BHPB (under its former name, The Broken Hill Proprietary Company Limited).

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 24 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7712).

(Act No. 63 of 2006 – assented to on 30 November 2006)

Biosecurity and Agricultural Management Bill 2006* (No. 118)

The purpose of this Bill is to provide effective biosecurity and agriculture management for Western Australia. It will achieve this by establishing an effective means of:

- controlling the entry, establishment, spread and impact of animal and plants pests and diseases;
- controlling the use of agricultural and veterinary chemicals;
- allowing standards to be set to ensure the safety and quality of agricultural products; and
- enabling certain funds to be raised for biosecurity related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 31 August 2006 (P.D.p. 5571).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 1 November 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Rates and Charges Bill 2006* (No. 119)

The purpose of this Bill is to impose the rates and any fee or charge referred to in the *Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Bill 2006* insofar as any of those rates, fees or charges are taxes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 31 August 2006 (P.D.p. 5574).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Biosecurity and Agriculture Management (Repeal and Consequential Provisions) Bill 2006* (No. 117)

The Bill provides for the repeal of the 17 Acts within the Agriculture portfolio that are to be replaced by the proposed Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act, and for savings and transitional arrangements required due to repeals. The Acts that are to be replaced are:

- *Aerial Spraying Control Act 1966*
- *Agricultural Produce (Chemical Residues) Act 1983*
- *Agricultural Products Acts 1929*
- *Agricultural Protection Board Act 1950*
- *Agricultural and Related Resources Protection Act 1976*
- *Argentine Ant Act 1968*
- *Artificial Breeding Stock Act 1965*
- *Beekeepers Act 1963*
- *Cattle Industry Compensation Act 1965*
- *Fertilizers Act 1977*
- *Plant Diseases Act 1914*
- *Plant Pest and Disease (Eradication Funds) Act 1974*
- *Seeds Act 1981*
- *Stock (Identification and Movement) Act 1970*
- *Stock Diseases (Regulations) Act 1968*
- *Veterinary Chemical Control and Animal Feeding Stuffs Act 1976*

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 31 August 2006 (P.D.p. 5573).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Botanic Gardens and Parks Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 157) (Ms S.E. Walker)

The purpose of this Bill is to provide for the Sunset Hospital site (Reserve No. 1720) to be known as 'Sunset Park' and be protected under the *Botanic Gardens and Parks Act 1998*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 August 2006 (P.D.p. 5112).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Censorship Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 065)

This Bill amends the *Censorship Act 1996* to ensure that the name of this Act reflects its revised purpose, as a result of the amendments that made Western Australia a full member of the National Classification Scheme. It addresses deficiencies in certain forfeiture, evidentiary and infringement notice provisions contained in the Act. Finally, it amends this Act so as to incorporate the new combined classifications for films and computer games.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3606).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 6 April 2006.

(Act No. 10 of 2006 – assented to on 8 May 2006)

Chemistry Centre (WA) Bill 2006* (No. 121)

The purpose of this Bill is to take the Chemistry Centre, an office within the Department of Industry and Resources, and establish it as a statutory authority.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 5 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1169).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Children and Community Services (Mandatory Reporting) Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 162) (Hon P. Omodei)

The purpose of this Bill to amend the *Children and Community Services Act 2004* to provide for mandatory reporting of harm, or suspected harm, to children by abuse or neglect.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8049).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Coal Industry Superannuation Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 014)

This Bill seeks to give the Coal Industry Superannuation Board the ability to be competitive with other superannuation funds by providing for spouse accounts and allocated pensions. The Bill also implements the legislative amendments recommended in the Review of the Coal Industry Superannuation Board and the *Coal Industry Superannuation Act 1989*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 578).

(Act No. 16 of 2006 – assented to on 17 May 2006)

Coal Miners' Welfare Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 016)

The purpose of the Bill is to implement the recommendations of the October 2002 Review of the Coal Miner's Welfare Board and the principal Act, carried out in response to the report of the Machinery of Government Taskforce. The Bill improves the effectiveness of the operation of the Coal Miners' Welfare Board and the Coal Miners' Welfare Fund.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 577).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 5 May 2005.

(Act No. 17 of 2006 – assented to on 17 May 2006)

Commissioner for Children and Young People Bill 2005* (No. 053)

The purpose of this Bill is to establish an office of Commissioner for Children and Young People as an office outside the public service. The Bill invests the Commissioner with certain functions and powers, including to advocate for the well-being of children and young people, and to conduct special inquiries in particular circumstances. The Commissioner will not have the role of investigating particular complaints but will be able to refer those to appropriate investigative agencies.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 June 2005 (P.D.p. 2582).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 25 August 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 19 September 2006.

(Act No. 48 of 2006 – assented to on 4 October 2006)

Commonwealth Powers (De Facto Relationships) Bill 2005* (No. 086)

The purpose of the Bill is to refer legislative power to the Commonwealth Parliament under section 51(xxxvii) of the Commonwealth *Constitution* in relation to the superannuation interests of de facto partners whose relationship has broken down.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6733).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 30 May 2006.

(Act No. 26 of 2006 – assented to on 26 June 2006)

**Community Protection (Offender Reporting) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 062)
(Mr M.J. Birney)**

The purpose of the Bill is to amend Schedule 2 of the *Community Protection (Offender Reporting) Act 2004*. The amendment ensures that those convicted under sections 60 and 101 of the *Censorship Act 1996* are to comply with the reporting requirements of the *Community Protection (Offender Reporting) Act 2004*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3235).

The Bill was removed from the Legislative Notice Paper on 19 October 2006 under Legislative Assembly Standing Order 144A.

Constitution Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 001)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Constitution Acts Amendment Act 1899* by giving the President a deliberative vote on all questions that come before the House, and by removing the President's casting vote.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 29).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Consumer Affairs Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 130) (Dr G. G. Jacobs)

The purpose of this Bill is to remove the upper limit as a measure of damages entirely so as to not prevent, restrict or even frustrate the Commissioner for Fair Trading in acting for consumers, whether the figure be \$4, \$40,000 or \$400,000.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 5 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1212).

Second Reading not agreed to in the Legislative Assembly on 10 May 2006.

Consumer Protection Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2005* (No. 084)

The purpose of this Bill is to make amendments to a number of Acts within the portfolio of Consumer Protection. The amendments correct anomalies, improve consumer protection, streamline administrative practices and remove unnecessary legislation. The Bill repeals one Act and amends 11 Acts. In particular, the Bill:

- amends the *Builders' Registration Act 1939* to correct a drafting oversight so that the building licence levy will apply throughout the State as intended by the *Building Legislation Amendment Act 2000*;
- amends the *Consumer Affairs Act 1971* to extend the term of membership of members of the Consumer Product Safety Committee from one to three years and to enable the Commissioner for Fair Trading to make product safety orders in the interests of public

safety which have been promulgated under product safety laws in other States and Territories, or by the Commonwealth;

- amends the *Credit (Administration) Act 1984* to establish a Consumer Credit Fund in order for civil penalty amounts awarded against credit providers who have breached the Consumer Credit Code to be able to be distributed for the purposes of advancing consumer credit issues such as providing counselling services, providing legal advice, and providing information and research about the use of consumer credit;
- amends the *Land Valuers Licensing Act 1978* to increase all penalties under that Act in line with the recommendations of the Temby Royal Commission;
- amends the *Motor Vehicle Dealers Act 1973* to correct a drafting oversight from the *Motor Vehicle Dealers Amendment Act 2002* where the term ‘agent’ was used instead of ‘dealer’ in a trust account provision;
- amends the *Residential Tenancies Act 1987* to overcome inconsistencies by enabling decisions regarding tenancy disputes made by Registrars in the Magistrates Court to be able to be appealed and amends the Regulations to provide for the electronic lodging of bond monies;
- amends the *Real Estate and Business Agent Act 1978* to exempt holiday accommodation managers from licensing provisions of the Act;
- amends the *Retirement Villages Act 1992* to exempt residential aged care facilities that achieve and maintain Commonwealth certification or accreditation under the provisions of the *Commonwealth Aged Care Act 1997* from the provisions of the *Retirement Villages Act 1992*;
- amends the *Settlement Agents Act 1981* to provide certainty for the vendor’s settlement agent being able to withdraw trust monies after settlement to pay the commission, or balance of the commission, of the real estate agent in accordance with the authorisation of the vendor;
- repeals the *Trading Stamps Act 1981* to overcome outmoded concepts which prohibit businesses offering coupons, which can be redeemed from a third party, in connection with the sale of their goods or services, and, as a result of the repeal, amends the *Fair Trading Act 1987* to provide for the Minister to approve benign third party trading schemes and prohibit others that are contrary to fair trading principles; and
- amends the *Travel Agents Act 1985* to implement a National Competition Policy review recommendation to remove the Crown’s exemption from compliance with the Act.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5745).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 20 October 2005.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 1 June 2006.

(Act No. 69 of 2006 – assented to on 13 December 2006)

Criminal and Found Property Disposal Bill 2005 (No. 114)

The *Criminal and Found Property Disposal Bill 2005* provides police officers with a simplified method of disposing of property that is seized under the proposed Criminal Investigation Bill. The Bill also provides methods of disposal for any other property that may come into possession of police.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7643).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 10 May 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 17 October 2006.

Referred to Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 13 June 2006.

(Act No. 57 of 2006 – assented to on 16 November 2006)

Criminal Code Amendment (Cyber Predators) Bill 2005* (No. 087)

This Bill seeks to update the law relating to crimes of child exploitation by addressing the modern methods by which the crimes are committed. The Bill is based on Queensland legislation and does the following:

- creates an offence for using electronic communication to procure a child to engage in sexual activity or to expose a child to indecent material;
- provides for the issue of a court order requiring a suspect, or person controlling a data storage device, to provide police with access to evidence of child exploitation offences that is contained within the device; and
- amends the *Working With Children (Criminal Record Checking) Act 2004* to include in Schedule 2 of that Act the offences of using electronic communication to procure children for sexual activity or to expose children to indecent material.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6725).

(Act No. 3 of 2006 – assented to on 30 March 2006)

Criminal Investigation Bill 2005* (No. 116)

The Criminal Investigation Bill is an amalgamation of statutory police powers currently available to police by virtue of the *Police Act 1892* and *The Criminal Code*. It also codifies the majority of police common law powers and introduces new powers that reflect the needs of a contemporary police force. The Bill introduces significant controls on these powers to ensure that individuals' human rights are protected and which minimise the opportunity for misuse of powers. The Bill draws on legislation from the United Kingdom, Queensland and New South Wales but takes into account the unique circumstances in Western Australia, particularly with respect to regional areas.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7639).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 13 June 2006.

Amended in the Legislative Council on 25 October 2006.

(Act No. 58 of 2006 – assented to on 16 November 2006)

Criminal Investigation (Consequential Provisions) Bill 2005* (No. 115)

This Bill makes amendments to various pieces of legislation to accommodate the introduction of the Criminal Investigation Bill 2005 and the Criminal and Found Property Disposal Bill 2005. Broadly, these changes include repealing antiquated provisions that will be replaced by modernised provisions in the Criminal Investigation Bill, amending references in the other Acts, amending other Acts to come into line with the Criminal Investigation Bill's concepts and replacing repealed provisions where it is inappropriate to include the replacement within the Criminal Investigation Bill.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7645).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 13 June 2006.

Amended in the Legislative Council on 25 October 2006.

(Act No. 59 of 2006 – assented to on 16 November 2006)

Criminal Law and Evidence Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 145)

This Bill is an amalgamation of two proposed reform packages, amending the *Evidence Act 1906*, *The Criminal Code* and the *Criminal Procedure Act 2004*. This will give effect to procedural reforms in sexual assault cases in order to complete the reforms intended as part of the Sexual Assault Reforms Package. It also amends *The Criminal Code*, the *Criminal Procedure Act 2004* and the *Criminal Appeals Act 2004* to provide for a right to appeal by the prosecution against acquittals in trials before juries and to remedy certain deficiencies in existing provisions.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 June 2006 (P.D.p. 4211).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 2 November 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Curriculum Council (Fees and Charges) Bill 2006 (No. 169)

This Bill validates the past collections of fees and charges by the Curriculum Council as those matters were dealt with by regulations as envisaged by sections 14 and 33 of the *Curriculum Council Act 1997*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7209).

(Act No. 62 of 2006 – assented to on 30 November 2006)

Dangerous Sexual Offenders Bill 2005* (No. 105)

This Bill provides for the detention in custody or the supervision of persons of a particular class to ensure adequate protection of the community and to provide continuing control, care and treatment of those persons.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7005).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 15 November 2005.

(Act No. 1 of 2006 – assented to on 30 March 2006)

Daylight Saving Bill 2006 (No. 174) (Mr J. D'Orazio)

The purpose of this Bill is to introduce daylight saving to the State of Western Australia. The Bill proposes to introduce an initial period of daylight saving on 1 December 2006 with the finishing date of 25 March 2007. The Bill has a 'sunset clause' which allows for a review to be undertaken by Parliament and presented to both Houses by 31 July 2009.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 25 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7648).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Daylight Saving Bill (No. 2) 2006 (No. 175) (Mr. M. J. Birney)

This Bill provides for a trial period of daylight saving in Western Australia of three years, for the summers of 2006–2007, 2007–2008 and 2008–2009, with a referendum to be held thereafter on the question of daylight saving on a permanent basis.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 25 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7646).

(Act No. 61 of 2006 – assented to on 24 November 2006)

Dental Bill 2005* (No. 113)

This Bill provides for effective registration of persons practising dentistry and for dental prosthetics. It controls the use of the titles 'dentist', 'dental prosthetist', 'dental therapist', 'school dental therapist' and 'dental hygienist' and seeks to prevent conduct from non-dental professionals that may be misleading to consumers and the general public. Importantly the Bill adequately identifies members of the dental profession, enabling the consumers of dental service to make informed decisions when engaging a practitioner.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7646).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 4 May 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Director of Public Prosecutions (Standing Committee) Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 181) (Ms. S. E. Walker)

This Bill amends the *Director of Public Prosecutions Act 1991* to establish a joint standing committee which oversees aspects of the role of the Director of Public Prosecutions.

This Bill was introduced and read a first time in the Legislative Assembly on 29 November 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Electoral Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 158)

The main purpose of this Bill is the introduction of public funding of candidates and parties and minimum thresholds for election funding and return of deposits. Other provisions include:

- the clarification of the qualifications for nominating as a candidate;
- modification of the counting method for the Legislative Council;
- removal of prisoner voting rights;
- simplified early voting procedures;
- increased provisions for the privacy of electoral information;
- changes to the definition of 'small party' status; and
- general provisions which improve electoral administration.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 August 2006 (P.D.p. 5079). This Bill was then subsequently divided into three in the Legislative Assembly on 14 September 2006. The three Bills created were:

- Electoral Legislation Amendment Bill 2006 (158—2)
- Electoral Reform (Electoral Funding) Bill 2006 (163)
- Parliamentary Legislation Amendment Bill 2006 (164)

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 19 September 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 1 November 2006.

(Act No. 64 of 2006 – assented to on 8 December 2006)

Electoral Reform (Electoral Funding)* (No. 163)

This Bill was created when the Electoral Legislation Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 158) was divided into three in the Legislative Assembly on 14 September 2006. The purpose of this Bill is the introduction of public funding of candidates and parties and minimum thresholds for election funding and return of deposits.

The motion for the Second Reading of the (newly created) Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 14 September 2006 (P.D.p. 5992).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 14 September 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 28 September 2006.

(Act No. 55 of 2006 – assented to on 26 October 2006)

Electricity Corporations Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 132) (Mr. M. W. Trenorden)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend section 126 of the *Electricity Corporations Act 2005* to provide for dividend paying corporations. The Bill provides that the Electricity Networks Corporation must not pay any dividend.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 10 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2511).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Electricity Industry (Western Australian Renewable Energy Targets) Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 097) (Hon P. Llewellyn)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Electricity Industry Act 2004* to impose, as a condition of holding a retail license to sell electricity in the South West interconnected system, an obligation to acquire target levels of electricity generated from renewable energy sources.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 1 December 2005 (P.D.p. 7964).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Energy Operators (Powers) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 068)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal section 55 of the *Energy Operators (Powers) Act 1979*, which requires the approval of the Coordinator of Energy prior to any new gas undertaking being established. It also makes a consequential amendment to the *Gas Pipeline Access (Western Australia) Act 1998* which references the approval power.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5746).

(Act No. 8 of 2006 – assented to on 5 May 2006)

Energy Safety Bill 2005* (No. 094)

This Bill seeks to establish adequate long-term funding by the energy industry for technical and safety regulation of the electricity and gas industries and other related activities, which are carried out by the Director of Energy Safety and his staff at the Energy *Safety* Division of the Department of Consumer and Employment Protection.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 19 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6612).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 16 November 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 23 May 2006.

Referred to Legislative Council Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations on 6 April 2006.

(Act No. 24 of 2006 – assented to on 21 June 2006)

Energy Safety Levy Bill 2005* (No. 095)

The purpose of this Bill is to impose the levy which is the cornerstone of the funding arrangements proposed under the Energy Safety Bill. The separate Bill is required under section 46(7) of the *Constitutional Acts Amendment Act 1899*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 19 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6614).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations on 6 April 2006.

(Act No. 25 of 2006 – assented to on 21 June 2006)

Equal Opportunity Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 173)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend Part III of the *Equal Opportunity Act 1984*, which deals with discrimination on the ground of race. The Bill inserts a new division into Part III entitled ‘Racially Offensive Behaviour.’ It will be unlawful for a person to do any act, otherwise in private, that is reasonably likely to offend, insult, humiliate or intimidate another person on the ground of race, or on the ground of a characteristic appertaining or imputed to persons of that race.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8015).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Family Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 142)

The purpose of this Bill is to bring the *Family Court Act 1997* of Western Australia up to date with the *Family Law Act 1975* of the Commonwealth. It incorporates those amendments made to the *Family Law Act 1975* (Cwlth) by the Commonwealth Parliament in the last few years and those that will be made by the Family Law Amendment (Shared Parental Responsibility) Bill 2005 (Cwlth). As a result, this legislation provides that those Western Australians in a de facto relationship, and their ex nuptial children, will be in the same position as their married counterparts and the children of those marriages.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2765).

(Act No. 35 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Financial Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2006* (No. 150)

There are a number of transitional provisions contained in this Bill that will allow various items and instruments under the *Financial Administration and Audit Act 1985* to continue in effect. Examples of these are trust accounts, departmental operating accounts, determinations by the Treasurer and Treasurer’s Instructions.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2006 (P.D.p. 4591).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations on 24 October 2006.

Amended in the Legislative Council on 7 December 2006.

(Act No. 77 of 2006 – assented to on 21 December 2006)

Financial Management Bill 2006* (No. 100)

The purpose of this Bill is to replace the *Financial Administration and Audit Act 1985* with a new Financial Management Act and a separate Auditor General Act.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2006 (P.D.p. 4588).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 20 September 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 7 December 2006.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations on 24 October 2006.

(Act No. 76 of 2006 – assented to on 21 December 2006)

Fines Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 161)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Fines, Penalties and Infringement Notices Enforcement Act 1994* and the *Sentence Administration Act 2003*. The amendments will increase the level of flexibility of fines enforcement to assist people to pay fines whilst maintaining the integrity of the fine as a sentence. As a result, there will be a reduction in the number of people imprisoned for fine default only.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 13 September 2006 (P.D.p. 5857).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 28 November 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Fish Resources Management Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 148)

This Bill amends the *Fish Resources Management Act 1994* to provide for adequate and appropriate State penalties and to strengthen the State forfeiture and seizure provisions in respect of foreign fishing offences committed in State coastal waters.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 21 June 2006 (P.D.p. 4068).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Food Bill 2005* (No. 110)

The purpose of this Bill is to provide for the safety and suitability of food for human consumption, and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7657).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 20 June 2006.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 22 June 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Gas and Electricity Safety Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 030)

This Bill amends the *Energy Coordination Act 1994*, the *Gas Standards Act 1972* and the *Electricity Act 1945* to improve the technical and safety regulation provisions in the energy industry legislation. Amendments are required to the legislation to ensure there is an effective technical and safety regulatory framework for the now fully privatised and competitive gas supply industry, as well as the increasingly competitive electricity supply industry.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 14 June 2006 (P.D.p. 3663).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Gene Technology Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 018)

This Bill provides for a person who is the holder of a licence to deal with genetically modified organisms to pay a charge for the licence. The amount of the charge is prescribed by regulations.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 580).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Gene Technology Bill 2005* (No. 019)

The purpose of the Bill is to establish the Western Australian component of a national regulatory scheme for activities involving gene technology and genetically modified organisms. The regulatory framework will operate in conjunction with other Commonwealth and State regulatory schemes relevant to genetically modified organisms (GMOs) and GM products. These include the existing schemes for the regulation of foods, therapeutic goods, agricultural and veterinary chemicals, and industrial chemicals.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 578).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 5 May 2005.

(Act No. 20 of 2006 – assented to on 9 June 2006)

Health Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 011)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend parts of the *Health Act 1911* to provide improved communicable disease notification, so as to facilitate public health programs for prevention and control of communicable diseases in Western Australia.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 566).

(Act No. 23 of 2006 – assented to on 9 June 2006)

**Health (Fresh Produce – State or Territory of Origin) Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 067)
(Mr. D. T. Redman)**

This Bill provides for origin labelling of fresh produce such as fruits, vegetables and nuts. It means that all fresh produce displayed for retail sale, originating from within the Commonwealth, must be labelled indicating the item's State or Territory of origin.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3630).

Referred to the Legislative Assembly Economics and Industry Standing Committee on 29 June 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Heritage of Western Australia (Crown Acquisition of Registered Places) Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 182) (Ms. S. E. Walker)

This Bill provides that an owner whose land has been entered in the Register of Heritage Places has the right to require the Crown to acquire the owner's estate or interest in the land at a price determined by reference to the value of the land before the entry was made in the register.

This Bill was introduced and read a first time in the Legislative Assembly on 23 November 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Hospitals and Health Services Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 079)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Hospitals and Health Services Act 1927*. The Bill will implement the recommendation of the report entitled *A Review of the Licensing of Private Sector Aged Care Facilities in Western Australia* to remove the requirement for private operated nursing homes to be licensed under the Act if they have received and maintained certification under the *Aged Care Act 1997* (Cwlth).

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5011).

(Act No. 45 of 2006 – assented to on 4 October 2006)

Human Tissue and Transplant Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 080)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend the *Human Tissue and Transplant Act 1982*. The Bill will eliminate an unnecessary restriction on live organ donation such as paired kidney exchange.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 September 2005 (P.D.p. 5012).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 13 April 2006.

(Act No. 14 of 2006 – assented to on 11 May 2006)

Industrial Training Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 165)

The purpose of this Bill is to introduce part-time apprenticeships. The introduction of part-time apprenticeships will allow people to participate in an apprenticeship on a less than full-time basis and also enable school-based apprenticeships for school students wishing to commence an apprenticeship while still at school.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 September 2006 (P.D.p. 6344).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 26 October 2006.

(Act No. 68 of 2006 – assented to on 11 December 2006)

Integrity of Parliamentary Process Bill 2005 (LC No. 002) (Hon P. Foss)

The purpose of this Bill is to protect the integrity of the Parliamentary process from undue influence from outside or within the Parliament and also to assist members in taking decisions as a parliamentary representative in the best interests of their electorate.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 33).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Iron Ore (FMG Chichester Pty Ltd) Agreement Bill 2006 (No. 127)

The purpose of the Bill is to ratify and authorise the implementation of an agreement (which forms Schedule 1 of the Bill) between the State of Western Australia, FMG Chichester Pty Ltd and Fortescue Metals Group Ltd for the purpose of the development of the Pilbara Iron Ore and Infrastructure Project.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 5 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1166).

(Act No. 44 of 2006 – assented to on 3 October 2006)

Labour Relations Legislation Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 123)

This Bill will amend various Acts to:

- provide for reasonable hours of work under the *Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993* (MCE Act);
- make minor amendments to the right of entry provisions under the *Industrial Relations Act 1979* (IR Act);
- enable the Western Australian Industrial Relations Commission (WAIRC) to independently set wages for State-based employees under awards and the MCE Act;
- enable an employer or a union seeking to make a federal collective agreement to initiate good-faith bargaining under the IR Act;
- prohibit employers from requiring or unduly pressuring employees to contract-out of annual leave under the MCE Act;
- improve minimum parental leave, sick leave, carer's leave and bereavement leave entitlements under the MCE Act;

- improve long service leave entitlements under the *Long Service Leave Act 1958* (LSL Act) and the *Construction Industry Portable Paid Long Service Leave Act 1985* (Construction Act);
- abolish the Long Service Leave General Order of the WAIRC;
- enhance Industrial Inspectors' powers under the LSL Act; and
- designate the MCE and LSL Acts' record-keeping provisions as civil penalty provisions, instead of offence provisions.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 March 2006 (P.D.p. 935).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 20 June 2006.

(Act No. 36 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Land Information Authority Bill 2006* (No. 144)

The purpose of the Bill is to establish a statutory authority to undertake the Government's land titling, land information and land valuation functions. In addition, the authority will lead the commercial development of the State's Land Information Databases, which have acquired market value in recent years as a result of significant changes in technology and demand.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 14 June 2006 (P.D.p. 3661).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 31 October 2006.

(Act No. 60 of 2006 – assented to on 16 November 2006)

Legal Aid Commission Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 085)

This Bill amends section 37 of the *Legal Aid Commission Act 1976* to give the Attorney General the power to authorise the Commission to provide legal aid without applying the means test in certain circumstances. However, the Commission will still consider whether it is reasonable, in all the circumstances, for legal aid to be granted.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6732).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 10 May 2006.

(Act No. 27 of 2006 – assented to on 26 June 2006)

Liquor and Gaming Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 166)

The purpose of this Bill is to support the Government's commitment to stimulating more innovation and choice for consumers, while at the same time promoting lower risk drinking environments and addressing alcohol-related anti-social behaviour. The reforms include measures to protect the health and safety of consumers and the public generally.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 19 September 2006 (P.D.p. 6341).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 24 October 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 5 December 2006.

(Act No. 73 of 2006 – assented to on 13 December 2006)

Local Government Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 155)

The purpose of this Bill is to change the date for local government ordinary elections from the first Saturday in May to the third Saturday in October and to introduce the State Parliamentary system of voting (i.e. the Weighted Inclusive Gregory method) for local government elections.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 27 September 2006 (P.D.p. 6763).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 25 October 2006.

(Act No. 66 of 2006 – assented to on 8 December 2006)

Local Government Amendment Bill (No. 2) 2006* (LC No. 180)

This Bill was created as a consequence of the Legislative Council dividing the Local Government Amendment Bill 2006 (155—2) into two Bills.

The key purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Local Government Act 1995* to remove the ‘first-past-the-post’ system of voting for local government elections and replace it with the preferential system for single member elections and the proportional system for multi-member elections. These systems currently apply for the Legislative Assembly and the Legislative Council respectively.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Environment and Public Affairs on 23 November 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 089)

The proposed changes in this Bill are to the *Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1960* and include:

- some amendments carried over from the *Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Amendment Bill 2003* (the 2003 Bill) which lapsed on 23 January 2005;
- some revised amendments based on provisions in the 2003 Bill; and
- other changes not contemplated in the 2003 Bill.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 10 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7138).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Local Government (Official Conduct) Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 104)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Local Government Act 1995* to provide a disciplinary framework to deal with individual misconduct by local government council members. At present, apart from prosecution, the only avenue for action in response to inappropriate behaviour is against the whole council.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7380).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 11 April 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Machinery of Government (Miscellaneous Amendments) Bill 2005* (No. 017)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend various Acts to implement certain recommendations of the Machinery of Government Taskforce, and to help reduce the excessive number and fragmented nature of departments and agencies within the Western Australian public sector.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3336).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 10 May 2006.

(Act No. 28 of 2006 – assented to on 26 June 2006)

Medical Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 106)

Provisions contained in this Bill allow the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to nominate a medical practitioner employed within the public service, such as from the Department of Health or a salaried officer who is a medical practitioner and employed at a public hospital or health service, to sit on the Medical Board. This would give the CEO greater flexibility when nominating a medical practitioner to sit on the Board and ensure that a range of interests and qualities are reflected in the Board's membership.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7378).

(Act No. 49 of 2006 – assented to on 6 October 2006)

Medical Practitioners Bill 2006* (No. 183)

The Bill repeals the *Medical Act 1894* and replaces it with a modern registration scheme to ensure that only properly qualified and competent persons are registered to practise medicine and to regulate the practice by those persons for the purpose of protecting consumers of health services in Western Australia. The Bill implements the recommendations of the review of the *Medical Act 1894* which was provided to the Minister for Health in 2001.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 November 2006 (P.D.p. 9044).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Medical Radiation Technologists Bill 2005* (No. 088)

The purpose of this Bill is:

- to provide for regulation of the practice of medical radiation technology and registration of persons as medical radiation technologists;

- to amend the *Radiation Safety Act 1975*;
- to make consequential amendments to various Acts; and
- for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6734).

(Act No. 21 of 2006 – assented to on 9 June 2006)

Minerals and Energy Research Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 122)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Minerals and Energy Research Act 1987*. The Act establishes the Minerals and Energy Research Institute of Western Australia, the function of which is to encourage the development of the minerals and energy industries for the benefit of the State by fostering and promoting all aspects of minerals and energy research.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 5 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1169).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Misuse of Drugs Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 147)

This Bill alters the definition of an ‘external serious drug offence’ at section 32A(3)(b), in terms of Commonwealth offences, by deleting the reference to section 233B of the *Customs Act 1901* (Cwlth) and replacing this subsection with a reference to an ‘offence against a prescribed provision of a law of the Commonwealth.’ This amendment removes reference to a repealed Commonwealth law, and provides the flexibility to reference equivalent Commonwealth laws in regulations.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 14 June 2006 (P.D.p. 3662).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 24 August 2006.

(Act No. 40 of 2006 – assented to on 22 September 2006)

Motor Vehicle (Third Party Insurance) Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 040)

The purpose of this Bill is to:

- enable the Minister for Government Enterprises to vary the Scales of Premiums for compulsory third party (CTP) insurance on more than one occasion in any financial year, should it be deemed necessary;
- remove a means by which an Incorporated Insurance Office, as defined under the *Workers’ Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981*, can transfer risk intended to be insured under a workers’ compensation/employers’ indemnity policy, to the compulsory Third Party Insurance Fund (TPIF); and
- introduce a cap on all economic loss for all motor vehicle personal injury claims, consistent with the outcome of the *Civil Liability Act 2002*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1864).

(Act No. 15 of 2006 – assented to on 17 May 2006)

Nurses and Midwives Bill 2005* (No. 103)

This Bill provides a modern framework to protect the health and safety of members of the public by providing for the registration of nurses and midwives and the regulation of the practice of nursing and midwifery.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 16 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7379).

(Act No. 50 of 2006 – assented to on 6 October 2006)

Optical Dispensers Repeal Bill 2005 (No. 036)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Optical Dispensers Act 1966* and the *Optical Dispensers Regulations*. The Bill is introduced as part of the Western Australian Government's obligation under the competition principles agreement to review and reform all legislation that restricts competition unless it can be demonstrated that the restrictions are in the public interest.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1866).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 23 November 2005.

(Act No. 11 of 2006 – assented to on 11 May 2006)

Owner-Drivers (Contracts and Disputes) Bill 2006* (No. 176)

The purpose of this Bill is to provide legislation that ensures safe and sustainable rates for owner-drivers in the road transport industry. This legislation aims to regulate the industry so that standards are maintained at a high level and that self-employed drivers are guaranteed a reasonable rate of return.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 31 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7884).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 28 November 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Parental Support and Responsibility Bill 2005* (No. 041)

This Bill provides for responsible parenting agreements and responsible parenting orders. The Bill provides for information sharing between government agencies and makes consequential amendments to the *Children's Court of Western Australia Act 1988*, the *Young Offenders Act 1994* and provides for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 June 2005 (P.D.p. 2585).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 30 November 2005.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Parliamentary Legislation Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 164)

This Bill was created when the Electoral Legislation Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 158) was divided into three in the Legislative Assembly on 14 September 2006.

The purpose of this Bill is to change the definition of small party status, and to enable the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal to determine an allowance in respect of the office of the Parliamentary Secretary, Chairman, Deputy Chairman or a member of committees of a House or joint committees of both Houses.

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 14 September 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 24 October 2006.

(Act No. 56 of 2006 – assented to on 16 November 2006)

Parole and Sentencing Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 129)

This Bill amends the *Sentence Administration Act 2003* to take into consideration many of the recommendations of the Mahoney Inquiry Report and establishes the Prisoners Review Board. The amendments will also add clarity and enhance the administration of parole and early release of offenders in Western Australia. Further, the Bill strengthens the releasing authorities' consideration of the interests of victims of crime by ensuring the appointment of victim representatives to each of the Prisoners Review Board, the Mentally Impaired Accused Review Board and the Supervised Release Review Board and enables victims to make submissions to those Boards. Finally, the Bill amends the *Sentencing Act 1995* to prohibit offenders being placed on pre-sentence orders when their offence was committed while they were on parole or suspended imprisonment.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 March 2006 (P.D.p. 930).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 4 May 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 24 August 2006.

(Act No. 41 of 2006 – assented to on 22 September 2006)

Pawnbrokers and Second-hand Dealers Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 096)

The changes to the *Pawnbrokers and Second-hand Dealers Act 1994* contained within the current Bill are consistent with the outcome of the National Competition Policy review of the Act. Specifically, the Bill does the following:

- allows standard conditions or restrictions to be prescribed that would apply to all pawnbrokers and/or second-hand dealers' licences;
- ensures that the distinguishing numbering of transaction details maintained by pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers and forwarded to the Commissioner of Police are consecutive;
- provides the Commissioner with the discretion to determine that pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers' premises are to be licensed separately where a licensee owns and operates more than one premise;
- makes second-hand property that is subject to the 14 day retention period more readily identifiable to police officers inspecting second-hand dealers' premises;
- allows pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers to use electronic imaging (digital) in lieu of photographs of their clients;
- creates the ability to fine licensees who breach their licensing conditions or restrictions –

this extension of penalty options is of benefit to the pawnbrokers and second-hand dealers as at present the only penalty option available to a Court for a breach of conditions or restrictions is the suspension or cancellation of a licence;

- removes the identification documents detailed in the Act and prescribes them in the regulations for consistency purposes;
- increases the 21 day limitation period on the issue of infringement notices to 90 days, which provides greater flexibility to police in proceeding with minor offences through the infringement process, and which, as a result, reduces some of the penalties and legal costs imposed on licensees by avoiding the necessity of such minor offences having to go before the courts;
- requires licensees to display their licence number when advertising which enables easier identification of properly licensed persons;
- ensures that pawnbrokers retain pawned goods at the store into which the goods were pawned until they are redeemed or sold, unless they are removed specifically for auctioning; and
- makes options to re-purchase subject to the same conditions and requirements as if the items were pawned, thus preventing circumvention of the legislation thereby protecting the interests of the community and other legitimate pawnbrokers.

The Bill also addresses a potential anomaly that has arisen as the result of the recent High Court decision of May 2005 in *Palgo Pty Ltd v Gowans*, in which it was held that lending money with goods as security was not necessarily pawnbroking.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7008).

(Act No. 46 of 2006 – assented to on 4 October 2006)

Perth International Centre for Application of Solar Energy Repeal Bill 2005 (No. 029)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal the *Perth International Centre for Application of Solar Energy Act 1994*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2005 (P.D.p. 1867).

(Act No. 43 of 2006 – assented to on 3 October 2006)

Pharmacists Bill 2006* (No. 185)

The objective of the Bill is to protect the public of Western Australia from potential harm by providing for the effective regulation of pharmacy. To achieve this objective, the Bill vests the Pharmacists Board of Western Australia with two principal statutory functions:

- registration – the Board is responsible for determining who may be registered as pharmacists in Western Australia by reference to eligibility criteria that are contained in the Bill. The Board is also responsible for the registration of pharmacy premises and to ensure that pharmacy premises meet appropriate standards; and
- professional regulation – the Board is authorised to inquire into complaints about pharmacists and to take appropriate action where a disciplinary or impairment matter as set out in the Bill is established.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8930).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Police Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 184)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend the *Police Act 1892*, and various other Acts, to update provisions relating to Aboriginal aides so that they are now known as 'Aboriginal Police Liaison Officers'.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8929).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Police (Compensation for Injured Officers) Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 159) (Mr. M.J. Cowper)

There is currently no statutory provision for the support, compensation and rehabilitation of members and former members of the WA Police Force who retire, resign or otherwise leave the Police Force with residual illness or injuries which arise through the performance of a police duty or function. Police are specifically excluded from coverage of the *Workers' Compensation and Injury Management Act 1981* (except in death) and this Bill addresses that anomaly by amending the *Police Act 1892* to provide compensation and ongoing medical benefits for officers injured in the course of duty.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 August 2006 (P.D.p. 5115).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Prisons and Sentencing Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 134)

This Bill is the first of two stages in developing a new Corrective Services Act, which will enable the newly formed Department of Corrective Services to better manage offenders in this State. In line with the Mahoney Inquiry recommendations, this Bill amends the *Prisons Act 1981*, and various other Acts and provides for:

- victims and others to request that a prisoner's mail not be sent to them;
- the use of video-link facilities to determine disciplinary charges against prisoners;
- exchange of information to facilitate offender management, research and victim support;
- enhance rehabilitation for prisoners;
- formalise provisions for the operation of work camps;
- approved temporary absences from prison;
- powers and functions of key positions within the Department of Corrective Services; and
- consequential amendments to Acts required as a result of the separation of the Department of Justice into the Department of Corrective Services and the Department of the Attorney General.

The Bill also includes relevant amendments contained in the Acts Amendment (Sentencing) Bill 2005.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 13 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1720).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 29 June 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 1 November 2006.

(Act No. 65 of 2006 – assented to on 8 December 2006)

Public Notaries Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 008)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Public Notaries Act 1979*. This Bill proposes to simplify procedures by transferring the functions of the Attorney General to the Legal Practice Board, which will then report directly to the Chief Justice regarding the suitability and fitness of an applicant and the need for a further appointment.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 30).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Public Trustee and Trustee Companies Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 102)

The purpose of this Bill is to modernise the Public Trustee's legislative framework which has remained largely unchanged for over 60 years. This will allow the Public Trustee to remove inequitable investment and fee arrangements which currently disadvantage some of the most vulnerable members of the Western Australian community, and to provide full trustee services in terms of performing essential financial and legal functions. This Bill will provide for the reform of the Public Trustee's operations and services and enable it to bring its activities up to date with industry best practice, in line with the other Public Trustees in Australia and the Trustee Companies Act. It will also allow the Public Trustee to achieve self-funding over time.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8932).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Racing and Wagering Legislation Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 167)

This Bill complements the Racing and Wagering Western Australia Tax Amendment Bill 2006 to change the method of taxation for off-course racing totalisator wagering, effective from 1 July 2007. The Bill also amends the *Racing Penalties (Appeals) Act 1990*, to change the financial year end for the Racing and Penalties Appeal Tribunal to 30 June.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7208).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Racing and Wagering Western Australia Tax Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 168)

This Bill also amends the *Racing and Wagering Western Australia Tax Act 2003*, so that from 1 July 2007, the rate of taxation is set at 11.9 per cent and defines 'gross revenue' for off-course racing wages in order to determine the appropriate tax payable.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7207).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Railway Discontinuance Bill 2005 (No. 078)

The purpose of this Bill is to formally discontinue sections of the Midland Junction-Welshpool Railway and the Fremantle-Kwinana Railway.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 31 August 2005 (P.D.p. 4864).

(Act No. 2 of 2006 – assented to on 30 March 2006)

Railway Discontinuance Bill (No.2) 2006 (No. 131)

The purpose of this Bill is to authorise the formal discontinuance of sections of railway made redundant by the construction of a new railway, as part of the Geraldton Southern Corridor, from the Port of Geraldton to the railway marshalling yard at Narngulu.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 13 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1719).

(Act No. 72 of 2006 – assented to on 13 December 2006)

Residential Parks (Long-stay Tenants) Bill 2005* (No. 021)

The purpose of this Bill is to:

- balance the needs of residential park residents for greater security of tenure while supporting the maintenance of existing, and the development of new, residential parks;
- mirror appropriate provisions of the *Residential Tenancies Act 1987*, but recognise that this form of accommodation is different from traditional tenancy relationships and provide for those differences;
- include requirements for pre-contractual disclosure, to provide greater contractual certainty;
- require the establishment of a Park Liaison Committee (obligatory where there are 20 or more sites used for long-stay residential purposes) to enable the park's residents to assist the park operator in the development and changes to park rules and policies; and
- give the parties access to a simple and cost-effective dispute resolution process, outside the court system, through the State Administrative Tribunal.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6735).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 17 November 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 13 June 2006.

(Act No. 32 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Retail Shops and Fair Trading Legislation Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 098)

This Bill is to confirm the existing arrangements for retail trading hours in Western Australia. The Bill also introduces the Small Business Legislative Protection Package.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7006).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 22 June 2006.

(Act No. 47 of 2006 – assented to on 4 October 2006)

Revenue Laws Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 143)

This Bill seeks to amend the *Stamp Act 1921*, *Land Tax Act 2002*, *Land Tax Assessment Act 2002* and the *Rates and Charges (Rebates and Deferments) Act 1992* to implement the abolition of stamp duty on hire of goods and mortgages, and the proposed 2006–2007 Budget measures.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2760).

(Act No. 31 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Road Traffic Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 063)

The purpose of this Bill is to implement the National Driver Licensing Scheme. The National Driver Licensing Scheme, developed in consultation with the States and Territories in accordance with the agreed National Road Transport Commission process, is aimed at achieving nationally consistent licensing processes and requirements.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3760).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 20 September 2005.

Amended in the Legislative Council on 26 September 2006.

(Act No. 54 of 2006 – assented to on 26 October 2006)

Road Traffic Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 177)

This Bill will chiefly amend the vehicle impounding and confiscation provisions contained in Part V, Division 4 of the *Road Traffic Act 1974*. These provisions were inserted by the *Road Traffic (Impounding and Confiscation of Vehicles) Act 2004*. Presently, these provisions create certain offences, the commission of which may result in the impounding or confiscation of the vehicle used in the commission of an offence.

This Bill removes the current requirement for police, when considering whether to impound the vehicle of a hoon driver for 48 hours, to have personal knowledge that these are the grounds to impound the vehicle prior to doing so.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 2 November 2006 (P.D.p. 8163).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Road Traffic Amendment (Drug Impaired Driving) Bill 2005* (No. 101)

The purpose of this Bill is to strengthen road traffic legislation in relation to driving under the influence. The Bill will introduce a new offence of driving while impaired by drugs. The amendments include a number of provisions to facilitate proof of the core offence including:

- a requirement for standardised impairment assessment procedures to be conducted by the WA Police;
- provisions to govern the collection and assessment of blood samples; and
- facilitating the use of expert evidence.

The Bill also includes new provisions aimed at the rehabilitation of offenders with drug-related problems.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 9 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7009).

The Bill was withdrawn from the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper on 17 October 2006.

Road Traffic Amendment (Drugs) Bill 2006* (No. 171)

This Bill will expand and strengthen existing drug driving legislation in Western Australia with the aim of increasing the detection of drug drivers and their removal from the State's roads. The Bill introduces two new drug driving offences and supports policy and operational changes within the WA Police. The Bill includes legislative amendments related to random roadside drug testing using oral fluid and those concerning the more serious offence of driving while impaired by a drug.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7206).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Road Traffic (Smoking in Motor Vehicles) Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 151) (Hon Dr K. D. Hames)

The purpose of this Bill is to make it an offence, punishable by a penalty of two penalty units, for a person to smoke inside a motor vehicle, whether in motion or at rest, when any other person inside the motor vehicle has not yet attained the minimum age of 17 years.

This Bill was introduced and read a first time in the Legislative Assembly on 22 June 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Royal Commissions (Powers) Amendment Bill 2005* (LC No. 010)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Royal Commissions Act 1968* and the *Surveillance Devices Act 1998*. This Bill implements Commissioner Kennedy's three recommendations by amending the aforesaid Acts.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 30 March 2005 (P.D.p. 31).

(Act No. 30 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Scrutiny of Government Publicity Bill 2005* (No. 064) (Mr. M. J. Birney)

The objectives of this Bill are to:

- ensure that, as far as possible, public money is not expended on government publicity for a partisan political purpose; and
- constitute a committee to scrutinise government publicity that appears to the committee to have the capacity, or to be likely to have the capacity, in whole or in part, to be used for that purpose.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3628).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper as at 13 December 2006.

Shipping and Pilotage Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 154)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the *Shipping and Pilotage Act 1967*. The proposed amendments will introduce improved administrative arrangements in the appointment of harbour masters and pilots and enhance marine safety arrangements in ports declared under the Act.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 August 2006 (P.D.p. 4808).

(Act No. 71 of 2006 – assented to on 13 December 2006)

Solicitor-General Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 139)

The purpose of the Bill is to amend the *Solicitor-General Act 1969* so that the Solicitor-General has a fixed term tenure not exceeding seven years and is eligible for reappointment. The Bill also amends the *Solicitor-General Act 1969* so that the Solicitor-General is no longer entitled to a judicial pension.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 10 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2477).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 13 June 2006.

(Act No. 29 of 2006 – assented to on 30 June 2006)

Stamp Amendment Bill 2006 (No. 172)

This Bill seeks to amend the *Stamp Act 1921* to clarify the operation of the private unit trust provisions as a result of recent judgements by the High Court of Australia and the State Administrative Tribunal. It is proposed that these amendments be made retrospective to 27 June 2006, the date that the Government announced its intention to legislate. The retrospective commencement date would apply to dispositions that have occurred prior to the date of announcement.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 25 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7608).

(Act No. 67 of 2006 – assented to on 11 December 2006)

Stamp Amendment (First Home Owner) Bill 2006 (No. 156) (Mr. T. Buswell)

The purpose of this Bill is to assist first home buyers by increasing the eligibility threshold to reflect the impact of recent rapid price increases.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 August 2006 (P.D.p. 5477).

Second reading not agreed to in the Legislative Assembly on 27 September 2006.

State Flag Bill 2006 (No. 124) (Hon C. J. Barnett)

The purpose of this Bill is to provide legal status to the Western Australian flag and to ensure that this Parliament recognises the historic and cultural significance of the flag to all Western Australians.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 5 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1213).

In accordance with Joint Standing Order 12, the Bill was amended by resolution of the Legislative Assembly on 16 August 2006 (P.D.p. 4768) and resolution of the Legislative Council on 22 August 2006 (P.D.p. 4899).

(Act No. 22 of 2006 – assented to on 24 August 2006)

Statute Law Revision Bill 2005 (LC No. 032)

The purpose of this Bill is to repeal various obsolete written laws, to consequentially amend various written laws and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 31 March 2005 (P.D.p. 147).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 15 November 2005.

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 28 June 2006.

(Act No. 37 of 2006 – assented to on 4 July 2006)

Statutes (Repeals and Minor Amendments) Bill 2006 (LC No. 170)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend the law by repealing various Acts and adopted imperial Acts, making minor amendments to various other written laws and adopted imperial Acts, and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 18 October 2006 (P.D.p. 7142).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 18 October 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Sunset Hospital Site Bill 2006 (No. 137)

The purpose of this Bill is to facilitate land tenure and planning amendments to A Class reserve 1667 to enable implementation of the Sunset Community Master Plan, providing for:

- the timely adaptive reuse and conservation of the heritage-listed Sunset Hospital site;
- most of the Sunset site remaining as an A Class reserve and being placed under the custodianship of the University of Western Australia for use as the UWA Arts Centre and for development of a residential aged care facility;
- excision of a relatively small part of the A Class reserve 1667 for the development of residential apartments;
- appropriate amendment to the Metropolitan Region Scheme; and
- minor boundary rationalisation to protect improvements owned by the City of Nedlands.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 18 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2862).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Superannuation Legislation Amendment and Validation Bill 2006 (No. 133)

The purpose of this Bill is to implement a number of necessary changes to the superannuation arrangements in the State public sector and Parliamentary superannuation schemes, namely to:

- fully implement the Commonwealth's 'clean break' approach to splitting superannuation upon marriage breakdown;
- reinstate the protection of superannuation death benefits for members of public sector schemes from claims by creditors of the estate;
- provide the Government Employees Superannuation Board (GESB) with the ability to be a successor fund;
- allow GESB to establish a subsidiary to support the provision of ancillary benefits and services to members including financial advice regarding a member's interest in schemes administered by GESB;
- validate the long-standing funding obligations in place for Pension Scheme members employed by TAFE colleges;
- validate benefits paid in West State Super to visiting medical practitioners from 1 July 1992 until 30 June 2001; and
- rectify an unintended drafting error in the superannuation legislation in 2001 which had removed the entitlements of a small group of employees to membership of West State Super.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 12 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1587).

(Act No. 18 of 2006 – assented to on 31 May 2006)

Superannuation Legislation Amendment Bill 2005 (No. 109)

The purpose of this Bill is to implement a number of necessary changes to the superannuation arrangements in the State public sector and Parliamentary superannuation schemes, namely to:

- fully implement the Commonwealth's 'clean break' approach to splitting superannuation upon marriage breakdown;
- reinstate the protection of superannuation death benefits for members of public sector schemes from claims by creditors of the estate;
- provide the Government Employees Superannuation Board (GESB) with the ability to accept transfer from other public sector schemes similar to a successor fund;
- validate the longstanding funding obligations in place for Pension Scheme members employed by TAFE colleges;
- validate benefits paid in West State Super to visiting medical practitioners from 1 July 1992 until 30 June 2001; and
- rectify an unintended drafting error in the superannuation legislation in 2001 which had removed the entitlements of certain Pension Scheme members to membership of West State Super.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 23 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7659).

The Bill was withdrawn from the Legislative Assembly Notice Paper on 11 April 2006.

Swan and Canning Rivers Management Bill 2005 (No. 107)

The purpose of this Bill is to make provisions for the protection and enhancement of the ecological and community benefits and amenity of the Swan and Canning Rivers and associated lands. The new legislation improves the State's ability to coordinate management of activities that may affect the Swan and Canning Rivers. The legislation will replace the *Swan River Trust Act 1988* and the *Environmental Protection (Swan and Canning Rivers) Policy 1997*.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7589).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 4 April 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 20 September 2006.

(Act No. 51 of 2006 – assented to on 6 October 2006)

Swan and Canning Rivers (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2005* (No. 108)

The Swan and Canning Rivers Management Bill 2005 impacts on a number of other Acts; therefore, consequential amendments to these Acts are required. In addition, as the Planning and Development Bill 2005 is currently before Parliament, its passage will require a number of amendments to the *Swan and Canning Rivers Management Act 2005* and the Metropolitan Region Scheme to maintain consistency. Most of these amendments are of a minor nature, replacing references to titles and provisions of other legislation. This Bill includes transitional and saving provisions to ensure a smooth transition from the existing to the consolidated legislation.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 22 November 2005 (P.D.p. 7591).

Amended in the Legislative Council on 20 September 2006.

(Act No. 52 of 2006 – assented to on 6 October 2006)

Swan Valley Planning Legislation Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 028)

The purpose of the Bill is to provide a framework that will protect and preserve the Swan Valley for current and future generations. The Bill implements recommendations from the review of the *Swan Valley Planning Act 1995*, tabled in the Legislative Assembly on 22 September 2004.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 574).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 24 May 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 4 April 2006.

(Act No. 7 of 2006 – assented to on 19 April 2006)

Taxi Amendment Bill 2005* (No. 093)

This Bill amends the *Taxi Act 1994* to enable the Government to buy back transferable Multi-Purpose Taxi (MPT) plates.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 20 October 2005 (P.D.p. 6717).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 10 November 2005.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Legislation on 1 December 2005.

(Act No. 4 of 2006 – assented to on 30 March 2006)

Terrorism (Preventative Detention) Bill 2005 (No. 120)

The object of this Bill is to give effect in Western Australia to the decision of 27 September 2005 of the Council of Australian Governments that States and Territories introduce legislation on preventative detention of persons for up to 14 days to prevent terrorist acts or preserve evidence following a terrorist act.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 1 December 2005 (P.D.p. 8118).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 5 April 2006 and in the Legislative Council on 24 August 2006.

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 12 April 2006.

(Act No. 42 of 2006 – assented to on 22 September 2006)

Tobacco Products Control Bill 2005* (No. 060)

The purpose of this Bill is to prohibit the sale of tobacco products to person under 18 years of age, and:

- to require proof of age for purchase of tobacco products, cigarette papers, pipes and other smoking implements;
- to require those who sell tobacco products to be licensed;

- to control the sale and promotion of herbal cigarettes;
- to prohibit the sale of confectionary, toys and other products that are designed to resemble tobacco products;
- to apply control to internet sales;
- to restrict tobacco product displays;
- to restrict information signs about availability and price of tobacco products; and
- is for other related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 29 June 2005 (P.D.p. 3598).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 25 August 2005 and in the Legislative Council on 21 March 2006.

(Act No. 5 of 2006 – assented to on 12 April 2006)

Trade Measurement Administration Bill 2005* (No. 045)

The purpose of the Bill is to provide for the administration of the Trade Measurement Bill 2005. The Bill is designed to accommodate the unique administrative requirements that apply in Western Australia.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 24 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2193).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 1 September 2005.

(Act No. 12 of 2006 – assented to on 11 May 2006)

Trade Measurement Bill 2005* (No. 046)

The purpose of this Bill is to:

- impose conditions that apply to measuring instruments used for trade in weighing or measuring articles;
- impose conditions for the measurement of articles and substances for determining their sale price;
- provide for disciplinary action against licensees who transgress and rights for administrative decisions to be reviewed;
- provide for the appointment of inspectors and to confer powers on inspectors so that they can undertake compliance functions;
- establish evidence requirements and liabilities of employers, directors and bodies corporate; and
- provide for transitional arrangements that will apply for the measurement of alcoholic liquor.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 24 May 2005 (P.D.p. 2192).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 1 September 2005.

(Act No. 13 of 2006 – assented to on 11 May 2006)

Trans-Tasman Mutual Recognition (Western Australia) Bill 2005* (LC No. 015)

The purpose of this Bill is to adopt the *Trans-Tasman Mutual Recognition Act 1997* of the Parliament of the Commonwealth. The Trans-Tasman Recognition Arrangement provides for the recognition within each State and Territory of the Commonwealth of regulatory standards adopted in New Zealand regarding goods and occupations, and for related purposes.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Council was moved on 21 June 2005 (P.D.p. 2789).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Treasurer's Advance Authorisation Bill 2006 (No. 135)

The purpose of this Bill is to authorise the Treasurer to make certain payments and advances for authorised purposes chargeable to the consolidated fund of the Treasurer's advance account within the monetary limit available for the financial year commencing 1 July 2006.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 12 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1586).

(Act No. 19 of 2006 – assented to on 31 May 2006)

Volunteers (Protection from Liability) Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 136)

This Bill amends the *Volunteers (Protection from Liability) Act 2002* to provide protection from civil liability to businesses when they donate food or grocery products for charitable purposes. This amendment will provide peace of mind to individuals and businesses that donate food or grocery products for charitable purposes, in that they will not be sued for something which happens to the food or grocery product once it has left their control or possession.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2767).

(Act No. 53 of 2006 – assented to on 26 October 2006)

Water Efficiency Labelling and Standards Bill 2006* (No. 128)

The purpose of this Bill is to implement a cooperative scheme involving complementary Commonwealth, State and Territory legislation to ensure that purchasers of particular types of water-use and water-saving products are provided with information to assist and encourage them to select more water-efficient products.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 6 April 2006 (P.D.p. 1329).

Referred to the Legislative Council Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on 22 June 2006.

Amended in the Legislative Council on 6 December 2006.

(Act No. 74 of 2006 – assented to on 21 December 2006)

Water Resources Legislation Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 138)

The purpose of this Bill is to amend water and water resource management related Acts. It incorporates Machinery of Government amendments introduced in Parliament in 2003 and amends relevant provisions to vest in the Minister certain functions and powers.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 17 May 2006 (P.D.p. 2763).

Amended in the Legislative Assembly on 22 June 2006.

Referred to the Standing Committee on Public Administration on 7 December 2006.

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Wills Amendment Bill 2006* (No. 125)

This Bill updates and modernises the *Wills Act 1970*. Succession laws, or laws relating to wills, were imported into Australian colonies from English law. Although the law has been amended over time, many archaic provisions remain. This Bill will enhance the current wills legislation, give greater effect to a testator's intentions and update ancient provisions of the legislation.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 30 March 2006 (P.D.p. 933).

The Bill remains on the Legislative Council Notice Paper as at 8 December 2006.

Yallingup Foreshore Land Bill 2005 (No. 003)

The purpose of this Bill is to ensure the retention of approximately 13.5 hectares of beach-front land at Yallingup near the foreshore and Caves House. The Bill proposes to:

- preclude a claim that the land had been invalidly acquired in 1938;
- prevent sections 29 and 29A of the *Public Works Act 1902* applying to the land; and
- overcome the claim that the caravan park, parking area and bush fire brigade depot were unlawfully used by reason of a failure to comply with section 29 of the *Public Works Act 1902*.

When enacted, this legislation will settle the rights of the parties which are currently in dispute in Supreme Court proceedings.

The motion for the Second Reading of the Bill in the Legislative Assembly was moved on 7 April 2005 (P.D.p. 567).
