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### BUSINESS OF THE ASSEMBLY – NOTICES OF MOTION

#### 1. Temporary Order – Amended Sitting Times (Notice given – 29/11/22)

The Leader of the House: To move –

That the following Temporary Order applies for 2023 –

- (1) The House will meet on Tuesdays at 1.00 pm.
- (2) If the House is required to sit beyond 7.00 pm on a Tuesday evening, such as to require a dinner break, the Speaker will advise the House of this before Question Time on that Tuesday.
- (3) Standing Orders are suspended accordingly to the extent necessary to effect these arrangements.

## **2. Temporary Order – Procedure for Division** (Notice given – 29/11/22)

The Leader of the House: To move –

That, until the end of 2023, the following Temporary Order in relation to divisions applies –

- (1) Standing Order 137 be amended in suborder (2) by deleting “will not leave the House and”.
- (2) Standing Order 139 be replaced by the following:

### **Procedure for division**

**139.** When a division has been called for —

- (1) Strangers will withdraw from the Chamber.
  - (2) The Speaker will state the question and direct members to exit the Chamber and re-enter through the door behind the Speaker’s Chair.
  - (3) The Speaker will direct the ‘Ayes’ to pass to the right of the Chair and be marked off as they pass by a Clerk at the Clerks’ Table and the ‘Noes’ to pass to the left of the Chair and be marked off as they pass by a Clerk at the Clerks’ Table.
  - (4) The Speaker will appoint at least one Teller for each side.
  - (5) The Speaker will order the division bells to be rung for two minutes.
  - (6) After passing the Clerks’ Table members will either resume their seat or leave the Chamber.
  - (7) After the two minutes have expired, voting will continue until either the Tellers agree and advise the Speaker that all members present have voted or until a period of one minute has elapsed from the last member to record a vote.
  - (8) After counting the votes the Tellers will sign their respective list, and the Speaker will declare the result of the division.
- (3) Standing Orders 138, 140 and 141 in relation to divisions remain unchanged.
  - (4) Standing Orders are suspended accordingly to the extent necessary to effect these arrangements.

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## PRIVATE MEMBERS’ BUSINESS – NOTICES OF MOTION

### 1. **Midwifery and Maternity Services** (Notice given – 9/11/21, renewed – 14/6/22)

Ms L. Mettam: To move –

That this House condemns the Labor Government’s failure to recognise the health crisis of its own making, including leaving midwifery and maternity services at “imminent risk of service failure” in hospitals across the State.

### 2. **Acknowledgement of the Member for North West Central**

(Notice given – 21/6/22)

Ms M.J. Davies: To move –

That this House acknowledges the efforts of the Member for North West Central in delivering major infrastructure investment and a legacy of positive growth for the North West and condemns the McGowan Government for their five years of failures in addressing the critical issues of crime, workers accommodation, health, and closure of the Fascine waterway.

### 3. **Vaccination Mandates Review** (Notice given – 22/2/22, renewed – 13/9/22)

Ms M.J. Davies: To move –

That this House calls on the Labor Government to expedite a review of vaccination mandates to ensure all mandates remain proportionate and reasonable responses to the public health risks faced by West Australians.

**4. School Communities** (Notice given – 22/2/22, renewed – 13/9/22)

Mr P.J. Rundle: To move –

That this House condemns the Minister for Education’s breach of West Australians’ trust by plunging families, teachers, and school communities into a state of chaos and confusion ahead of the 2022 school year.

**5. Cost of Living Pressures** (Notice given – 22/3/22, renewed – 25/10/22)

Mr R.S. Love: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for their inaction on alleviating cost of living pressures on West Australian families, while sitting on a record surplus built on Commonwealth funds rather than sound economic management.

**6. Pressures impacting WA Households** (Notice given – 29/11/22)

Ms M.J. Davies: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Labor Government’s failure to address the rising crises across multiple portfolios, including the failure to respond to the pressures impacting Western Australian households, despite sitting on a massive \$6 billion surplus.

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**PRIVATE MEMBERS’ BUSINESS – ORDERS OF THE DAY**

**1. The International Education Sector** (Moved – 23/2/22)

Adjourned debate (Mr S.A. Millman – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle –

That this House condemns the Minister for International Education’s failure to protect the \$2 billion international education sector, placing at risk the welfare of students and more than 12,000 jobs whilst tarnishing the State’s reputation.

**2. Department of Communities** (Moved – 16/3/22)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Corrective Services – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government’s dangerous management of the Department of Communities, placing the health and welfare of the State’s most vulnerable people at risk.

**3. State-Owned Electricity Networks** (Moved – 23/3/22)

Adjourned debate (Ms J.J. Shaw – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr D.J. Honey –

That this House condemns the McGowan Labor Government’s failure to properly maintain State-owned electricity networks, leading to major blackouts across WA and inflicting hardship and financial loss for thousands of Western Australians.

**4. State Budget and Cost of Living** (Moved – 6/4/22)

Adjourned debate (Ms M.J. Hammat – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House calls on the McGowan Government to ensure the upcoming State Budget is focused on alleviating cost of living pressures burdening WA families.

**5. Essential Services and Infrastructure** (Moved – 11/5/22)

Adjourned debate (Ms S.E. Winton – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr D.J. Honey on behalf of Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House condemns the McGowan Labor Government's failure to deliver essential services and infrastructure while accumulating a massive budget surplus.

**6. State Budget and Cost of Living** (Moved – 18/5/22)

Adjourned debate (Ms M.J. Hammat – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House condemns the Premier for delivering a budget that fails to provide real cost of living relief and is too little too late for WA families and key sectors in crisis.

**7. Live Sheep Trade** (Moved – 15/6/22)

Adjourned debate (Mr D.R. Michael) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle –

That this House condemns the Premier and his Labor State Government for failing to 'stand up for WA' against direct attacks by the Federal Government against the State's \$136 million live sheep trade.

**8. Energy to Regional WA Customers** (Moved – 15/6/22)

Adjourned debate (Mr D.A.E. Scaife – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr D.J. Honey –

That this House condemns the Labor State Government for failing to deliver reliable and affordable energy to regional WA customers, leaving households, businesses, and entire communities in the dark.

**9. McGowan Government Transparency** (Moved – 22/6/22)

Adjourned debate (Mr P.J. Rundle – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House notes the Office of the Auditor General's findings of persistent transparency failures by the McGowan Labor Government, including reporting of progress of major projects, and calls on the Premier to deliver on his promise of "gold standard transparency".

**10. Key Ministerial Portfolios** (Moved – 10/8/22)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Mines and Petroleum – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House calls on the Premier to sack his incompetent ministers after a winter recess that has exposed a raft of delivery failures in key portfolios.

**11. Housing Crisis in Western Australia** (Moved – 17/8/22)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Community Services – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House calls on the Minister for Housing to address the raft of failures in his portfolio which have pushed Western Australia into a housing crisis.

**12. METRONET Projects** (Moved – 21/9/22)

Adjourned debate (Mrs J.M.C. Stojkovski – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House calls on the McGowan Labor Government to take responsibility for the cost blow-outs and lengthy delays besieging the METRONET projects.

**13. Western Australia's Energy Network** (Moved – 19/10/22)

Adjourned debate (Ms J.J. Shaw – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr D.J. Honey –

That this House condemns the McGowan Labor Government and its Minister for Energy for five and a half years of ongoing mismanagement of our State's energy network that is leaving households and business vulnerable to blackouts.

**14. Cost of Living Emergency in Western Australia** (Moved – 26/10/22)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Finance – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms L. Mettam –

That this House calls for the McGowan Labor Government to address the impact of increased demand and rising costs of delivery from community organisations supporting WA families through the ongoing cost of living emergency.

**15. Referral to the Public Accounts Committee** (Moved – 16/11/22)

Adjourned debate (Ms C.M. Rowe) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle –

That this House requests the Public Accounts Committee to inquire into and report by 31 May 2023 on the Public Trustee’s administration of trusts and deceased estates, including –

- (1) inviting submissions from the public regarding experiences with the Public Trustee;
- (2) reviewing the implications of a self-funded model of delivery on estates and trusts under the responsibility of the Public Trustee;
- (3) reviewing the fees and charges of the Public Trustee together with the communication protocols used for informing clients of the statements of their estates and trusts;
- (4) reviewing level of fee subsidisation across estates and trusts; and
- (5) reviewing supplier policies and procedures.

**16. Western Australia’s Education System** (Moved – 16/11/22)

Adjourned debate (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Education and Training – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle –

That this House calls on the McGowan Labor Government to take responsibility for the mess of Western Australia’s education system and take immediate action to address systemic issues impacting students and staff.

**17. Management of the Health System in Western Australia** (Moved – 23/11/22)

Adjourned debate (Mr S.A. Millman – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms L. Mettam –

That this House condemns the Minister for Health and the McGowan Government for their shambolic management of the health system which has a series of failings and continues to put health workers and WA families across the state at risk.
