3. First Responders (Notice given -11/9/18, renewed -12/3/19)

Mr P.A. Katsambanis: To move –

That this House:

- (a) extends its support and gratitude to the officers of the Western Australian Police Force, our fire and emergency services personnel, our paramedics and all first responders for their ongoing support and protection of our community; and
- (b) in particular, acknowledges the many difficult and tragic incidents they must attend to on behalf of the community which would have a lasting toll on their mental health and wellbeing.

4. Minister for Corrective Services (Notice given -11/9/18, renewed -12/3/19)

That this House condemns the Minister for Corrective Services for his consistent failures in leadership and public accountability, in particular ongoing corruption issues, prison breakouts, drugs entering the prison system and prison officer misconduct, including allowing paedophiles to be unsupervised in public.

5. **Federal Labor Opposition Policies** (Notice given -20/3/19)

Mr D.C. Nalder: To move –

That this House:

- (a) expresses it deep concern at the McGowan Government's support for the policies of the Federal Labor Opposition including their policies on negative gearing, franking credits, capital gains tax, a 50% renewable energy target and industrial relations; and
- (b) calls on the McGowan Government to explain the potential impact of these policies for Western Australians at a time of subdued housing, retail and employment sectors.

6. Mortgage Stress and Negative Equity (Notice given -20/3/19)

Mr D.C. Nalder: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its poor judgement and the impact their decisions are having on Western Australian households, including their decisions to remove the First Home Owners Grant Boost, their introduction of a Foreign Buyers Surcharge and their increases to the cost of living, all of which have contributed to mortgage stress and negative equity.

7. Infrastructure Projects (Notice given -2/4/19)

Dr M.D. Nahan: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for failing to commence the various infrastructure projects which have received significant funding from the Federal Liberal National Government over recent years.

8. Hospitality and Tourism Industry (Notice given -3/4/19)

Ms L. Mettam: To move -

That this House:

- (1) Notes the career opportunities presented by the hospitality and tourism industry;
- (2) Acknowledges the professionalism, politeness, friendliness and engaging qualities of Western Australia's tourism and hospitality workers;
- (3) Condemns the Minister for Tourism for his condescending remarks insinuating Western Australia's tourism and hospitality workers lack courtesy, decorum and friendliness.

9. Federal Liberal-National Government GST (Notice given – 7/5/19)

Dr M.D. Nahan: To move -

That the House congratulates the Federal Liberal-National Government for delivering the GST fix and record infrastructure funding, which has guaranteed WA more funding over future years, notwithstanding the record Iron Ore royalties, increased infrastructure spending and more jobs.

10. Federal Liberal-National Government (Notice given – 7/5/19)

Mr S.K. L'Estrange: To move –

That this House:

- (1) Congratulates the Federal Liberal-National Government for:
 - (a) increasing GP bulk billing rates from 82% under Labor to 86% now;
 - (b) ending Labor's Medicare freeze;
 - increasing spending on health under a new five-year public hospital agreement with the states and territories delivering \$31 billion more funding for hospitals; and
 - (d) adding more than 2,000 medicine listings worth over \$10.6 billion to the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme. and
- (2) Condemns the McGowan Government for undermining these improvements by cutting \$200 million from the WA Health budget.

11. State Budget Interests (Notice given – 14/5/19)

Ms M.J. Davies: To move –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for once again putting the interests of metropolitan Perth ahead of regional Western Australia in its latest State Budget.

12. Corrections Portfolio (Notice given -27/11/18, renewed -18/6/19)

Mr Z.R.F. Kirkup: To move –

That this House condemns the Minister for Corrective Services for his failures in the Corrections portfolio.

13. Government Transparency (Notice given – 27/11/18, renewed – 18/6/19)

Mr Z.R.F. Kirkup: To move –

That this House notes:

- (1) The Premier's commitment to gold standard transparency in Government; and
- (2) The failure of Ministers in the McGowan Government to meet the Premier's standard of gold standard transparency.

14. Tourism Industry Delivery (Notice given -27/11/18, renewed -18/6/19)

Ms L. Mettam: To move –

That this House notes the poor performance of the McGowan Government for its failure to deliver for the tourism industry, evidenced by a decline in international visitor numbers, a reduction in international students and its failure to deliver additional direct flights to Western Australia.

That this House condemns the McGowan Government's crippling cost of living increases on struggling Western Australian households at a time of stagnant wages and for its failure to lower electricity prices through introducing retail competition and for using the Water Corporation as a taxing mechanism.

4. Major Events (Ticket Scalping) Bill 2018 (Mr J.E. McGrath) (No. 97, 2r. – 19/9/18)

Second reading. Adjourned debate (Ms L. Mettam).

5. Frontline Services and Critical Service Delivery (Moved -19/9/18)

Adjourned debate (Minister for Tourism – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government's budget cuts to frontline services and the associated impact on critical service delivery to the people of Western Australia.

6. Health Portfolio (Moved -10/10/18)

Adjourned debate (Ms L. Mettam – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr S.K. L'Estrange –

That this House condemns the Health Minister's handling of the health portfolio, placing our health system on a trajectory of cost cutting that is stripping away frontline health and mental health services in a similar manner to that which led to the chaos experienced under the last State Labor Government.

7. Fly-in Fly-out Work Practices (Moved -17/10/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr R.S. Love – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies – That this House recognises that fly in fly out work practices can be detrimental to regional communities through the reduction of economic and social opportunities for development and calls on the McGowan Government to:

Adjourned debate (Mr T.J. Healy – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House confirms the McGowan Government cannot be trusted because of its lack of accountability, broken promises, new taxes and failure to deliver on gold standard transparency.

10. McGowan Government's Decision-Making (Moved – 7/11/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr R.S. Love – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr V.A. Catania –

That this House condemns the Ministers of the McGowan Government whose inconsistent, mean-spirited, reactionary and politically-fuelled decision-making has undermined the trust and goodwill of Western Australians.

11. Housing Industry in Western Australia (Moved – 21/11/18)

Adjourned debate (Mr S. L'Estrange – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr D.C. Nalder –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its attack on the housing industry, home values and construction jobs, including reducing demand by introducing the foreign investment tax and cuts to the first home owner grant boost.

12. McGowan Government's First Two Parliamentary Years (Moved – 28/11/18)

Adjourned debate (Ms L. Mettam – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its failures in delivering on its election promises, cuts to frontline services, cost of living increases and failure to be open and accountable to the people of Western Australia in its first two parliamentary years.

13. Frontline Services and the Western Australia Community (Moved – 20/2/19)

Adjourned debate (Mr K.M. O'Donnell – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Mr S. L'Estrange –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its cuts to frontline services, resulting in the WA community and frontline staff being put at risk.

14. Decision Making Processes of the McGowan Government (Moved – 13/3/19)

Adjourned debate (Ms M.J. Davies – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Ms M.J. Davies –

That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its disdain and neglect of regional Western Australia during its first two years in power through its metro-centric attitude and mean-spirited decision making processes.

15. Impact of a Federal Labor Government on Western Australia (Moved – 20/3/19)

Adjourned debate (Dr D.J. Honey – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

That this House notes the damage that a Federal Labor Government will have on Western Australia, including increases to the cost of living, reduced income for seniors and damage to the housing and construction sector.

16. Federal Labor's Policies and Western Australia (Moved – 3/4/19)

Adjourned debate (Ms J.J. Shaw – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan – That this House condemns the McGowan Government for its failure to stand up to Bill Shorten and Federal Labor who are advocating policies that will have a detrimental impact on Western Australia.

That this House condemns Bill Shorten and the Federal Labor Party for its destructive plan to shut down WA's live sheep export industry and calls on the McGowan Government to stand up and fight to save an industry which generates hundreds of jobs in Western Australia.

20. Election of the Morrison Government (Moved – 12/6/19)

Adjourned debate (Mr W.R. Marmion – continuation of remarks) on the motion moved by Dr M.D. Nahan –

40. Only the Speaker may admit strangers onto the floor of the Chamber. When a division is called, strangers will withdraw. Members of the Council will be admitted to the Chamber in the area behind the Chair and may remain there during divisions. A stranger does not include a member's baby being breastfed by that member.
