# 1. Meeting of Council

The Council assembled at 10.00am pursuant to order.

The President, Hon Alanna Clohesy, took the Chair.

Prayers and an Acknowledgement of Country were read.

# 2. Statement by President — Visit from the Speaker of the Cook Islands Hon Tai Tura

The President made the following Statement —

I welcome the Speaker of the Parliament of the Cook Islands, Hon Tai Tura, to the Parliament of Western Australia. The Parliament of Western Australia has a long-standing twinning arrangement with the Cook Islands Parliament spanning over 25 years. During this time, we have warmly engaged to build knowledge across the two Parliaments.

Mr Tura is a former Member of the Parliament of the Cook Islands. Mr Tura was elected in 2010, re-elected in 2014 and again in 2018. Mr Tura did not stand for election in the 2022 Cook Islands General Election.

In March 2021, Mr Tura was elected Speaker, succeeding Ms Niki Rattle. Unlike our Standing Orders, the Speaker of the Cook Islands Parliament does not have to be a Member of Parliament but must be eligible to stand as a Member.

Mr Tura joins us today on a twinning attachment where he will be immersed in procedural, committee and parliamentary administration matters.

On behalf of all Members, I welcome Mr Tura to our Chamber.

#### 10. Presence of THC in Drivers Oral Fluid, Bloods or Urine

Hon Sophia Moermond, pursuant to Standing Order 62(a), amended Motion No. 12 to read as follows —

- (1) That this House welcomes the Cook Government's commitment to establish a working group to investigate sensible changes to our driving laws which would allow patients prescribed medicinal cannabis to drive if not impaired, and urges the working group to consider the establishment of a complete defence to the presence of THC in a driver's oral fluid, blood, or urine in circumstances where
  - (a) the driver has a valid doctor's prescription for a medicine containing THC; and
  - (b) the offence does not involve dangerous or reckless driving; and
  - (c) an officer has not established driver impairment by another means.
- (2) This House further calls upon the Government to set a reporting date for the working group, such that legislative changes can be debated ahead of the next election.

# 11. Daylight Saving Bill 2023

Non-Government Business No. 1 having been called, Hon Wilson Tucker, pursuant to notice, moved —

That a Bill for "An Act to provide for a referendum on the question of daylight saving throughout the State, to alter standard time accordingly if the majority of electors indicates approval of daylight saving in the referendum, and for related purposes." be introduced and read a first time.

- (a) labour markets in Australia and across the world are embracing flexible working arrangements including job sharing, remote and hybrid work, and compressed hours and shorter working weeks;
- (b) employers in Western Australia are starting to embrace a 4-day working week, joining many others across the world who have seized upon the opportunity;
- (c) Western Australia stands to benefit by joining the movement before other States and Territories, and being a 'first mover';

- (d) not only would a 4-day working week help employers to retain and attract staff, it would be inline with our State's character as a laid-back place to live and work; and
- (e) encourages the Western Australian Government, as one of the largest employers in the State, to set an example for businesses, and to trial a 4-day working week within the public sector.

# 13. Western Australia's Trading Hour Laws — Community Expectations

Non-Government Business No. 3 having been called, Hon Wilson Tucker moved, without notice — That this House recognises that —

- (a) the Perth CBD is dying, with many businesses struggling to remain open and attract staff after the COVID-19 pandemic, and with many Western Australians actively choosing to avoid the area;
- (b) Western Australia's trading hour laws are archaic and outdated, and are among the most restrictive in Australia;
- (c) time and time again, Western Australians express their wish for more flexibility as to when they can shop, including via a Painted Dog Research poll dated January 2023; and
- (d) calls on the Government to bring inline Western Australia's trading hour laws with community wishes and expectations.

# 36ZNA. When post-traumatic stress disorder taken to be injury caused while engaged in volunteer activities

(1) In this section —

**DSM-5** means the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, 5<sup>th</sup> edition, published by the American Psychiatric Association in 2013.

- (2) An injury by contracting post-traumatic stress disorder suffered by a volunteer is, for the purposes of this Part, taken to be caused to the volunteer while engaged in volunteer activities if all of the requirements for the application of this section to the injury as specified in subsection (3) are satisfied, unless the responsible agency proves that the injury was not caused to the volunteer while engaged in volunteer activities.
- (3) The requirements for the application of this section to an injury by post-traumatic stress disorder contracted by a volunteer are as follows
  - (a) the volunteer is diagnosed as having post-traumatic stress disorder by a psychiatrist in accordance with the diagnostic criteria in DSM-5 for post-traumatic stress disorder;
  - (b) the volunteer is first diagnosed as having post-traumatic stress disorder (whether in accordance with paragraph (a) or otherwise) on or after 6 May 2023.
