1. Meeting of Assembly

Gosnells Police Station – Mr T.J. Healy presented a petition from two people supporting the extension of weekday opening hours at Gosnells Police Station from 4.00 pm close to 7.00 pm close (P. 2).

13. Speaker's Statement – Use of Electronic Devices in the Chamber

The Speaker advised that while members are permitted to use smartphones, laptops and tablets in the Chamber on sitting days and during Committee proceedings, these devices must be switched to silent mode and be used unobtrusively. Phones may not be used to take calls, nor can devices be used to take photographs or to film proceedings. As a general principle, devices should not be used in a way that disrupts proceedings or detracts from the dignity of the House.

With respect to members using their electronic devices to comment on chamber or committee proceedings on social media, the Speaker noted that such communication is highly unlikely to constitute a proceeding in Parliament, and, therefore, would not be protected by parliamentary privilege. Social media provides a valuable tool for members to engage with the public and to communicate useful information about the work that the Parliament undertakes, but like all forms of communication it should be used responsibly.
