COMMITTEE'S FUNCTIONS AND POWERS

The functions of the Committee are to review and report to the Assembly on: -

- (a) the outcomes and administration of the departments within the Committee's portfolio responsibilities;
- (b) annual reports of government departments laid on the Table of the House;
- (c) the adequacy of legislation and regulations within its jurisdiction; and
- (d) any matters referred to it by the Assembly including a bill, motion, petition, vote or expenditure, other financial matter, report or paper.

At the commencement of each Parliament and as often thereafter as the Speaker considers necessary, the Speaker will determine and table a schedule showing the portfolio responsibilities for each committee. Annual reports of government departments and authorities tabled in the Assembly will stand referred to the relevant committee for any inquiry the committee may make.

Whenever a committee receives or determines for itself fresh or amended terms of reference, the committee will forward them to each standing and select committee of the Assembly and Joint Committee of the Assembly and Council. The Speaker will announce them to the Assembly at the next opportunity and arrange for them to be placed on the notice boards of the Assembly.

CHAIR'S FOREWORD

This is the seventh report of the Education and Health Standing Committee (the Committee), which was first appointed on 30 May 2001. This report provides an overview of the Committee's activities from 1 July 2003 to 30 June 2004.

Over the last 12 months, the Committee has focussed primarily on two inquiries. The first of these was into the 'Role and Interaction of Health Professionals in the Western Australian Public Health System'. The Committee tabled its final report on this matter on 13 May 2004, bringing almost two years of research to a close. The report contained 95 findings, 39 recommendations and I commend my fellow Committee members, and the research staff for their effort in producing that report.

The Committee's second inquiry of this reporting period into 'Attention Deficit Disorder and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder in Western Australia', was referred for investigation by the Legislative Assembly on 16 April 2003. The Committee has conducted an extensive evidence-gathering program and is currently in the process of drafting the final report. It is anticipated that the report will be tabled in the Legislative Assembly on 28 October 2004.

During this reporting period, the Committee also met with senior personnel representing departments from within the Committee's various portfolio responsibilities. These meetings provided an informative and interactive forum that allowed the Committee to keep abreast of current issues and departmental policy directives.

Finally, I would like to thank my fellow Committee members for their individual and collective contributions over this last year and commend the Principal Research Officers, Karen Hall and Liz Kerr and Research Officer, Peter Frantom, for their professionalism and dedication to the work of the Committee. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Helen Lünsmann, Renae Jewell and the Parliamentary Assistants, Glen Whitting and Peter D'Cress, for their assistance throughout the past year.

1.4 Investigative Travel

On 20 June 2003, as part of the Committee's inquiry into 'The Role and Interactions of Health Professionals in the Western Australian Public Health System', two Committee members and one staff member visited Canada and the United Kingdom to meet with specific organisations that had recently developed and implemented innovative health care programs.

Extensive background research identified Canada and the United Kingdom to be at the forefront of health reform and indicated that the changes taking place within these countries was of particular relevance to the Western Australian public health system. On 26 June 2003, a third member of the Committee joined the touring party for the United Kingdom component of the investigative tour. The Committee returned to Australia on 6 July 2003.

1.5 Conferences

The Committee did not attend any conferences during the period 1 July 2003 to 30 June 2004.

1.6 Reports Tabled

The Committee tabled three reports during the period 1 July 2003 to 30 June 2004, they were as follows:

1.7 Work in Progress

Inquiry into Attention Deficit Disorder and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder in Western Australia

On Wednesday, 16 April 2003, the Legislative Assembly agreed to a motion that the Committee inquire into Attention Deficit Disorder and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder in Western Australia. In accordance with Standing Order 287(2), the following Terms of Reference were referred to the Committee for investigation:

(a) The extent of the incidence, diagnosis and use of stimulant medication for the treatment of Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) and Attention

Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) in Western Australia, taking into account all previous reports and inquiries;

- (b) an analysis of those figures compared to other States of Australia and other countries;
- (c) the analysis of emerging medical opinion and varying medical and behavioural approaches for the treatment of ADD and ADHD;
- (d) the divergence of public opinion and the need for a more defined State Policy;
- (e) the relationship, if any, between those diagnosed with and/or medicated for, ADD or ADHD and drug addiction; and
- (f) the relationship between ADD or ADHD and the educational, economic and social wellbeing of individuals.

Subsequently, at its meeting on 7 May 2003, the Committee resolved to undertake the inquiry and report back to the House by 30 June 2004. The reporting date was then extended, by resolution of the Committee and on agreement of the House, until 28 October 2004.

An advertisement calling for public submissions was placed in the *West Australian* newspaper on Saturday, 17 May 2003. Submissions were also directly invited from 192 organisations, which included a range of health professionals, community organisations and identified support groups relevant to the inquiry.

(a) Co-opted Member

Standing Order 249 (4) states that:

The Assembly may on motion co-opt any member of the Assembly, not being a Minister, to participate for a specified inquiry, in meetings of a portfolio-related committee or the Public Accounts Committee in relation to portfolio matters allocated to it. That member is not a member of the committee and may not vote, move any motion or be counted for the purpose of a quorum, but in relation to that inquiry may ask questions of witnesses and participate in a deliberative meeting.

Further to the above-mentioned resolution of 16 April 2003, the Assembly agreed to a motion -

That in accordance with Standing Order 249 (4) Mr M.P Whitely be co-opted to participate in the Education and Health Standing Committee's

investigation into Attention Deficit Disorder and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder in Western Australia.¹

The Committee is currently preparing its final report on the matter and expects to report to the House in October 2004.
