Mr P.J. Rundle: To move –

That this House condemns the Cook Labor Government for its failure in fostering regional development by missing the mark in delivering targeted support and investment, directly threatening the economic sustainability of Western Australia.

2. Transparency (Notice given – 17/9/24)

Mr R.S. Love: To move –

That this House calls upon the Cook Labor Government to review their processes of delivering a 'rolled gold' standard of transparency as promised to West Australians, noting their abject failure to deliver anything close.

PRIVATE MEMBERS' BUSINESS – ORDERS OF THE DAY**1. Primary Industries in WA** (Moved – 20/9/23)

Adjourned debate (Ms J.L. Hanns – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle on behalf of Mr R.S. Love –

This House condemns the WA Labor Government for its blatant disregard for primary industries, as evidenced by the ill-considered fishing policies, its abrupt ban of native forest harvesting, and its failure to stand against Federal Labor's devastating live sheep export ban, weakening the foundation of Western Australia's economy and betraying the livelihoods of regional Western Australians.

2. WA Cook Labor Government (Moved – 11/10/23)

Adjourned debate (Deputy Premier – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House condemns the WA Labor Government for its actions in the first 100 days of Premier Cook's leadership – a leadership marked by government overreach and of arrogant dismissal of the concerns of West Australians, underscoring the urgent need for a change in government.

3. The Management of WA’s Health System (Moved – 18/10/23)

Adjourned debate (Ms H.M. Beazley – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms L. Mettam –

That this House condemns WA Labor’s years of neglect and mismanagement of the WA health system and its failure to prioritise patient safety and support our hardworking health workers.

4. Western Australian Housing (Moved – 8/11/23)

Adjourned debate (Mrs J.M.C. Stojkovski – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House condemns the WA Labor Government for failing to prevent the worsening housing crisis, with record numbers of builders and construction businesses folding each week, and West Australians struggling to keep a roof over their heads, despite having seven years to take action.

5. Energy Sector in Western Australia (Moved – 15/11/23)

Adjourned debate (Mr W.J. Johnston – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr D.J. Honey –

That this House condemns the WA Labor Government for its poorly focused approach to the management of our State’s energy needs that is creating increasing uncertainty over the ability of our energy sector to deliver reliable and affordable energy for households and businesses.

6. Teacher Shortages in Western Australia (Moved – 29/11/23)

Adjourned debate (Leader of the House) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle –

That this House condemns the WA Labor Government for their failure to alleviate teacher shortages and provide a safe and supportive workplace for school staff.

7. Frontline Workers and Volunteers in Western Australia (Moved – 29/11/23)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Police – continuation of remarks) on the amendment moved by the Minister for Police –

To delete all the words after “safe”.

on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House applauds our frontline workers and volunteers who work hard to keep West Australians safe, and notes the WA Labor Government are failing in their promise to do so, instead continuing to disregard the concerns of frontline personnel.

8. State and Federal Relations (Moved – 21/2/24)

Adjourned debate (Minister Assisting the Minister for Training and Workforce Development – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House condemns the Cook Labor Government for its failure in managing State and Federal Relations, which is putting at risk key industries which support our state, dismissing their significant social and economic contributions to our community.

9. Crime and Community Violence (Moved – 13/3/24)

Adjourned debate (Attorney General – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House condemns the Cook Labor Government for overseeing a crime and community violence crisis which continues to spiral out of control, with violent crime at record highs and West Australians at their wits end, exhausted by the escalating cycle of crime in their communities.

10. Methamphetamine Use in Western Australia (Moved – 20/3/24)

Adjourned debate (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Health – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms L. Mettam –

That this House condemns the Cook Labor Government for failing to stem the tide of methamphetamine use in Western Australia, made worse by their dangerous inability to manage policing and public health systems.

11. Cook Labor Government – Economic Management (Moved – 17/4/24)

Adjourned debate (Mr K.J.J. Michel – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House

1. condemns the Cook Labor Government for its poor economic management, failing to deliver projects on time and on budget and failing to deliver essential services when Western Australians are grappling with a cost of living crisis; and
2. calls for a Special Inquiry into Labor’s near eight-year track record of mismanagement and wrong priorities.

12. Energy Portfolio (Moved – 8/5/24)

Adjourned debate on the motion moved by Dr D.J. Honey –

That this House condemns the Labor Government’s seven years of energy portfolio mismanagement resulting in: a declining reliability of the system; a failure to ensure coal and gas supply meets our state’s current and future electricity and energy needs; and failing to make sufficient progress on renewable energy-based industries.

13. 2024-25 State Budget - Essential Services (Moved – 15/5/24)

Adjourned debate (Mr T.J. Healy – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr P.J. Rundle –

That this House condemns the Cook Labor Government for failing to prioritise the allocation of funds within the 2024-25 State Budget towards essential services, alleviating the cost-of-living crisis, and tackling the housing crisis, and calls on the Government to take measures to end the reckless fiscal management which has led to cost overruns such as those seen in Metronet.

14. Family and Domestic Violence (Moved – 12/6/24)

Adjourned debate (Attorney General – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms L. Mettam –

That this House condemns the Cook Labor Government for failing to address the rise of family and domestic violence.

15. Cook Labor Government – First Year Performance (Moved – 19/6/24)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Mines and Petroleum – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House condemns the Cook Labor Government for its performance in its first 12 months under Premier Cook’s leadership, demonstrating that despite new leadership, it remains the same old Labor Government, failing to address the concerns of West Australians and highlights the urgent need for a change in Government.

16. Cook Labor Government – Prioritising the Needs of West Australians

(Moved – 7/8/24)

Adjourned debate (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Health – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr R.S. Love –

That this House notes that after 7 years in power, the Cook Labor Government have failed to prioritise the needs of West Australians over ideological point scoring and vanity projects, sacrificing better outcomes for political gains.

17. State Development and Economic Prospects (Moved – 14/8/24)

Adjourned debate (Mr W.J. Johnston – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr D.J. Honey –

That this House condemns Premier Roger Cook and his Labor Government for their mismanagement of our state’s development, and the failure to defend major downstream processing businesses, neglecting growth opportunities, and undermining the long-term economic prospects of Western Australia.

18. Health Portfolio (Moved – 11/9/24)

Adjourned debate (Ms L.A. Munday – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms L. Mettam –

That this House condemns the Premier for 8 years of failure across the health portfolio, his failure to put patients first and the disastrous impacts this is having for Western Australians across the state.

Legislative Council Message No. 142.

The Legislative Council acquaints the Legislative Assembly that it has passed the following resolution and invites the Legislative Assembly to concur with the resolution:

That the Joint Standing Rules and Orders of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly (including the Joint Standing Rules and Orders relating to Bills and the Election of a Senator to the Federal Parliament) be amended by –

- (a) deleting the words “Her Majesty” wherever they appear and substituting the words “the Sovereign”;
- (b) deleting the words “His Excellency” wherever they appear;
- (c) deleting the word “him” where it appears and substituting the word “them”;
- (d) deleting the word “himself” where it appears and substituting the word “themselves”;
- (e) deleting the word “his” where it appears and substituting the word “their”; and
- (f) deleting the date “19.....” where it appears and substituting the date “20.....”
